#### Re: MEDICAL HEALTH QUARTERLY REPORT

Following is the report of the Medical Health Officer covering the activities of his Department for the months of April, May and June, 1976.

Dear Sir,

I have the pleasure of submitting the Quarterly Report for the Health Department covering the months of April, May and June, 1976.

In September of 1975 a joint appointment position was established with the University of British Columbia (as reported in the Oct/Nov/Dec 1975 Quarterly Report). This half-time coordinating position has proven to be most successful. As the University of British Columbia School of Nursing uses the community more and more for field experiences for the student nurses, so the demands made upon the Community Health Nurses also increases. Mrs. Frances Gray, who fills this position, has competently and smoothly provided the kinds of experiences requested by the University for their students. For this first year (September '75 to July '76) the health department has had 82 U.B.C. nursing students and 15 faculty members associated with us. This can be broken down into:

63 first year students
9 third year students
9 fourth year students
I graduate student

Students bring with them enthusiasm and inquisitiveness. This stimulates our own staff, who enjoy their presence and learn as well.

The population of senior citizens living in independent housing complexes is increasing. In January a small pilot project was started, whereby the Community Health Nurse was introduced to the residents at Doug Drummond Manor. In keeping with our objectives of health promotion, she offers guidance and counselling in relation to their health needs. The seniors now know how to contact her and her involvement in the residence is increasing. An interesting spin-off from this is that the Kindergarten classroom in nearby Windsor School has invited the seniors to become "volunteer grandparents", reading and listening to the youngsters. Both old and young have gained from this.

Now, six months later, we have expanded the program to include more of these residential complexes. Hall Towers, Stratford Gardens, Lauralyn Place, and the New Vista facilities are now receiving more attention. As those types of living accommodations increase, so the demands upon the support services in the community increase. The nurses work closely with other resource agencies (e.g. Human Resources, Parks and Recreation, Mental Health) in order to help the senior citizens maintain their independence and enjoy their senior years.

This quarter saw some major changes in staffing. Miss Mary Ross, Nursing Coordinator, retired after 33 years of service. Miss Lynda Thornton was promoted to fill this position. Mrs. Edna Trothoway, who has been a Community Health Nurse in Burnaby for 15 years was promoted to the Associate Coordinator position.

In April, the Community Health Nurses participated in a half-day staff development program sponsored by the Metropolitan Coard of Health. Four Community Health Nurses attended workshops appropriate to their work.

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Mr. Bill Chrapko has joined our staff as a Public Health Inspector ! effective May 10th, 1976, replacing Larry Copeland.

Messrs. G.H. Armson, D.J. Edwards and G.V. Harvie attended the "Microbiological Standards for Food", at the University of British Columbia, in May. Mr. D.J. Edwards attended "The Long, Long Arm of Environmental Law" meeting sponsored by the Vancouver Board of Trade, held Tuesday, May 11th, 1976. Mr. G.V. Harvie attended "The Vital Issue of Urban Environmental Noise and Control" Seminar held in May at the University of Calgary. Messrs. G. Embree, A. Hamade and K. Johnston attended the Mosquito and Biting Fly Abatement Course sponsored by the B.C. Department of Agriculture, Cloverdale, held May 4, 5 & 6, 1976.

The incidence of communicable disease showed a decrease this quarter with 264 cases reported. There were 137 chickenpox, 46 mumps, 37 gonorrhea, 7 salmonellosis, 6 measles, 4 each whooping cough, scarlet fever, scables, infectious hepatitis, 3 each ringworm, pediculosis, tuberculosis and 2 each impetigo, diphtheria and syphilis.
