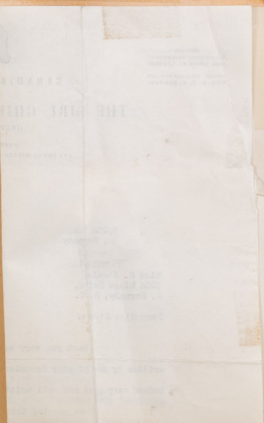

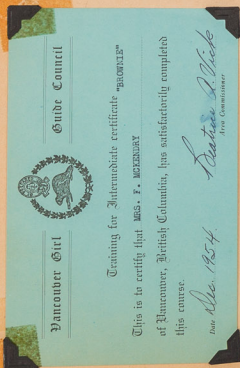

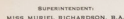

Guides to Play Important Role

Girl Guiding in the future must place increasing emphasis on true citizenship, L. J. Wallace, deputy provincial secretary, said Friday at annual meeting of B.C. Council Girl Guides Association.

He said the sign of a healthy community and nation is the citizen's willingness to give public service and participate in activities.

"The communities of our province desperately need your excellent active leadership and your leadership," he told delegates. "If you fail to contribute, our province and our nation will be poorer because of this."

Looking to the future, when it is anticipated population in B.C. in 1970 will be 2,200,000, he warned that Girl Guiding must step up its pace by training more leaders and increasing the lives of many thousands more girls.

In helping with education of the whole province, he stressed that for citizenship, Guiding will play an important role.

"Canada's welfare is not to be built on science, industry or politics, but on goodness and justice," said Mr. Wallace, pointing to the role of the Guiding movement as part of the important part in adult activities of citizenship and community.

"It is important that youth be given a part, even a small one, in the decisions which control their lives."

"This is tremendously important for the future of Guiding and I am pleased to have that this has been stressed in your report."

Mr. Wallace expressed his belief in order to increase the thoughts of youth will extend the value of education and understanding between youth and adults.

The Story Of Girl Guiding

The second age group in our Movement are young girls ranging from the ages of eleven to sixteen. They are called Girl Guides—the name "Guides" being chosen from an Indian frontier regiment, the Queen's Own Corps of Guides, famous native soldiers who were noted for their adaptability of self reliance.

In the Guide Company, the girls have a wider field for individual initiative and they quickly learn to assume more responsibility.

"The Patrol replaces the Brownie Six and the patrol leader plays an important part in planning camping activities. As a member of the "Court of Honor" (the executive of the Company) it is the patrol leader's duty to express the views of her patrol and in turn, to report to the patrol the decisions and plans made at the Court of Honor.

This pattern is intended to stress not only individual development and intelligent co-operation but also to afford some experiences in carrying out group activities.

As in Brownies, graded tests and proficiency badges are designed to make the girls accept in general qualifications.

The leader of the Guide Company is a Captain and her assistant a "Lieutenant."

IN BRITISH COLUMBIA

Guide Membership Up Eight Per Cent

With an overall membership of 25,041 in 1959, B.C. Council Guides, Girls and Boy Scouts of Canada, showed an increase of eight per cent over the previous year.

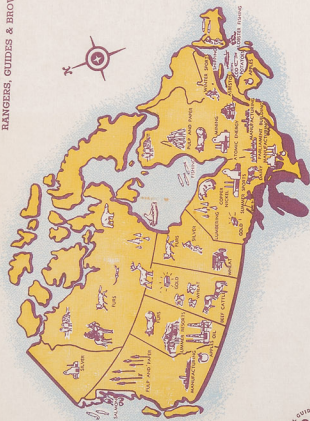

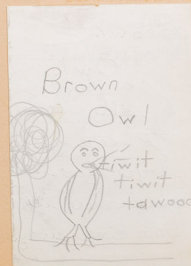

Survey Probes Aims, Standards of Guiding

Some Girl Guides, or their mothers, think there could be new materials and styles in uniforms.

Some think there is too much emphasis on the Gold Owl test.

Some think there should be fewer individual Guides going about with the money saved spent on bringing trained leaders in Canada.

These are some of the findings in a province-wide survey made by a special committee of the Girl Guides Association of B.C.

The committee set out to find out if the Girl Guide program is in keeping with the needs of the present day, and whether the high standards of the association is being maintained.

JUNIOR TREAS
The survey, carrying out the findings was these: "Girl Guide Life Looks Forward" brought out approval from the leaders, department heads, companies and parents and girls in whom 3,323 questionnaires were received.

Some people questioned suggested that there might be too much emphasis on the terms, "badge hunting," and "badges" which were used in some replies.

We need good understanding of why and what a badge is for and not so much about how many points or marks are needed in order to earn a badge.

Specific proposals were suggested for more definite professional training and sewing in the Guide program, more materials for the new Brownie program.

PROGRAM IDEAS
A recommendation that program ideas, suited to the age of Brownies, Guides and saved with all leaders, should be made part of the program.

The recommendation about new trained leaders from abroad already has been made. From time to time a Girl Scout trainer was in Canada in 1962 and two Japanese were here in June. There will be one from the United States visiting Canada in 1963.

In the uniform, the association points out that it always has to consider the

needs of those who can't afford more expensive uniforms and the policy is to keep costs as low as possible.

However, there is something new in the air. For the first time there are official shops, although they are not compulsory. They are available in brown or black, according to the locality.

INTANGIBLES
Many replies stated that the intangible and most important side of guiding consisted of loyalty, honesty, service and friendship should not be neglected.

Always vitally important, these qualities are more so today than ever before," was one of the findings.

Because of these qualities, it was felt that Guiding did have world importance.

In the words of Dame Louise P. Whitney, director of the World Bureau of the Girl Guide Association, Guides believe that "membership of the World Association entitles all girls to be treated as equals in the same peace because of a national Guide organization must be open to all classes, creeds, races and nationalities."
