OFF SEASON ACTIVITIES KEEP VILLAGE HUMMING

It is reassuring to know that Heritage Village facilities are being used more and more as functioning community program settings during the 'closed season'.

Attendance at the <u>First Sundays in Burnaby</u> program in Century Park has brought a rewarding number of people to view the Village. This program will continue on the first Sunday of the month through February, March and April with the Village being open for guided tours between 2 p.m. and 3:30 p.m.

School programs, beginning on Feb. 4 and finishing during the week of May 26, will be carried out on three levels: a general tour for intermediate students; A Child's World, 1910 for grades 2 and 3 only; Some Like It Hot, Some Like It Cold for grades 4 and 5.

As part of Century Park's community awareness program "Eye/I in Burnaby" Heritage Village is offering a five-part series which will explore some aspects of Eurnaby's development. Talks will be given on Feb. 4,11,18 and 25 and a tour of some buildings from Eurnaby's past will leave the Village lot at 1:30 p.m. on Sunday, Feb. 16. The Tuesday sessions will be held in the Village Church at 8 p.m.Admission will be 75¢ for adults, 50¢ for students with cards.

The art of lace making will come alive in the Villace on Feb. 13 and continue, for six weekly lessons, until March 20. Mrs. M. Oddstad, of the Vancouver Lace Club, will instruct this course. Registration fee - 410.00. Material kit - approximately \$10.00.

Railroad enthusiasts will be happy to learn about the five-session program on railroading and model construction which will be held in the Ice Cream Parlour of the Village starting on Wednesday, March 12, at 8 p.m. Admission will be 75¢ a session or \$3.50 for the series.

VILLAGE CHTAINS CHINESE DISPLAY

Without a doubt the most exciting new display to meet the eyes of the public on opening day will be the Chinese herbalist's shop. This display will help fulfill a goal to devote more space to the varied cultural heritage of the Lower Mainland.

With the aid of a \$5,000 grant from the Department of the Provincial Secretary the Village was able to purchase the six tons of artifacts and natural medicines from a Victoria herbalist's shop which was opened for business in the 1880's.

The Original Burnaby building which housed Whitechurch Hardware is also taking on a new lease on life with the help of four L.I.P. workers and will be presented as a Cabinet Maker's Shop.

And the dentist is on the move again in the Village. This year his office will be found in a new display area around the corner of the Deer Lake Auto Shop.

The Village continues to change, to grow and to become more interesting all the time.
