SUBJECT: COMMUNITY GRANT APPLICATIONS (23.63.P-23.64.P)

PURPOSE: To seek Council approval of Community Grant applications received in

October 2023.

RECOMMENDATION

THAT the following Programing Grant applications received in October 2023 be approved as follows:

- 23.63.P Burnaby Hospital Foundation for their For the Love of Burnaby Campaign - \$5,000 In-Kind; and
- 23.64.P Burnaby Minor Hockey Association for the 16th Annual Female Hockey Remembrance Day Tournament \$16,800.

1.0 POLICY SECTION

The provision of community grants is aligned with the following Council-adopted policies, plans, and strategies: *Burnaby Economic Development Strategy* (2007); *Social Sustainability Strategy* (2011), and the *Corporate Strategic Plan* (2017) that identifies the importance of a sense of belonging, inclusion, and high quality of life.

2.0 BACKGROUND

The Executive Committee of Council, at its Open meeting held on November 1, 2023, received two staff reports outlining Community Grant applications received in October 2023 and adopted the recommendations as noted above. This report seeks Council approval of the Community Grants as recommended.

2.1 Operating Grant

An operating grant may be requested for the purpose of offsetting operating costs including salaries, lease or rent payments, utilities, insurance, office supplies and maintenance & repairs. A maximum of one (1) operating grant per year per organization, with a maximum of 25% of the organizations' annual budget to a maximum grant of \$10,000 can be provided to eligible organizations.

2.2 Program Grant

Program grants may be requested for the purpose of funding projects, events, and or programs, such as outreach initiatives, block parties, environmental and other community events that benefit Burnaby residents. In-kind services from the City may

also be granted under this category. A maximum of two (2) program grants are allowed per year.

2.3 Recreational Sport Grant

Recreational Sport Grants may be requested by scheduled users of the Parks, Recreation and Culture facilities or representatives of Burnaby School District #41. The grant is available for Burnaby residents under the age of 21, competing in a championship tournament outside of the Lower Mainland. The contributions are as follows:

Provincial \$175 per person to a maximum of \$1,750 per team

National \$250 per person to a maximum of \$2,500 per team

International \$300 per person to a maximum of \$3,000 per team

An application was received from the Burnaby Hospital Foundation requesting an in-kind grant for services to assist with outdoor advertising in support of their For the Love of Burnaby Campaign taking place from February 7, 2024 to February 14, 2024. The fourth annual For the Love of Burnaby week is an opportunity for the community to show their love and support to health care workers and contribute to the Proud History, Bright Future Campaign. The event will highlight phase 2 of the Burnaby Hospital redevelopment and allows the Foundation to share medical staff stories, recognize donors of the campaign, and announce additional campaign gifts in honour of medical staff.

This request is submitted in 2023 for their 2024 campaign due to the lead time required for banner printing and placement as there is no Executive Committee of Council meeting in January 2024.

23.64.P. Burnaby Minor Hockey Association

Program: 16th Annual Female Hockey Remembrance Day Tournament

Request: \$33,600

Grant History:

An application was received from Burnaby Minor Hockey Association requesting a programming grant to cover the cost of ice rental fees for their 16th Annual Female Hockey Remembrance Day Tournament, hosted by Burnaby Minor Female Wildcats Hockey and taking place at Scotia Barn. The tournament is the primary source of fund raising for female hockey in Burnaby and funds raised go to the Burnaby female hockey program which has grown to over 300 female players. As the tournament takes place over Remembrance Day the association undertakes to raise awareness and pay tribute to veterans by creating a "Wall for Peace" display, poppy crafts and message cards from players asking for peace, & words of thanks to veterans. In addition, tournament organizers engage the Royal Canadian Legion to have poppy tins onsite. It is noted that the amount requested exceeds the maximum allowable annual total grant amount of \$25,000.

4.0 COMMUNICATION AND COMMUNITY ENGAGEMENT

Successful applicants of the Community Grant program must acknowledge the City's financial assistance on all the program's communications and promotional materials, including brochures, posters, advertisements, websites, news releases, signs, etc.

Burnaby Hospital Foundation has a diversified portfolio that includes support from many different community stakeholders through various giving vehicles, such as monthly giving, corporate partnerships, legacy giving, third party community events, individual giving and signature events. A few examples of our plan for diversification and increased revenue goals include building off the foundation of our Chinese Ambassador Society. We are working with an established network of volunteers and ambassadors with a current focus on the South Asian community to develop a South Asian Ambassador society. The launch of programs such as Plate it Forward and Round Up for Redevelopment focus on building relationships with our local community businesses to raise funds and awareness for hospital redevelopment.

SECTION D: PURPOSE OF BENEFIT*

1. DESCRIBE THE PURPOSE OR GOAL OF THE PROJECT/EVENT/PROGRAM

RDT is the primary source of fund raising for female hockey in Burnaby. Funds raised go to the Burnaby female hockey program that has grown to 300+ female players. Funds go towards player and coach development, subsidizing ice rental costs, subsidizing ice allocation formulas not designed for smaller rosters of female teams, hiring professional coaches to bring the female hockey program on par with integrated/boys hockey.

2. DESCRIBE THE PROJECT/EVENT/PROGRAM AND THE ACTIVITIES

Primary delivery is a recreational ice hockey tournament with a guarnateed number of preset games for each accepted team. Goals for the tournament while in progress are to provide a fun and energized atmosphere that makes female teams want to keep coming back. Part of the player experience includes Remembrance Day Education. We engage the ROyal Canadian LEgion to have poppy tins onsite. We have an Wall for Peace that girls makes poppy crafts and peave messages that are posted. Other onsite fund raising activities include raffle gift basket table (gaming license in place), Raffle 50/50 (gaming license in place).

In past years we have also have anumber of guest speakers to deliver education seminars like Concussion Awareness. We are not able to implement this year due to the Canalan Activity Room being bookedy for figure skating until the new areans come online.

RDT is the second largest sold-out female tournament in BC, second to Wickfest in Surrey

(https://www.wickfest.com/wickfest-returns-to-surrey-after-3-year-covid-hiatus/). This tournament is in its 16th year. RDT consistently has maxed out at 55 teams registered since 2017. Volunteers managed to pull together the RDT for all but 1 year during Covid. This year the tournament is again hosting a total of 55 teams; 36 from across the Pacific Coast, and 16 travel teams from the Okanagon, Washington State, Whistler, Lillooette, Vancouver Island, the Yukon and many other places that require visitors to book hotels, visit local restaurants and enjoy other services and tourist desitnations in Burnaby. The block of hotels reserved for out of town teams is sold out, maxing out at 255 booked rooms. The 23 teams waitlisted (if accepted into RDT) from Penticton, Vernon, Kamloops, Seattle & Chillilwack would also seek additional accomodations.

Royal Canadian Legion Br# 83 - As a tournament named for "Remembrance" it's important to raise awareness & pay tribute to our veterans. In 2017 we truly transformed RDT by creating a "Wall for Peace" display, poppy crafts & message cards from players asking for peace, & words of thanks to our Veterans. We involved the legion for poppy sales, & Canlan has always supported by doing a moment of silence during the tournament. Messages & crafts some years were delivered to local seniors homes. Our youngest Wildcat players who are not eligible to play in the tournament, lay a wreath at the Cenotaph during the Remembrance Ceremony. The Royal Canadian Legion is a stakeholder in the tournament in terms of messaging, but not finanacial support. The tournament pays the legion \$50 for wreaths laid at the Cenotaph. Tourism Burnaby pays ~\$1500 to provide a photobooth. The Canucks send their mascot Finn. There are businesses who donate raffle baskets, There is no other financial support.

5. IF THE AMOUNT REQUESTED FROM THE CITY OF BURNABY IS NOT FULLY GRANTED, WHAT WOULD YOU DO TO MAKE UP THE DIFFERENCE AND/OR HOW WOULD YOU PROCEED DIFFERENTLY?

The financial success or failure of the tournament is not dependent upon the grant, but girls hockey is. By supporting RDT this will put this all female tournament on par of the support for the Pat Quinn Classic. PQC is for the first time ever just now reaching the same size as this volunteer organized tournament. The grant will enable the tournament to become more profitable, making it possible to afford ice rentals where presently access to ice is limited by arena resources in the City of Burnaby, as well as within BMHA. It will allow for development of players through hiring & retention of high caliber females serving as coaches & role models for girls. It will allow for the growth of female hockey for the residents of Burnaby. While attracting more Burnaby girls to the game, higher registration will give us the critical mass needed to offer recreational & rep hockey at all age groups, like this already exists for integrated/boys hockey.

While the tournament doesn't alrady start until November 11th, we already know it will be a success being that it is sold out. The greater purpose is to grow female hockey. In Bunraby already female hockey has grown from 90 to 230 players with the hard work and dedication of the current directors. The goal of the female program (funded by tournament proceeds) is to grow to 400 players and have at least one recreational and one representative team at eahc age group.
