Following for your information is the report of the Medical Health Officer covering the activities of his Department for the month of July.

MONTHLY REPORT

Dear Sir:

I have the pleasure of submitting a report for this Department for the month of July 1971.

With the increase in the Public Health Inspection staff the Health Department space reached the point where it became necessary to take the Conference Room in as office space. It is regretted that this move was necessary as this room was used by a large number of gencies and other departments as well as our own staff.

Recognizing that camping experience for children is a very valuable experience as it gives them the opportunity of positive leadership and recreational activity and relating closely with other children of the same age, the Health Department has screened and referred 200 children to various camps in the lower mainland. All children referred were children who would benefit from camping experience due to some economic, social or emotional problem in the home. Funds and camperships for this purpose are made possible through the generosity of various community and church organizations. The public health nurses have made referrals also to the very excellent day camp run by the Burnaby Parks and Recreation. Two such programs are the "Summer Magic" for the retarded child, and the "Teens Help the Handicapped" for children with disabilities.

The Health Department continues to operate a regular eye clinic with Dr. P.C. Cody, ophthalmologist, in attendance. The public health nurses refer children from low-income families and those families currently facing unemployment. Application is made to the School Board who underwrite the cost of the prescribed plasses where the family is unable to purchase these themselves.

To control the mosquito infestation, the ravines in the south slope area of Burnaby were sprayed one evening during the month by the Fraser Valley Mosquito Control Board.

The communicable diseases reported during the month were at a low level with 11 cases. Of these there were 6 infectious hepatitis, 3 tuberculosis and 1 each salmonellosis and chickenpox.
