**SUBJECT: 2023 SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING FEES AND RELATED BYLAW
AMENDMENTS**

PURPOSE: To implement the previously approved changes to the solid waste collection fees and to move the associated fee schedule to the Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. **THAT** Council authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* to move the fees schedule to the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*, as set out in Section 5.0 of this report, effective 2023 January 01.
2. **THAT** Council authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* to include a new schedule for solid waste and recycling fees, as set out in **Attachment 3** of this report, effective 2023 January 01.

REPORT

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Solid Waste and Recycling Division of the Engineering Department provides waste collection and recycling services to approximately 33,900 single-family, two-family, and row house properties, 39,800 multi-family residential households and 690 commercial customers.

Utility fees are collected from customers to offset the direct costs of providing these services.

At its 2021 November 08 Open meeting, Council approved phased increases to solid waste receptacle fees for single-family dwellings, two-family dwellings and row house (see **Attachment 1**) and a phased transition for increases in pick-up fees for multi-family co-ops and strata titled properties (see **Attachment 2**). The purpose of this report is to implement the next phase of these fee increases and move the entire fee schedule in the

Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010 to the newly established *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*, effective 2023 January 01. All other solid waste and recycling fees remain the same as for 2022.

Moving the fees schedules to the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* is part of the City's *Moving Forward* initiative to consolidate fees and charges for various City services, use of City property and exercise of City's regulatory authority into one bylaw in order to allow for greater efficiency, transparency and accountability. Phase 2 of this initiative involves moving sewer and water utility rates as well as solid waste and recycling fees into the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*.

2.0 POLICY CONTEXT

Amendment of Solid Waste and Recycling Fees and their incorporation into the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* aligns with work to ensure the adequacy of funding for city programs and operational requirements. This in turn aids in encouragement of continued economic development in line with the City's economic development strategy.

3.0 BACKGROUND

At the regular meeting of Council on 2021 November 08, staff presented a multi-year plan for the phased removal of pick-up fee exemptions and annual receptacle fees adjustments (see **Attachments 1 and 2**). The multi-year plan was approved by Council.

4.0 APPROVED FEE CHANGES

4.1 Single-family, Multi-family, and Row House Properties

The 2023 fees for 120L, 180L, and 360L solid waste receptacles are to be adjusted as indicated below:

- 1. the 120L receptacle fee be increased from \$45 per year to \$50 per year;
- 2. the 180L receptacle fee be increased from \$110 per year to \$130 per year, and;
- 3. the 360L receptacle fee be increased from \$395 per year to \$400 per year; and
- 4. the 240L receptacle fee of \$140 per year remain unchanged.

The 2023 receptacle fee changes will be implemented effective 2023 January 01 and will appear in 2023 Utility Notices, with a due date of 2023 March 15. A 5% discount applies if the fee is paid before this due date.

4.2 Multi-family Co-operatives and Strata Titled Properties

The phasing out of weekly pickup fee exemptions will be implemented for multi-family co-op and strata properties over four years using a discounting process starting 2023 January 01 and completing 2026 January 01. Once phasing is complete, all pick-ups will be charged the regular pick-up fee based on receptacle size and type without discount. This will ensure pick-up fees are equitably applied for all MFICI customers.

The phased removal of the pickup fee exemption will provide properties with additional time to make adjustments to reduce the number of garbage containers rented, the number of pick-ups scheduled, and to improve recycling diversion.

The discounted 2023 first weekly pick-up fee will be implemented effective 2023 January 01 and will be reflected in the 2023 Utility Notices, which are due on 2023 March 15.

4.3 Budget Implications

These proposed fee changes will help to further offset the cost of providing service. Revenue is projected to increase by \$735,000 in 2023. The projected increase has been included in the 2023- 2027 Financial Plan.

5.0 BYLAW AMENDMENTS

In addition to the changes needed to implement the fee increases identified in Section 4.0 of this report, the entire fee schedule in the *Burnaby Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw* is proposed to be moved to the newly established *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*. This proposed change is part of Phase 2 of the City's *Moving Forward* initiative to consolidate City fees and charges into one bylaw to allow for greater efficiency, transparency and accountability. In order to move the fee schedule under the *Burnaby Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw* to the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*, it is necessary to:

- amend sections 9(1) to (4), (10) and (11) of the *Burnaby Solid Waste and Recycling*

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From: Acting General Manager Engineering
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Bylaw to reference the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* rather than Schedule A of the bylaw;

- repeal Schedule A of the *Burnaby Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw*; and
- amend *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* to add a new schedule (Schedule C9 (A) Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw) (see **Attachment 3**).

It is recommended that the above amendments be made effective 2023 January 01. The fee changes identified in Section 4.0 of this report are reflected in the proposed Schedule C9 (A) of the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*.

6.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

That Council authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward bylaws to amend the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* and *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw* to implement the previously-approved fee changes in Section 4.0 and move the solid waste and recycle fees schedule to the *Burnaby Consolidated Fees and Charges Bylaw*, effective 2023 January 01.

SUBJECT: AMENDMENTS TO THE SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING BYLAW 2010 FOR MULTI-FAMILY, INDUSTRIAL, COMMERCIAL, AND INSTITUTIONAL SERVICE FEES
PURPOSE: To propose changes to the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* Multi-family, Industrial, Commercial, and Institutional service fee structure that phases in cost increases by adjusting container rental fees and eliminating pick-up fee exemptions.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. **THAT** Council approve the proposed phased schedule for rate changes to the solid waste and recycling fee structure as set out in this report.
2. **THAT** Council authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the fee schedules in the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* as set out in this report.

REPORT**1.0 INTRODUCTION**

The Multi-family, Institutional, Commercial, and Industrial (MFICI) solid waste service fees which the City of Burnaby charges customers have not increased since 2016. In the years that followed, costs associated with delivery of these services have risen due to increases in fuel, equipment, materials, labour, and disposal fees. Additionally, the proportion of multi-family households in the City's overall collection network has increased and there is a growing imbalance in the equity for cost recovery to residents. Changes to these rates are now required to help recover increased costs and ensure these costs are allocated fairly.

At the regular meeting of 2021 July 12, Council directed that staff develop options for changes to the solid waste and recycling fee structure for multi-family stratas and Co-ops that phases in the cost increases resulting from the proposed elimination of free pick ups.

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This report will provide Council with a comparison of the fee increases currently scheduled to take effect 2022 January 01, and the proposed alternative phased fee increase schedule as set out in this report.

2.0 POLICY SECTION

The following project is aligned with the City of Burnaby's Corporate Strategic Plan by supporting the following goals and sub-goals of the Plan.

Goals

- A Thriving Organization
 - Financial viability –
Maintain a financially sustainable City for the provision, renewal and enhancement of City services, facilities and assets
- A Healthy Community
 - Healthy environment –
Enhance our environmental health, resilience and sustainability

3.0 BACKGROUND

Multi-family strata (385 complexes) and co-op (25 complexes) have been exempted from paying certain weekly container pick-up fees. Whilst commercial businesses, schools, civic facilities, and privately owned rental apartments (690 accounts) are charged the pick-up fee for every disposal. Exempting two classes of customers raises issues of equity. The pick-up fee exemption also does not support the equal distribution of costs associated with providing the service to those customers who benefit from receiving the service. Fee structure changes will also serve to encourage waste reduction and to promote diversion from the garbage stream to the recycling and green waste streams.

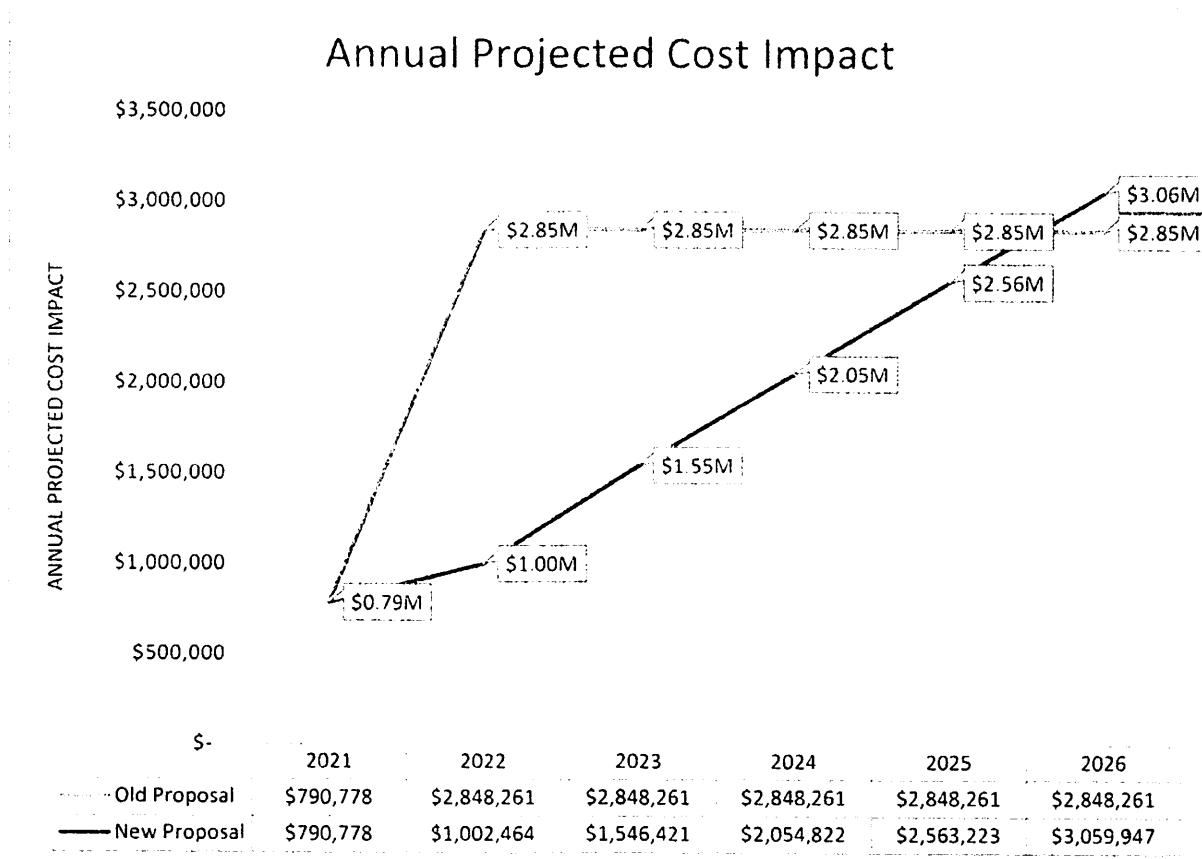
Council had previously approved changes to the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* which eliminated the first pick-up fee exemption afforded to multi-family strata customers. This revision was to be made effective 2022 January 01.

In anticipation of this change, staff embarked on a customer notification program, which included letter correspondence and phone calls to property managers and strata councils. During this notification period, customers expressed concern that the cost increases were substantial and did not provide sufficient opportunity to plan for implementation. Customers also advised that these cost increases were on the heels of recent significant home insurance cost increases.

As a result, Council requested staff to develop a strategy that would phase in any cost increases and provide additional opportunity for customers to prepare for implementation by adjusting behaviours to promote diversion.

This report provides Council with a fee structure option that, if approved, phases in cost increases.

Graph 1 - Comparison of Cumulative Phased vs Un-phased Cost Increases



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4.0 PROPOSED BYLAW CHANGES

Phase 1 – Increase Monthly Rental Fees

Commencing 2022 January 01, staff propose that the monthly rental fee for steel containers in the entire MFICI sector will increase approximately 50% per month. The purpose of this increase is twofold. Firstly, to help offset the rising cost of materials and labour used in container construction. Secondly, to encourage multi-family stratas and co-ops to reduce the number of additional containers rented to maximize the pick-up fee exemption.

Upon implementation of the Phase 1 monthly rental fee adjustments on 2022 January 01, the rental fees are not proposed to require further adjustment until 2026.

Phase 2 – Removal of Pick-up Fee Exemptions

Staff propose that weekly pickup fee exemptions for multi-family strata and co-op complexes will be phased out over four years using a discounting process starting 2023 January 01 and completing 2026 January 01. Once phasing is complete, all pick-ups will be charged the prevailing pick-up fee based receptacle size and type without discount. This will ensure pick-up fees are equitably applied for all MFICI customers.

The phased removal of the pickup fee exemption will provide customers with additional time to implement behavioural changes to reduce the number of garbage containers rented, the number of pick-ups scheduled, and to improve recycling diversion.

Example Calculation 1 – Discounted Weekly Pick-up Fee Calculation

The phasing for removal of pick-up fee exemptions and for the charging of pick-up fees can be illustrated using the following example calculation for a 4 cu. yd. container.

Current weekly pick-up fee calculation

= (\$0.00 for exempted pick-up) + (\$45.00 for charged pick-up) = \$45.00 per week

Weekly pick-up fee calculation commencing 2023 January 01

= (\$12.00 for discounted pick-up) + (\$45.00 for charged pick-up) = \$57.00 per week

The customer in this example will be charged an additional \$12.00 per week, or the equivalent of \$624.00 per year, per container as compared to current. Assuming that no adjustments are made to the number of containers or the number of pick-ups, the customer in this example will observe another similar per year per container increase in each year until phasing is complete.

Phase 3 – Future Service Fee Increases

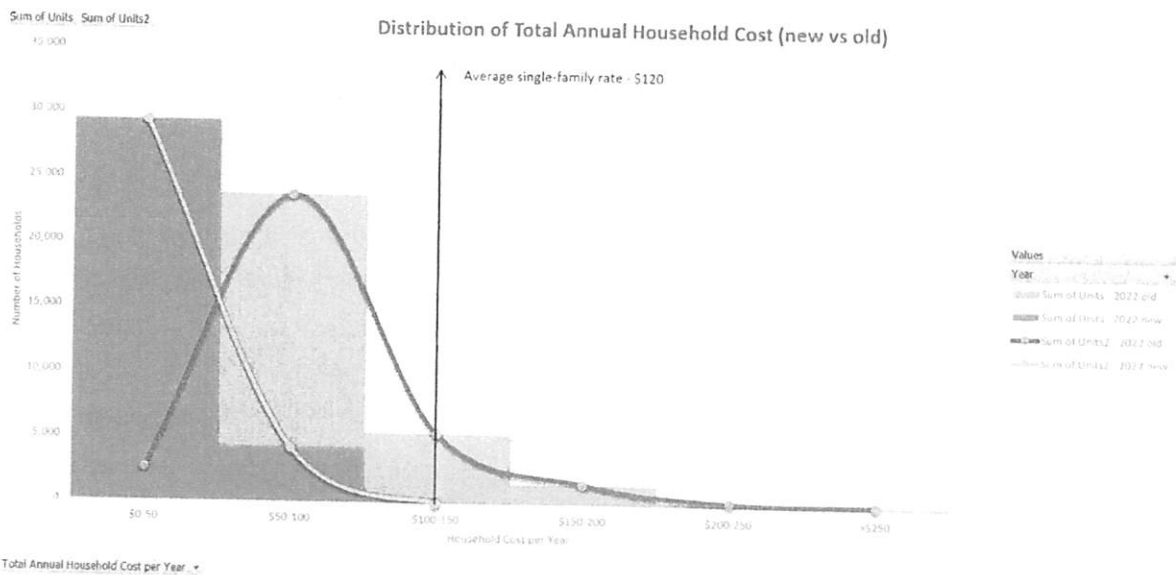
The phasing of pick-up fee exemptions is scheduled for completion on 2026 January 01. Following this date, future increases to the MFICI fee structure may be necessary to adequately recover the costs to provide service. Staff will then review cost increases to recommend any future fee increases.

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5.0 CUSTOMER IMPACTS

Customers will observe the costs of these monthly fee increases and removal of pick-up fee exemptions in varying degrees depending on the number of containers rented and the number of pick-ups performed. In all cases however, behavioral changes to reduce waste and promote diversion will help to mitigate cost increases.

Graph 2 – Comparison of Household Costs for 2022



Following implementation of the Phase 1 Monthly Rental Fee increases in 2022, the vast majority of multi-family strata and co-operative customers will continue to observe service fees below the average single-family household rate of \$120 per year.

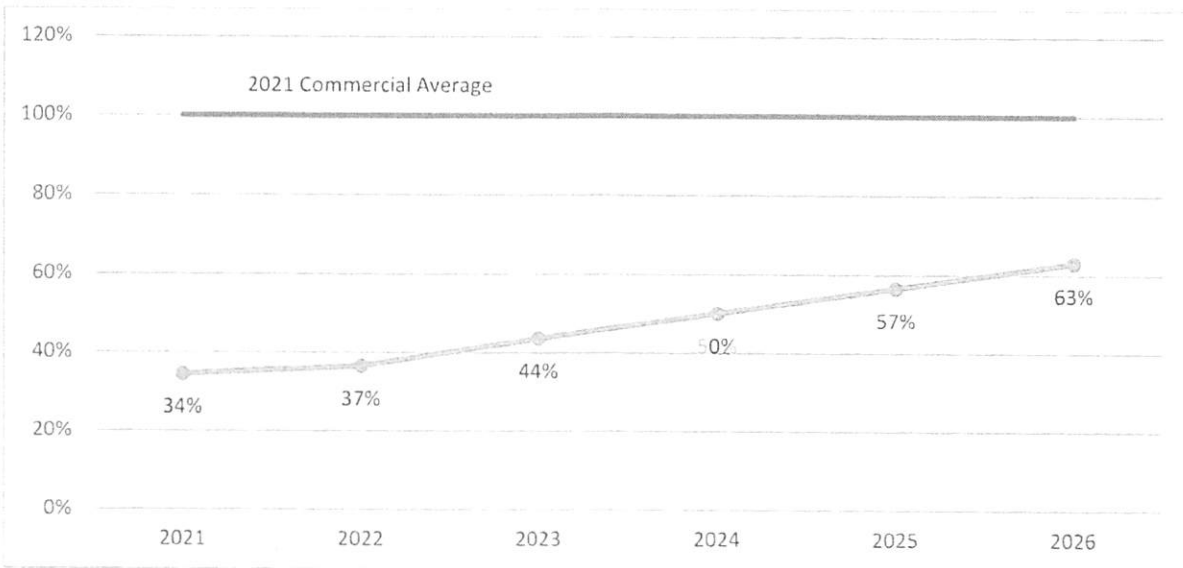

6.0 MARKET COMPARISONS

Staff have completed a review of comparable rate fee structures currently offered by private commercial service providers within the MFICI sector. It is anticipated that even with full implementation of all rate fee increases in 2026, City customers will continue to be charged rate fees that remain below the private commercial service providers.

Table 3 – Comparison of City of Burnaby Rates to Commercial Average



The City service model also provides customers with additional value added features such as Green Waste, Cardboard, Recycling, and Large Item collection at low rates which support waste diversion and enhance the overall service delivery.

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7.0 BYLAW ADOPTION SCHEDULE

At the regular meeting of 2021 November 22, staff plan to bring forward a bylaw for first reading to amend *Schedule A, Table A in the Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* to increase the monthly rental fees for 2022 (Phase 1).

In subsequent years prior to year-end, staff will bring forward additional bylaw amendments to enact the phased removal of pick-up fee exemptions as per the schedule outlined in this report.

Completion of bylaw amendments to adopt the phased in approach will be completed prior to year-end 2025.

8.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

It is recommended that Council approve the proposed fee changes and authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the fee schedules in the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* as set out in this report.

SUBJECT: **AMENDMENTS TO SOLID WASTE AND RECYCLING BYLAW 2010 FOR SINGLE-FAMILY, TWO-FAMILY, AND ROW HOUSE PROPERTIES**

PURPOSE: To propose amendments to the fee schedules relating to waste receptacles for curbside collection services in the *Solid Waste & Recycling Bylaw 2010*.

RECOMMENDATIONS:

1. **THAT** Council authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the fee schedules in the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* as set out in this report.
2. **THAT** Council approve the future streamlining of operations to reduce the cost difference in fees between the 180L and 240L receptacles and the eventual offering of three sizes as set out in this report.

REPORT

1.0 INTRODUCTION

The Solid Waste & Recycling Division of the Engineering Department provides waste collection and recycling services to approximately 33,900 single-family, two-family, and row house properties. Receptacle fees are collected annually to offset the direct costs of providing these services. The following fee amendments are proposed to further help offset increased operating costs, to encourage greater waste diversion through recycling, and to help streamline operations.

2.0 POLICY SECTION

The following project is aligned with the City of Burnaby's Corporate Strategic Plan by supporting the following goals and sub-goals of the Plan.

Goals

- A Thriving Organization
 - Financial viability –
Maintain a financially sustainable City for the provision, renewal and enhancement of City services, facilities and assets
- A Healthy Community
 - Healthy environment –
Enhance our environmental health, resilience and sustainability

The Solid Waste & Recycling Division service models and fee structures are designed to encourage waste reduction and to promote diversion from the garbage stream to recycling and green waste collection.

3.0 BACKGROUND

Single-family, two-family, and some row house properties receive curbside collection service in which each dwelling is provided with its own garbage receptacle, green waste receptacle, and recycling containers. Collection service is provided fortnightly for garbage and weekly for green waste and recycling.

Property owners pay an annual fee, based on the size of the garbage receptacle in service on January 01 of each year. The fee is included on their annual utility bill.

The fees collected for the 120L receptacles (5,900 in service) and 180L receptacles (21,200 in service) do not offset an adequate portion of the cost of providing service. Fees for the 240L receptacles (5,100 in service) more adequately offset the cost of providing service. Fees for the 360L receptacles (1,700 in service) are designed to encourage downsizing in effort to promote waste diversion.

Council previously approved an adjustment that reduced the difference in fees between the 180L and 240L receptacles to discourage residents from selecting a smaller receptacle size than required based purely on financial reasons. Historically, most residents were originally provided with a 180L receptacle for weekly collection. In some cases however, the switch to fortnightly garbage collection in 2017 has resulted in the overfilling of receptacles. Similarly, some residents have actually reduced the size of their receptacle for financial reasons, resulting in the same overfilling condition.

Furthermore, the maintaining of multiple receptacle varieties creates additional warehousing and procurement challenges that could be simplified by reducing the offering to only three sizes of receptacles (small, medium, large) to facilitate the streamlining of operations.

The recommendations in this report are consistent with this initiative.

4.0 DISCUSSION

It is recommended that the 2022 fees collected for 120L, 180L, and 360L receptacles be adjusted as indicated below. Staff propose:

1. the 120L receptacle fee should be increased from \$40 per year to \$45 per year;
2. the 180L receptacle fee should be increased from \$100 per year to \$110 per year, and;
3. the 360L receptacle fee should be increased from \$385 per year to \$395 per year, and;
4. the 240L receptacle fee of \$140 per year remain unchanged.

Staff propose additional future rate fee changes in 2023 to improve alignment of revenue with costs and further reduce the difference between 180L and 240L receptacles.

The proposed fee changes are projected to increase revenue by \$245,485 in 2022 and \$439,185 in 2023. The projected increase has been included in the 2022 - 2026 Provisional Financial Plan.

The 2022 receptacle fee changes are proposed to be effective 2022 January 01 and if approved by Council, will be reflected in the 2022 Utility Notices.

5.0 BYLAW ADOPTION SCHEDULE

At the regular meeting of 2021 November 22, staff plan to bring forward a bylaw for first reading to amend Schedule A, Table E in the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* to update the receptacle fees for 2022.

Staff will bring forward additional amendments to the receptacle fees in Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw prior to year-end 2023.

6.0 SUMMARY

The proposed changes to the fee schedules in the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* will improve the financial resiliency of the Solid Waste & Recycling Division and better aligns fees with the cost of providing the service. In addition, reducing the difference in cost between the 180L and 240L receptacles will help to discourage residents from selecting smaller receptacles than required for financial purposes and to simplify operations by facilitating a switch to three receptacle size offerings.

The Solid Waste & Recycling Division conducts community outreach and provides educational materials and workshops to customers. Additionally, the Division conducts waste stream analysis and pursues innovative pilot programs to help our customers increase diversion and reduce waste.

7.0 RECOMMENDATIONS

Staff recommend that Council approve the changes to the *Solid Waste and Recycling Bylaw 2010* and authorize the City Solicitor to bring forward a bylaw to amend the fee schedules as set out in this report.
