REPORT

MUNICIPAL MANAGER submitted report No.63/ ω on the matters listed below as Items (1) to (7), either providing the information shown or recommending the courses of action indicated for the reasons given:

(1) <u>Dusiness Tax Assessment Roll</u>

The Local Court of Revision dealing with the Business Tax Assessment Roll has completed its proceedings and the 1968 Numbers 1 and 2 Supplementary Business Tax Rolls plus the 1969 Business Tax Assessment Rolls have been confirmed and authoriticated.

There were no appeals against either the No. 1 or No. 2,1968 Supplementary Rolls.

There were, however, seven appeals against the 1969 Dusiness Tax Assessment Roll, one of which was allowed.

The figure for the confirmed Dusiness Tax Roll is \$15,917,810.00. The 1969 Dusiness Tax will therefore be \$1,036,800.15.

FRATERNAL ORDER OF EAGLES

On September 23, 1968, the Council directed that the Fraternal Order of Eagles (Durnaby Aerie 3170) be required to:

- (a) Prepare drawings to show adequately how:
 - The Valleyview Community Hall will be reconstructed on the site it owns at the northwest corner of Douglas Road and Halifax Street.
 - (ii) The remainder of the site will be developed.
- (b) Prepare complete plans, for the redevelopment of the buildings so that fire, health, zoning and building regulation details can be properly examined.

On November 20, 1968, plans were received from the F.O.E. which were not satisfactory and, as a consequence, a meeting was held with a representative of the Eagles on December 6,1968. As a result, revised plans were submitted on December 10, 1968 and the Chief Building Inspector has offered the opinion that these plans are satisfactory.

It was being recommended that the bid of \$250.00 from Durnaby Acrie 3170 of the Fraternal Order of Eagles for the purchase of Valleyview Community Hall be accepted.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN MCLEAN, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN HERD:
"That the recommendation of the Manager be adopted."

(3) Lots 9, 10 and 11, D.L. 80 N, Plan 10063, SUD-DIVISION REFERENCE No. 194/68

It was being recommended that the requirements of Section 712(1) of the Municipal Act be waived insofar as they apply to a sub-division covered by the captioned number.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN MCLEAN, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN MERCIER: "That the owner of Lots 9/10/11 of the N½ of D.L. 80, Plan 10063 be exempted from the provisions of Section 712 of the Municipal Act, R.S.B.C. 1960, Chapter 255 in respect of a subdivision of the property described, as shown on a survey plan prepared by R.A. Daxter, B.C. Land Surveyor, and sworn the 18th day of November, 1968."

(4) 1969 Annual Budget - Vancouver-Fraser Park District

The Acministrator of the Vancouver-Fraser Park District has forwarded the proposed Annual Dudget of the District in compliance with Section 783 (1) of the Municipal Act.

This Budget calls for a levy on participating Municipalities of one-half mill in 1969 compared to one-quarter mill that was levied in 1968.

One-half mill, as applied to Durnaby under the distribution basis of the Park District, amount to \$146,737.00.

The letter from the Administrator draws attention to the fact it has been suggested by some members of the goard that they wish to discuss this matter with their respective Councils prior to final adoption of Vancouver-Fraser Park District Annual Budget By-law No. 4, 1969. This By-law was given initial consideration by the Board on November 27, 1968 and has been advanced for approval of the Minister of Recreation and Conservation. It is expected that the By-Law will be presented to the first Board meeting in 1969 for reconsideration and final adoption.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN LORIMER, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN MERCIER: "That Council approve the principle of the Vancouver-Fraser Park District imposing a levy on participating Municipalities of one-half mill to satisfy the financial requirements of the District in 1969 and authorize the inclusion of the sum this millage will raise (approximately \$146,737.00) in the 1969 provisional Budget of the Corporation.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

(5) Interest Rate - Prepayment of Taxes

The Corporation presently allows $4\frac{1}{2}$ percent interest per annum on the prepayment of Jaxes. . one year the rate was 5 percent.

At one time the amounts received from the prepayment of Taxes was important in the financing of 'Municipal operations. This is not so much the case now because of the availability of other means.

The interest rate is applicable from the date of prepayment to June 30th.

Previous experience has shown that the interest rate paid does not have much effect on the amount of prepayments. Nevertheless, all but one of the surrounding municipalities which allow interest on prepaid taxes pay a higher rate than Durnaby.

It was being recommended that the Municipality increase its rate to 5 percent and that the necessary by law be passed to achieve this end.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN HERD, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN DAILLY:
"That the by-law which is the subject of the Managers recommendation be brought forward for initial readings."

(6) Alterations to Recreation Centers

The Parks and Recreation Commission accepted the lowest tender and instructed the Parks Administrator to meet with representatives of L.D.Boyd Construction Limited for the purpose of deleting some of the proposed works to ensure that the amount of \$37,500.00 that was provided in the budget is not over expended.

This has been done and the tender has been reduced to \$36,330.00, which provides for:

- (a) The renovation of the existing caretakers suites to create a lounge, game room and kitchenette.
- (b) Additional storage area.
- (c) New furnace room, staff restroom and office, fire exit and emergency lighting.

 $$\rm accommodate$ Λ room that was to be used to narts and crafts facilities has been deleted.

The Parks and Recreation Commission is recommending that a Contract be entered into with L.B.Boyd Construction Limited for \$36,330.00 to undertake the proposed works.

It was mentioned to Council during consideration of the report from the Manager that the Parks and Recreation Commission plans to abolish the position of caretaker at each of the recreation centers involved.

Some concern was expressed regarding this proposal because it was felt there was a need to retain the functions performed by such persons for the protection of the public property constituting the recreation centers.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN MERCIER, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN LORIMER: 'That consideration of the question of awarding a Contract to L.B.Doyd Construction Limited, as recommended, be deferred until the December 30th moeting and an explanation be provided then of the situation respecting the function of caretakers at recreation centers."

(7) VERDAL - Agreement Covering Public Housing Project
on 15th Avenue

An agreement between the Federal, Provincial, and Municipal Governments respecting the proposed 90-unit Public Housing Project on 15th Avenue was being submitted for authority to execute.

The terms in the agreement are in accordance with past decisions of Council in connection with the matter.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN DAILLY, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN BLAIR"
"That authority be granted to execute the agreement which is
the subject of the above report from the Manager."

MOVED BY ALDERMAN HERD, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN LORIMER: "That the report of the Committee be now adopted."

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

MOVED BY ALDERMAN HERD, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN LORIMER: "That BURNABY PREPAYMENT OF TAXES BY-LAW, 1968 be now read a Third Time."

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

A discussion then took place on the question of Regional Government.

The following is a summary of the items of correspondance which were considered in conjunction with the Council's deliberations on the matter:

(a) A letter dated May 7, 1968 from the Minister of Municipal Affairs to the Chairman of the Regional District of Fraser-Burrard.

That letter indicated the following:

- (1) There are, in fact, two kinds of regions in the Province the 'Metro' region and the Trading Area region. Their respective roles are naturally going to differ, both in character and extent, although they are structurally similar.
- (2) The Regional District of Fraser-Burrard is a ${}^{1}\text{Metro}{}^{1}$ region.
- (3) It has been determined that most of the newer Federal programmes will be operative through a Metro Regional organization. The Provincial Government views the future of a number of its assistance programmes in much the same light; therefore, it is necessary to establish a pliable and effective Metro Regional unit.
- (4) In general terms, the role of this unit should be to undertake those functions which would normally be a Municipal responsibility but which, in the Motropolitan context, cannot be successfully carried out by Municipalities acting on an individual basis.
- (5) The functions which are felt to be basic for the Mctropolitan Regions are:
 - The supply of water on a wholesale basis.
 The disposal of waste materials on a wholesale basis.
 - including both sewage and garbage.
 - (3) The control of air pollutants.
 (4) The transportation framework for the Metro regions, which would include major traffic arteries other than Provincial freeways, and some connection with transit, so that the whole is properly co-ordinated.

(5) The local responsibility for the provision of public hospitals and whatever ambulatory services are required in connection therewith.

(6) Public Housing and the assembly of land, where required for housing and other public purposes.

(7) Regional parks

(8) Libraries and other cultural facilities related to a Metro Region.

(9) Metro or Regional land use planning, which is a necessary requisite in respect of all the foregoing activities.

(10) Public Health Scrvices.

- (11) Certain pooling activities such debenture sales and debt management and a data processing center.
- (6) It is not to be inferred that there could not be other joint activities nor that the Metro regions must enter all the fields at one time.
- (7) The first and primary consideration should be the structure necessary to carry out the functions, with powers being added from time to time as the Metro Regional District becomes equipped for the task.
- (8) There are within the Metro Regions some sparsely populated areas which could not be expected to undertake the responsibility for local government for some indefinite time. Notwithstanding, these areas are to form a part of the Metro center.
- (9) Without departing too far from its Metro character, the Regional District Board may have to assume some minimum local responsibilities for these sparsely populated areas at their expense.
- (b) A Report from Alderman Mercier, details of which where provided in the minutes of the July 22, 1968 Council Meeting.
- (c) <u>A Report from the Municipal Manager</u> offering comments on the submission from Alderman Mercier. This report from the Manager was considered by Council on November 12, 1963.
- (d) Λ copy of a letter dated November 29, 1968 from the Minister of Municipal Affairs to the Chairman of the Greater Vancouver Regional District dealing with Regional Planning and its effect on the Fraser Valley-Lower Mainland Areas.
- (e) Λ report from the Planning Director which was received by Council on December 9, 1968.

The following is a prècis of the remarks made in Council during consideration of the matter at hand:

- (1) The Greater Vancouver Regional District should apprise Council in advance of its reasons for proposing certain actions, including that effecting the budget.
- (2) The opting out feature of the Regional District should be radically altered, otherwise Regional Government will become ineffectual.

- (3) Doth the Greater Vancouver to the Greater Vancouver Water District should be absorbed by the Regional District, although perhaps not immediately.
- (4) There should at least be an outline of the responsibilities of the Greater Vancouver Regional District.
- (5) Minutes of the various meetings of the Greater Vancouver Regional District do not contain reference to many fairly important issues which have been reported through other media.
- (6) Those serving on the Board of the Greater Vancouver Regional District should be elected rather than appointed by the member of Councils.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN HERD, SECONDED BY ALDERMAN DAILLY: 'That the question of Regional Government be referred to the 1969 Council for consideration."
