

Monday, April 7th, 1952.

A regular meeting of the Municipal Council was held at the Municipal Hall Edmonds, on Monday, April 7th, 1952, at 7:35 P.M.

Present: Acting-Reeve MacSorley in the Chair, Councillors Armstrong, Charlton, Drummond, Isherwood, Philips and Wilks.

Moved by Councillor Philips and seconded by Councillor Isherwood "That the minutes of the previous meeting be adopted as written, and confirmed."

Carried Unanimously.

Burnaby Diamond Jubilee Association wrote expressing appreciation for the grant made by the Council toward the activities of the Association. Moved by Councillor Isherwood and seconded by Councillor Armstrong "That the letter be received."

Carried Unanimously.

Children of the Empire (Junior Branch) I.O.)E. wrote expressing appreciation to the Council for the use of the Council Chambers granted to their Organization during the past year. Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Wilks "That the communication be received."

Carried Unanimously.

Messrs. Russell and DuMoulin wrote requesting that the following described properties be rezoned to "Heavy Industrial":

- (a) Lots 2 and 3, Block 1, J.L. 40, Plan 3048.
- (b) Lot 2, Block 2, J.L. 40, Plan 3048.
- (c) Part (3.256 acres more or less) Block 10, J.L. 10, Plan 3054 as shown outlined red on Sketch 10526.
- (d) 8.84 acre portion known as Block 13, J.L. 40, Plan 3048.

Moved by Councillor Isherwood and seconded by Councillor Wilks "That the application be received and referred to the Town Planning Commission."

Carried Unanimously.

South Burnaby Board of Trade wrote requesting that the Council agree to place a yellow "No Parking" sign on the curb at a point between McKay and Pioneer Avenues on the south side of Kingsway to make possible the location of a mail box at such a point.

Moved by Councillor Isherwood and seconded by Councillor Charlton "That the letter be received and that the request of the South Burnaby Board of Trade be endorsed."

Carried Unanimously.

Fraser Valley Municipal Association wrote giving notification of the regular quarterly meeting of their Association to be held at the New Westminster City Hall on Wednesday evening, April 9, 1952.

Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Wilks "That the communication be received."

Carried Unanimously.

2 J. S. Ramage wrote concerning the main entrance to the Burnaby General Hospital advising they were the owners of store buildings on Sunset Street and that at the time of building the stores it was understood Sunset Street would be the main entrance to the Hospital but that recently rumours had been circulated that the original plans were being changed and that the main entrance would be located some where else. Moved by Councillor Wilks and seconded by Councillor Isherwood "That the communication be received and the inquiry made therein be referred to the Burnaby General Hospital authorities."

Carried Unanimously.

3 B. C. Electric Railway Company Limited wrote with reference to discussions held between representatives of their Company and of the Council concerning the alteration of zone boundaries in the vicinity of Broadway and Sperling Avenue advising that application had been made to the Public Utilities Commission and had been approved covering an overlap zone to be put into effect for the area on Sperling Avenue between the Sperling Avenue School (Adair Street) and Broadway. The Company advised the effect of this overlap zone would be to leave the present Zone 1 boundary in its present location for people travelling from the west and to extend the zone boundary from Broadway to Adair Street for people travelling from the east.

Moved by Councillor Wilks and seconded by Councillor Isherwood "That the communication be received and the contents thereof be referred to the Lozells Ratepayers' Association."

Carried Unanimously.

Westridge Ratepayers' Association wrote confirming their application for rezoning of certain lands in D.L. 215 and 216 from "Heavy Industrial" to "Residential" which was presented to the Council on March 24th, 1952, when a delegation attended the Council meeting.

Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Wilks, "That the communication be received and referred to the Town Planning Commission."

Carried Unanimously.

C. G. Brown wrote referring to a previous application for rezoning of property on the north side of Kingsway between Salisbury and Griffiths Avenues from "Commercial" to "Residential", requesting that reconsideration be given to their application in view of the heavy industrial development in these blocks taking up all but two lots. The applicant advised it was possible an undesirable business concern might locate on the remaining two lots and it was their request that the entire area be rezoned for residential purposes.

Moved by Councillor Philps and seconded by Councillor Drummond "That the application be received and referred to the Town Planning Commission for consideration and recommendation."

Carried Unanimously.

Burnaby Junior Chamber of Commerce wrote extending an invitation to His Worship the Reeve and members of the Council to attend the finals for Vancouver, North Vancouver, Burnaby and New Westminster Junior Chamber of Commerce oratorical competition to be held at Burnaby South High School on Wednesday evening, April 23rd. Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Charlton "That the invitation be received and accepted."

Carried Unanimously.

Peter A. Scuffie wrote requesting that consideration be given to the rezoning of property described 13.18 acres being Lot 1 of Block 3, D.L. 78 from "Residential" to "Heavy Industrial".

Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Wilks "That the application be received and referred to the Town Planning Commission for consideration and recommendation."

Carried Unanimously.

Canadian National Institute for the Blind submitted application for the annual grant from the Council toward the operation of their Institute.

Moved by Councillor Wilks and seconded by Councillor Armstrong "That the application be received and referred to the committee on grants."

Carried Unanimously.

Trans-Canada Highway System Association wrote requesting co-operation and endorsement of the Council to their efforts to have the Dominion Government construct a military highway between Winnipeg and Vancouver, enclosing copies of correspondence received from various organizations and municipal councils between these two points in support of their endeavours.

Moved by Councillor Isherwood and seconded by Councillor Armstrong "That the correspondence be received."

Carried Unanimously.

Burnaby Hospital Society wrote requesting that consideration be given to the clearing and grading of Ingleton Avenue between Elmwood and Kincaid Streets in order that necessary levels may be ascertained before grading and landscaping Hospital grounds.

The Engineer submitted report on the application of the Burnaby Hospital Society advising that the estimated cost of clearing the portion of Ingleton Avenue concerned would be \$2,040.00.

Moved by Councillor Wilks and seconded by Councillor Armstrong "That the communication of the Hospital Society and the Engineer be received and that the Engineer be authorized to proceed with this work."

Carried Unanimously.

Sanitary Inspector submitted report on application of N. Micholls for permission to keep livestock on his property described Block 2, D.L. 176SE $\frac{1}{2}$ , advising that upon inspection the property had been found suitable for the keep of not more than 10 hogs, 20 chickens, 20 turkeys, 4 geese and 5 ducks, on condition that the hog pens be constructed in accordance with Provincial Health regulations and that the said pens be erected at the far south end of the property.

Moved by Councillor Armstrong and seconded by Councillor Charlton "That the report of the Sanitary Inspector be received and the application be granted in accordance with the conditions as laid down in the Sanitary Inspector's report."

Carried Unanimously.

Sanitary Inspector submitted report on application of Charles B. Brown for permission to keep 300 small birds on Block 6, D.L. 74SE $\frac{1}{2}$ , advising that upon inspection the property had been found suitable for the keep of 300 budgerigars.

Moved by Councillor Wilks and seconded by Councillor Armstrong "That the report be received and the application be granted."

Carried Unanimously.

Sanitary Inspector submitted report on the application of Bing Chong to keep 300 chickens for wholesale and retail purposes on Lot 1, Block 3, D.L. 120, advising that as it was indicated by the applicant to kill birds on this site from time to

time it would be necessary to construct a proper killing house.  
 Moved by Councillor Isherwood and seconded by Councillor Wilks "That the report be received and the application be not granted."

Carried Unanimously.

The Council Conciliation Committee submitted report advising the following conditions of employment had been agreed upon by the Conciliation Committees of the Civic Employees Union and the Municipal Council for the year 1952 as a result of negotiations concluded on April 4th, 1952. The Committee recommended adoption of this report.

1. Job Classification

It was agreed to adopt the Job Classification contained in the "Peterson Report."

2. Wages

It was agreed that the wage schedule contained in the "Peterson Report" based on a 190 Cost of Living Index be adopted for the year 1952. Schedule of wages following.

It was agreed that all employees employed on December 31st, 1951 would not be paid a less amount than the amount paid in the month of December 1951 as adjusted by the Cost of Living Index paid in the month of January 1952.

3. Mileage Rate

It was agreed to adopt the rate of ten cents per mile with the following provisions:

- (a) That a survey would be made by the Personnel Department of all employees' cars now being used for Municipal Work, and only those cars actually needed for the service of the Municipality would be approved.
- (b) That before an employee received approval for his vehicle to be used in the service of the Municipality, that employee would be required to furnish satisfactory evidence to the Personnel Department that his vehicle concerned was properly insured for business purposes.

4. Clothing Allowance

It was agreed that rubber boots and suits would be provided to permanent employees requiring same, owing to the nature of their work, but employees would only receive same upon certification of the Municipal Engineer that the said clothing was necessary for the performance of the assigned duties of the respective employee.

5. London Life Group Insurance

It was agreed that the London Life Group Insurance benefits would be increased from \$1,000.00 to \$2,000.00 per employee without additional cost to the employee.

6. Accumulative Sick-Leave Payments

It was agreed that all employees terminating their services with the Corporation, either by death, retirement or superannuation after completion of five years' service, shall be entitled to receive in cash the balance of the sick leave standing to their credit. Provided, however, that all employees who voluntarily terminate their employment or who are discharged for just cause would only be entitled to receive in cash the balance of the sick leave standing to their credit after they have fifteen or more years of continuous employment, such sick leave to be based on the last five years of employment.

It was agreed that the accumulative sick leave due Russell Shea would be paid.

7. Employees Excluded from the Union

It was agreed that employees occupying the following listed positions are not "employees" within the meaning of the Industrial Conciliation Act and were therefore excluded from union membership:

Town Planning Commission submitted report on the application of Mr. Frank Walsh to have Lots 10 and 11, Block 12, D.L. 122 rezoned from "Residential" to "Commercial" advising that the Commission are not prepared to recommend such a change but would recommend that the property be rezoned to "Gasoline Service Station" zone.

Mr. Walsh appeared and requested an interview.

Mr. Walsh advised that the property in question was useless to him for residential purposes being surrounded with Commercial areas and road allowances, advising that in his opinion the recommendation that the property be rezoned for "Gasoline Service Station" purposes was unnecessarily restrictive. Mr. Walsh advised that the erection of buildings on this property was not considered to be the foundation of a hazardous condition since there was considerable land between the property line and the road allowance of Hastings Street, giving clear vision from all angles.
