Dear Fellow-Members:

Although it is nearly five months since the founding meeting of the Association was held, the Board of Directors and the Executive Committee have been busy tending to the many items of business involved in the turning over of Heritage Village to the Association. As our constitution states, one of the functions of the Association is to administer and operate the Village. With this in mind, then, we have been trying to select the right person to assume the position of Executive Director of the Village. Mr. P. A. (Tony) Scott has been appointed and will take charge of the daily administrative and operational details of the Village, thus permitting the Executive and Board of Directors of the Association to handle the broad policy matters that will result in an effective and efficient operation on behalf of the citizens of the municipality.

The Burnaby Centennial '71 Committee had originally hoped to turn the project over to the Municipal Council in early December. They were unable to complete this transaction until January 31st. as they wanted to complete the business incurred in the construction of Phase 1. Mayor Prittie accepted the project from Mr. Barrington, thanked the Centennial Committee for its efforts and presented certificates of Merit to persons deeply involved in the bringing of the Village to its present state.

In February, the Municipal Council turned the Village over to the Parks & Recreation Commission and directed that the balance of funds from the Centennial Committee be passed along to the C.P.M.A. and that the Commission and the Association develop a workable policy for the continuous operation of the Village. This meeting took place on March 22nd. at which time we discussed the Association's budget as it relates to the grant we will be receiving from the Commission and other matters involving liaison between the Association and the Commission.

While we have been searching for a permanent Executive Director to assume responsibility for the Village, Mr. Balfour has kindly been acting as the Interim Director of Heritage Village. With the assistance of Mr. D. Lott, he has been able to keep the building program on a steady course with a May Official Opening in mind. They have apportioned the funds available in the Loan Program to the various areas and are diligently overseeing the completion of the work. The Print Shop is ready, the Blacksmith and Foundry are ready, the Gazebo has been built, a sprinkler system is to be installed, the General Store is on the way to being ready, plans for the Ice Cream Parlour, the Gatehouse and a Burnaby 'memorabilia area' are nearly finished and ready to be worked on.

Mrs. Killip, our first Vice President has been working in a voluntary position as the acting curator since Mrs. D. Norman left the Village at the end of January. She has been checking the collections, tidying the Manor House and working on the membership. The Association sponsored a booth in the mall at Brentwood for their 4th. Annual Charity Days in mid-February. Although we didn't purposefully go out to sell things and raise money like the other organizations there, our booth was well received by shoppers and again we were able to get the name and the idea before the public. Mrs. Zimmerman arranged for the volunteers to staff the booth on each of the three days, and Mrs. Killip displayed a small collection of artifacts.

The first Annual Meeting of the Century Park Museum Association will be held on Tuesday, April 25th. at 8 p.m. in the Cowan Hall. Circle the date on your calendar and plan to attend. As outlined in the constitution, this meeting will elect the Executive Committee and the Board of Directors for 1972 and may consider amendments to the constitution as well as other business that members might wish to discuss.
