1. Canada Power Co to supply light and power within the Municipality at a fair and reasonable rate.
2. The Reeve suggested the By Law should contain such provisions that the public living in the Municipality along the right of way should be supplied with light at a cost not greater than that at present in force in the City of Vancouver.
3. That applicants living off the main lines be charged the same rate plus a percentage.
4. That applications for light by a given number of people within a given distance having been made the company would be bound to give them light.
5. The Reeve stated that he had prepared a memorandum of several By Laws, a copy of which was placed on each Councillor's desk and which are as follows:
6. Bylaws for revising and consolidating the laws of the Municipality.
7. For regulating the meetings of the Council and the general conduct of business.

9. For enforcing the By Laws of the Municipality, by fines or imprisonment.

12. For regulating the public lighting of the Municipality.
13. For preventing persons causing or permitting water rubbish or obnoxious or offensive matter to collect around the premises.
14. For regulating the appointment and removal of officers and servants and the duties, conduct and remuneration of such servants.
15. For accepting purchasing and holding real property for the purposes of public parks and for making rules and regulations respecting same and laying rates within the municipality.
