# PATROL PORTFOLIO CHART No. 9.

## DIGGING

Learn to dig properly **BEFORE** you go to camp.

No. 1. It is equally correct to grip the handle of a spade with either the left or right hand nearest to the blade, but the grip should be from behind with a firm grasp. Bend well over your work with your weight on the spade.

No. 2. Getting down to it, note the use of the knee behind the handle of the spade.

No. 3. If the spade is old and blunt use a slanting cut like this. Note the grip by the hand nearest the blade, both hand and foot being used to press on the slanting cut. This is a very useful method in cutting tough turf.

No. 4. The correct method for cutting turf with the blade towards you.

No. 5. The second position in cutting turf.  
No. 6. Then lever upwards with the spade.

No. 7. Scout knives like this are useful, note the feet well apart to avoid danger in cutting.

No. 8. It is far easier to cut and roll turf with assistance but this method should be avoided. Note the spade being driven into the assistant's fingers, and compare this with No. 9.

No. 9. Assistant's hands well apart.

No. 10. In removing the earth after the turf for a

camp fire-place it is a good plan to use an old groundsheet or strong piece of brown paper like this; the earth can then be carried right away, and is not trodden in while cooking.

No. 11. ALWAYS clean your spade after use, and if the ground is sticking during use as well. A piece of wood cut like this is the best method, NEVER use a knife.

No. 12. Hit the earth down well before replacing turf using the flat-back of the spade like this.

### The Aims of the Girl Guides

The Aim of the Girl Guide Association is to develop good citizenship among girls, by forming their character; to train them in habits of observation, discipline and self-reliance; to inculcate loyalty and thoughtfulness for others; to teach them services useful to the public, and handicrafts useful to themselves; to promote their physical development, and to render them capable of keeping good homes, and of bringing up children in the right way.

The method of training is to give to the girls healthy activities which, while giving them pleasure, will afford them a course of education outside the school, along four principal lines:

Character and intelligence are taught through the Guide Law and Promise, the Patrol system, woodcraft games, etc.; services for others and citizenship, through daily good turns, organized public service, etc.

The Movement is designed to help parents and teachers in their task of education. It is absolutely non-political, non-class, and non-sectarian.

The Motto is "Be Prepared," and they are being prepared by their discipline and training to help themselves and other people.

GIRL GUIDING had its inception in Vancouver in 1911 when the first company was started by Mrs. Don Munday (then Miss P. James). Simultaneously Miss Amy Leigh formed a company in Burnaby. These two companies lighted the torch of Guiding here, and struggled valiantly along, as pioneers always must do, believing that they had something very worth while to give to Vancouver girls.

How well their faith has been justified, is proved by the fact that there are now, in Greater Vancouver, 1,686 Brownies, Guides and Rangers, in charge of 144 Guiders.
