1. CALL TO ORDER

Mayor Hurley called the Open meeting to order at 5:00 p.m.

3. <u>DELEGATIONS AND PRESENTATIONS</u>

3.1 Delegation: CityHive - Re: Youth Engagement in Local Decision-Making Speaker: Rowan Gentleman-Sylvester, Executive Director

Rowan Gentleman-Sylvester, Executive Director, CityHive, appeared electronically before Council providing information on CityHive organization, who's mission is to transform the way that young people are engaged in shaping their cities.

The speaker advised that over last seven years, CityHive provided civic education programs, climate action programs and consulting services.

*Councillor Dhaliwal left at 5:04 p.m. and returned at 5:05 p.m.

The organization's guiding principles are: youth-centred engagement, collaboration first, and centre underrepresented and systematically excluded voices.

Ms. Gentleman-Sylverster noted that since 2017, CityHive had over 2,000 youth participants in programs, over 25,000 youth were reached through events and pop-ups, and the organization directly collaborate with over 60 local partners.

In conclusion, the speaker encouraged the City to build meaningful youth engagement process and practices, from strategy development to project engagement, and collaborate with CityHive to connect more young people with local decision-makers.

Mayor Hurley noted Council is looking forward working together with CityHive on this important initiative.

3.2 Heights Merchants Association - Re: Purple Line Route Proposal Speaker: Isabel Kolic, Executive Director

Isabel Kolic, Executive Director, Heights Merchants Association (HMA), appeared before Council regarding the TransLink's proposed Purple Line Route proposal, and expressed concerns regarding proposed alignment and loss of parking on Hastings Street. The speaker noted that a preferred alignment would be the route on Boundary Road (as this alignment would connect to Hasting Street as well as Brentwood and Gilmore SkyTrain stations).

In conclusion, Ms. Kolic supported development of strong, dependable and frequent bus network on Hastings Street/North Burnaby, bus bulges, and onstreet parking between traffic and sidewalk to provide a buffer for pedestrians. However, if dedicated bus lane for Bus Rapid Transit (BRT) is required, it should be in non-commercial part of Hastings Street only and should respect entering the community where different conditions are needed.

Mayor Hurley indicated that Council respect the HMA's input; however, there is still lots of work to do, and in the future the Association will be consulted.
