Because this is the first year that statistics have been maintained for these three items, a comparison of the level of activity in 1972 with prior years is not available.

The 1972 report shows an increase in all areas of pound activity. Additional inspectional staff and extended hours of operation for the animal shelter were in effect for approximately the last quarter of the year. Any increase related to this would be offset by the fact that during the seven week Municipal strike the Pound handled emergency calls only.

Increases in the total number of cats and dogs continue to accompany the annual population growth of Burnaby. The presence of more cats and dogs in the Municipality will to some extent always be reflected in the higher number that are picked up dead and destroyed upon owners' requests.

Until late 1970, the Municipal Engineering Department picked up and disposed of a large number of animal carcasses. During the latter part of 1970, this practice was discontinued and all requests to pick up carcasses were referred to the Society.

The number of animals destroyed at owners' requests continues to increase. This is partly due to the expansion of apartment facilities. Because apartments as a general rule do not allow tenants to keep pets in suites, many owners were forced to have them destroyed.

In 1971 and 1972, more people became aware of the free animal adoption and/or destruction service that is offered by the S.P.C.A. Veterinarians traditionally charge a fee when requested to destroy domestic animals.

Enforcement of the Leash Law, as provided for in the Dog Tax and Pound and Animal Regulation Bylaw 1972, is proving to be an asset to the Pound operation. Public opinion of the new bylaw has been favourable with some exceptions concerning cost of female tags. The increased impounding fee for unlicenced dogs appears to provide an incentive to purchase dog tags at an earlier date. The extended hours of patrols, including Saturdays, is generally welcomed by residents. Several compliments endorsing the extra activity of the Pound have been received.

The Chief Licence Inspector advises that the Society for the Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, in his opinion, provided a satisfactory service in 1972.
