### Re: MEDICAL HEALTH QUARTERLY REPORT

Following for your information is the report of the Medical Health Officer covering the activities of his Department for the months of October, November and December, 1975.

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#### QUARTERLY REPORT

Dear Sir,

I have the pleasure of submitting the Quarterly Report for the Health Department covering the months October, November and December 1975.

We have been reviewing the Home Care Programme which has now completed its second year of operation in the Municipality of Burnaby. The demand for this service is steadily increasing as physicians and patients become aware of the benefits derived. Valuable hospital bed time has been freed up for other patients which assists alleviating the long waiting lists for admission. Comparative figures are now available which show the growth patterns of this programme; in 1974 a total of 569 patients were admitted to the programme while in 1975 this had grown to 804 patients admitted. The saving in hospital bed days in 1974 was 6,085 while in 1975 there were 7,701 days saved. We can foresee that this programme will have a similar expansion in 1976. Mrs. C. Ballantyne is the Home Care Liaison Nurse, she contracts with Victorian Order of Nurses, Homemaker Service, Meals-on-Wheels, Pharmacies, surgical equipment and transportation as the need arises for each individual patient.

The Planned Parenthood Association requested, and was granted, space in the Health Department offices. The Association commenced their operations some years ago in the Health Department offices but moved to the B.C.I.T. where better facilities were available. With the improved facilities in the Health Department they now hold their regular Tuesday evening clinic in a portion of our facilities. Appointments for this clinic are made by a central booking office in Vancouver. Community Health Nurses and other helping professions make referrals to this service.

In the fall a joint appointment was made with the University of British Columbia School of Nursing whereby a half-time experienced Community Health Nurse was made available to coordinate the field experience for their nursing students. This half-time position is financed by the University. Mrs. Rannveig Sharpe was appointed as a half-time nurse to cover Mrs. Frances Gray's district work. Mrs. Gray is our first appointed to this joint appointment position with the University.

Mrs. Joan Leslie was granted maternity leave from November 1. She has been replaced by Mrs. Janice Foote.

Four Public Health Inspectors attended a Sewage Disposal Seminar in Coquitiam on October 15, 1975.

The Communicable Diseases reported during this quarter showed a decrease over the quarter for the same time the previous year with a total 219 cases reported. Of those there were 47 each mumps and chicken pox, 13 each scarlet fever and pediculosis, 52 gonorrhea, II infectious hepatitis, 5 ringworm, 4 measles, 3 each rubella, impetigo and meningitis and 2 each whooping cough, conjunctivitis and scables, I each tuberculosis and syphilis.
