3.1 Delegation: The Society to End Homelessness in Burnaby - Re: Various Updates

Speaker: Carol-Ann Flanagan, Executive Director

Carol-Ann Flanagan, Executive Director, The Society to End Homelessness in Burnaby, appeared before Council and provided statistics and information on the Extreme Weather Heat & Cold, and Homeless Count 2023 in Burnaby.

The speaker advised that homeless count took place in Burnaby on the evening of March 7 and through day on March 8, 2023, and from 2020 to 2023, there was 69% increase (total 209 people), out of which 77 individuals were unsheltered.

In conclusion, Ms. Flanagan advised that there is an undercount of those experiencing homelessness, and there were other various factors that have impacted the accuracy. The speaker recognized all outreach workers and volunteers who helped capture data and who made this count possible.

Council thanked Ms. Flanagan and all volunteers for their hard work and for their valuable contribution to the community.

- b) the Burnaby Housing Authority Business Plan as set out in Attachment 2 of the same report.

THAT the General Manager Planning and Development be authorized to represent the City on the submission to the Inspector of Municipalities, including signing the cover letter for the submission package and corresponding with the Inspector of Municipalities regarding the submission.

THAT staff be directed to include the following items in the draft 2024-2028 Financial Plan, for the purpose of launching and operationalizing the Burnaby Housing Authority:

- a) Planned contribution of \$2.0 million per year in years 2024 to 2028, funded from the Operating Housing Reserve for Burnaby Housing Authority operating expenses;
- b) Planned contribution of \$475,000 in 2024, funded from the Community Benefit Bonus Affordable Housing Reserve for Burnaby Housing Authority capital expenditures; and
- c) Planned financing of \$100 million over the years from 2024 to 2028, funded from the Community Benefit Bonus Affordable Housing reserve for Burnaby Housing Authority affordable housing projects.

6.4 REVISED REZ #22-32 - BURNABY LAKE HEIGHTS MASTER PLAN PHASE 1 - BAINBRIDGE URBAN VILLAGE COMMUNITY PLAN

Mayor Hurley advised that Council on September 25, 2023, already adopted a report regarding REZ #22-32. However, the <u>RM5r Multiple Family Residential District</u> is being added to the bylaw for consistency with the proposed rezoning as indicated in the original Council report.

The General Manager Planning and Development submitted a report seeking Council authorization to forward this application to a future Public Hearing. The purpose of the proposed zoning bylaw amendment is to permit the construction of two mid-rise residential apartment buildings atop live-work units and underground parking in accordance with Phase 1 of the Burnaby Lake Heights Master Plan (REZ #22-15).

- b. The advancement of the Burnaby Lake Heights Conceptual Master Plan (Rezoning Reference #22-15) to Final Adoption prior to, or concurrent with, the subject rezoning application.
- c. The deposit of sufficient monies including a 4% Engineering Administration Fee to cover the costs of all services necessary to serve the site and the completion of a servicing agreement covering all requisite services. All services are to be designed to City standards and constructed in accordance with the Engineering Design. One of the conditions for the release of occupancy permits will be the completion of all requisite services.
- d. The installation of all electrical, telephone and cable servicing, and all other wiring underground throughout the development (as well as underground switching and transformer/service boxes in town centre locations), and to the point of connection to the existing service where sufficient facilities are available to serve the development.
- e. The undergrounding of overhead wiring abutting the site.
- f. The submission of an undertaking to remove all existing improvements from the subject site and cease all temporary uses prior to Building Permit issuance.
- g. The completion of the subdivision.
- h. The dedication of any rights-of-way deemed requisite.
- i. The granting of any necessary statutory rights-of-way, easements and/or covenants in accordance with Section 3.11 of this report.
- j. The registration of a Housing Covenant and Housing Agreement.
- k. The submission of a suitable on-site Stormwater Management System, the deposit of sufficient monies for its provision, and the granting of a Section 219 Covenant to guarantee its provision and continuing operation.
- I. Compliance with the City's Groundwater Management for Multi-Family Development guidelines.
- m. The submission of a geotechnical and groundwater study.

- n. The execution of an indemnity agreement by the developer saving the City harmless from all liability associated with this development in relation to its geotechnical and hydrological (including any potential contaminated groundwater) impacts to surrounding infrastructure and other nearby development.
- o. The submission of a suitable Solid Waste and Recycling Plan.
- p. The review of on-site loading facilities.
- q. The provision of enhanced car wash stalls and an adequately sized and appropriately located garbage handling and recycling material holding space and a commitment to implement the recycling provisions.
- r. The provision of facilities for cyclists in accordance with this report.
- s. The design and provision of units adaptable to persons with disabilities, the provision of customized hardware and cabinet work being subject to the sale or lease of the unit to a disabled person.
- t. Compliance with Council-adopted sound criteria.
- u. Compliance with the guidelines for underground parking for visitors.
- v. The submission of a Green Building Plan and Energy Benchmarking.
- w. The submission of a detailed Comprehensive Sign Plan.
- x. The submission of a Site Disclosure Statement and resolution of any resultant conditions.
- y. The deposit of the applicable Parkland Acquisition Charge.
- z. The deposit of the applicable School Site Acquisition Charge.
- aa. The deposit of the applicable GVS & DD Sewerage Charge.
- bb. The deposit of the applicable Regional Water Cost Charge.
- cc. The deposit of the applicable Regional Transportation Development Cost Charge.
- dd. The submission of a written undertaking to distribute area plan notification forms, prepared by the City, with disclosure statements; and, to post area plan notification signs, also prepared by the City, on the development site and in the sales office in prominent and visible locations prior to Third Reading, or at the time marketing for the subject development commences, whichever is

first, and remain posted for a period of one year, or until such time that all units are sold, whichever is greater.

7.5 PLANNING AND DEVELOPMENT COMMITTEE - RE: PARKING AND TRANSPORTATION DEMAND MANAGEMENT PLAN IN THE TRANSIT-ORIENTED DEVELOPMENT AREAS

The Planning and Development Committee submitted a report requesting approval to establish a Transit Oriented Development (TOD) Parking and Transportation Demand Management (TDM) policy for sites within 800m of SkyTrain Stations.

Councillor Gu introduced the following amendment to the motion provided in the report:

THAT the Transit-Oriented Development Parking and Transportation Demand Management Policy for multi-family residential strata and purpose-built rental within 800m of a SkyTrain Station as outlined in Section 4.0 of the report dated September 11, 2023 be approved as amended to include:

- Update residential parking rates in TOD Areas to adjust for dwelling unit types and/or distance from SkyTrain stations:
 - a. Multi-Family (Strata) residential rate updated from an overall 1.0 parking stalls per dwelling unit to a rate of <u>0.30 or 0.35</u> parking stalls for studio or 1-bedroom units, and <u>0.75 or 0.80</u> parking stalls for 2+ bedroom units based on proximity to a SkyTrain station; and,
 - b. Purpose-built (market) rental updated from an overall 0.5 parking space per dwelling unit to <u>0.15</u> parking stalls for studio or 1-bedroom units, <u>0.45</u> parking stalls for 2+ bedroom units, and 0 for non-market rental;
- 2. Adopt TDM initiatives. Require mandatory TDM incentives that includes transit subsidy and car share memberships/credits for all residential dwelling units in new buildings, and work with carshare operators to increase the ratio of carshare vehicles to units from 1:100 towards other leading municipalities' requirements;
- Adopt Bicycle Infrastructure requirements in current Bylaws to encourage bicycle usage for residents;
- 4. Require Wayfinding through current Bylaws in new developments to guide access to sustainable transportation;
- 5. Staff be directed to review and update the Payment-in-Lieu of Parking Bylaw in Transit Oriented Development areas and establish mandatory Transportation Demand Management strategies in commercial zoning (e.g. office, retail) that reflect Burnaby's mode-split targets and climate action goals; and

6. Staff be directed to allow an interim amendment to the existing commercial parking reduction allowances in Transit Oriented Development areas until an updated Payment-in-Lieu of Parking Bylaw is implemented, that would allow an additional 20% reduction below minimum requirements to be waived at \$45,000 per stall, with the revenue dedicated towards active transportation infrastructure;

THAT staff be directed to review the legislative framework for parking stalls within strata buildings to be held as unassigned, common property as a potential solution that would support flexible and effective use of parking spaces that benefits all residents of the building, and report back to Council with recommendations.

Our thoughts continue to be with her family, friends and fellow RCMP members and staff. It is important for us to reflect and continue to support one another as we move forward.

Last month, the RCMP's Ride to Remember came to Burnaby.

The Ride to Remember honours RCMP members across Canada who have lost their lives in the line of duty.

It was a poignant reminder of the sacrifices police officers make to keep our community safe every day.

And it was a touching show of love and support for those who continue to work through their grief.

Constable Yang will not be forgotten in Burnaby - her legacy will live on through the actions that we take to ensure our community is safe for everyone.

And I thank you all for continuing to remember and honour Constable Yang as we move forward.
