Dear Sir,

I have the pleasure of submitting the Quarterly Report for the Health Department covering the months, January, February and March 1975.

The demand for evening services by the Health Department is gradually increasing to the point that all pre-natal classes are now held in the evenings, this enables young couples who are working to attend the classes together. Another service that is in great demand is the immunization clinic for adults in the Health Unit Offices held on the second and fourth Tuesday evenings of each month. This clinic has proved far more popular than the day time clinics, for the same reason to accommodate working people. The evening child health centre is growing more slowly as this is not the most convenient time for young children to attend, however for parents who are unable to come at any other time because of their working hours this fills a real need and children can attend who would otherwise be unable to do so. Also the public health nurses are finding it necessary at times to make home visits and phone calls in the evenings to contact parents who are otherwise absent during the day. A new service in the form of a breast feeding clinic has commenced and is held at the Kingsway West Child Health Centre, situated at the West Burnaby United Church and held once monthly. The object is to encourage and help mothers who are breast feeding their new born babies and to assist them with any difficulties they may encounter.

Two members of the staff presented papers at a Community Care meeting held in February. This meeting was attended by various Officials from Victoria, operators and staff of various personal care homes, and representatives from the Burnaby Health Department, the Burnaby Department of Human Resources, the Burnaby General Hospital and other interested community citizens. It is hoped that from this meeting there will be more coordination and integration of services.

Mrs. Carmel Clevenson was appointed Public Health Nurse replacing Mrs. Janet Olsen who resigned from the staff. Mrs. Clevenson is a graduate of the University of Calfornia in Los Angeles.

Public Health Inspectors attended various courses; in February, three inspectors attended the Canadian Restaurant Association Food Handlers Course in New Westminster and two inspectors attended a Water Treatment for Swimming Pools Course in Richmond. Two inspectors attended Onsight Sewage Disposal Course for Public Health Inspectors at the Education Centre Riverview Hospital in March.

The Communicable Diseasos this quarter are down from the last quarter with 180 cases reported. Of these there were 51 chicken pox, 49 gonorrhea, 22 measles, 10 each tuberculosis and infectious hepatitis, 11 mumps, 7 rubella, 5 each pediculosis and salmonellosis, 3 conjunctivitis, 4 ringworm, 1 each diphtheria, syphilis and scartet fever.
