QUARTERLY REPORT

Dear Sir,

I have the pleasure of submitting the Quarterly Report for the Health Department covering the months, October, November and December 1974.

The Homecare programme has now completed its first year of operation in Burnaby. The demand for this service on hospital discharge has escalated rapidly. In reviewing the statistics for the past year it is noted that 569 patients were admitted to the programme and a total of 6,085 hospital-bed days have been saved. The result of this programme is the better utilization of hospital beds for acute care patients. The patients too, have been very happy with their early hospital discharge and for the service they have received in their homes.

The demand for the pre-natal programme has also escalated necessitating a move to larger facilities. The classes are now held in the Alpha Junior Secondary School serving the north area and Moscrop Junior Secondary School serving the south. In making this move we have been able to accommodate a larger number of people and have added two classes to the regular programme. In spite of these additional measures there is still a waiting list for admission to the programme.

Another popular programme that is fast growing is the 3-Year Old Clinic. We are now making appointments as far ahead as May 1975. It is possible that upon memoval of the Department to the new West Building that these clinics will be extended.

Miss Sharon Adams joined the staff as Nutritionist in October on a half-time basis.

To cover this very large Municipality Miss Adams is focusing on the areas of greatest need in the time she has at her disposal.

The members of the Environmental Health were visited by a Chief Public Health Inspector from England who had been awarded a fellowship to study community development in Canada and the United States. Mr. Oxley was interested in noise and discussed with various members of the Municipal Staff, the overall question of noise and the origin of the Burnaby Noise or Sound Abatement Law.

Several Public Health Inspectors attended courses during November and December. Mr. E. Anderson attended the Structural Pest Abatement Short Course and Mr. A. Broomfield and Mr. G. Harvey attended a Working Group Oil and Chemical Spill Counter-measures Programme.

There were 227 Communicable Diseases reported during this quarter. This was similar to the same period in 1973. Of this number there were 68 gonorrhea, 44 pediculosis, 33 chickenpox, 15 infectious hepatitis, 11 salmonellosis, 10 mumps, 9 scarlet fever, 6 scables, 5 each tuberculosis and measles and rubella, 4 each diphtheria and conjunctivitis, 3 whooping cough and infectious syphilis and 2 impetigo. Measles and rubella continue to remain at a low level for this time of the year and it is felt that this is due to our immunization programme.
