REPORT OF THE CENTENNIAL COMMITTEE

Official Dress

It is increasingly obvious that members of the Centennial Committee will attend many public events between now and September, 1967, in a representative capacity. Three or four such occasions have already passed by and - as the celebration events progress, these will Increase.

It was noticeable on an occasion such as the arrival of the train Dunrobin to Burnaby that the Committee's representatives would have been more immediately recognizable as Centennial representatives if the available Provincial Centennial uniform had been worn. Similarly, when Mr. Patey, the Co-Ordinator, interviews people, or is interviewed in turn, it is felt that he should wear the Centennial blazer.

Your Committee has given considerable thought to this matter and very strongly recommends that each member of the Committee, including Mr. Patey and his Secretary, should be provided with the official blazer and slacks or skirt. It is expected that members of the Committee will be filling speaking engagements and that this uniformity would enhance the Committee's appearance on all occasions and would befit the dignity of the Centennial.

The blazers are wine coloured with the official Centennial emblem on the breast pocket; the slacks and skirts are black. Each member of Burnaby's Centennial Committee would be further identified by a "Burnabee".

The uniforms have the official sanction of the B. C. Centennial Committee and the Provincial officials always wear them. Many other local community committees are similarly attired, according to the suppliers.

The cost for each ensemble is \$52.50 (Including tax) and the total expenditure would be \$630.00.
