Re: R.C.M.P. MANPOWER REQUIREMENTS

Following is a report from the Officer in Charge, Burnaby Detachment, R.C.M.P. regarding manpower requirements for his department.

1. Item 20, Report No. 52 which Council received on August 16, 1976 is attached. Adoption of the recommendation in this report to bring on six additional officers during the period September to December, 1976 resulted in the adoption of a resolution by Council which was as follows:

"WHEREAS the Council of the Municipality of Burnaby approved the action of the Burnaby Detachment R.C.M.P. requesting 14 additional members in 1976, 22 additional members in 1977;

AND WHEREAS RCMP Headquarters, Ottawa and the Treasury Board, Ottawa reduced the 1976 request to 4 additional members and the 1977 request has apparently been reduced to 6 additional members;

AND WHEREAS in 1975 there was an increase of 20.0% in criminal code offences resulting in a case burden of 84.4 cases per man, the forecast for 1976 based on 6 months experience indicates an increase of 12.4% in criminal code offences, resulting in a case burden of 93 cases per man;

AND WHEREAS the population of the Municipality of Burnaby continues to grow at a rate of 2.3% per annum and the population of the lower mainland continues to grow at a rate of 2.9%;

AND WHEREAS the ratio of police to population compares unfavourably with Vancouver and New Westminster;

NOW THEREFORE be it resolved that the Council of the Municipality of Burnaby make an appeal to the RCMP Headquarters, Ottawa and the Treasury Board to reconsider their decision to drastically reduce the needed manpower contained in the request for 22 members in 1977 for the Burnaby Detachment of the R.C.M.P. and that the Municipal Manager gather the backup statistics and information necessary and report back to Council prior to making the request and at that time the members of Parliament and the Minister of Justice also be informed of the action."

2. Manpower requirements are projected from historical data, and our estimates are based on statistics from the past several years and represent the trend in crime under current growth conditions.

3. During the first six months of 1976, there was an increase of 12.4% in Criminal Code offences over the previous year; however, at the end of 1976 there was actually a decrease of 3.7% in Criminal Code offences. This reduction in Criminal Code offences was experienced by many of our detachments and several Municipal Police Departments throughout the Lower Mainland District. In fact, several experienced even greater decrease in Criminal Code offences than did Burnaby Detachment. Crime trends are unreliable and I would not want to base my 1978/79 manpower requirements solely on the Criminal case burden in 1976.

4. Referring to report dated August 20, 1976 of the Director of Planning under the above caption, the population growth in Burnaby increases at the rate of 2.1% per annum, NOT 2.3% as stated in the Manager's Report quoted on the first page of this report, and is estimated at 145,500 for 1977. The 145,500 population figure that is referred to in the report of the Director of Planning is subject to adjustment when the final population figure is received from Statistics Canada. It will be recalled that the Municipality has challenged the Federal Government census figure for 1976 as being too low. With our manpower establishment of 205 members in 1977, the police per population ratio is 1 member per 709.7 population based on the Director of Planning's estimated population for 1977. To draw a comparison between Burnaby, Vancouver and New Westminster, police per population ratios, based on the populations of the communities as supplied by the Provincial Justice Information System and Statistics Canada, are as follows:

Statistics taken from the Provincial Criminal Justice Annual Report, 1976, show that the case burden per man for Burnaby Detachment in 1976 was 92.3, while New Westminster Police Department was 74.4 and Vancouver Police Department was 54.4. This disparity in police ratio per population and case burden is due in part to the fact that Vancouver and New Westminster are bound by contract with their respective Police Associations to provide two members per car for a certain percentage of their afternoon and night shifts. Burnaby Detachment operates one-man patrols, and backup is provided when it appears necessary and then only until such time as it is determined if assistance is required.


5. I fully realize that over the past years while the Burnaby Municipal Council authorized requested manpower increases, R.C.M.P. Headquarters, Ottawa and Treasury Board drastically reduced the needed manpower. The increase of 22 members for 1977 was likewise reduced to 8 members in 1977; however, I was fortunate in acquiring the 6 members advance in September, 1976, which provided a total Municipal increase of 14 uniformed members for 1977. Additionally, I received 2 members for the Drug Section; both are filling federal positions and paid from federal funds. My total increase in manpower for 1977 was 16 members. While I appreciate we fell substantially short of the manpower increase of 22 members requested, nevertheless the 16 member increase has provided some tangible relief to our manpower problem.

6. The current Municipal establishment of Burnaby Detachment is 205 members. To provide you some insight into what we will be looking at in the way of manpower increase for 1978, our Officer in Charge Policy and Planning Section did a study of manpower estimates for Municipal and Provincial Policing throughout the Lower Mainland District for 1978. He identified a "pessimistic" and an "optimistic" estimate of manpower requirements for the various Detachments. The "pessimistic" estimate is based on the trend in crime under current growth conditions. The "optimistic" estimate is indicated if some of the factors show moderate improvement. The "pessimistic" manpower estimate for Burnaby Detachment for 1978, based on police per population ratio, caseload and percentage of crime distribution, is 217 Municipal Contract members. The "Optimistic" manpower estimate for Burnaby Detachment for 1978 based on the same criterion, but taking into consideration the possibility of some of the factors showing moderate improvement, such as a reduction in police per population, caseload and percentage of crime distribution, is 205 Municipal Contract members. I realize the financial impact manpower increases place upon the Municipality and therefore attempt to maintain the establishment of the Detachment commensurate with the workload. I would not want to be caught in a shortfall estimate, neither do I want to overestimate my manpower requirements.

7. It is difficult to estimate at this time my manpower requirements for 1978. While we experienced a slight decrease in Criminal Code offences during the latter part of 1978 and continuing on into 1977, I would want to review the crime trend on a Provincial as well as Municipal basis before making my final decision on 1978 manpower requirements.

8. Taking into consideration our slight reduction in Criminal Code cases this past year, the fact we have received a substantial increase in manpower for 1977 and the increased financial burden placed upon the Municipality, I am satisfied to live within our manpower increase for 1977. I have been given verbal assurance that in the future the Force will provide manpower increases as requested by the Chief Executive of the Municipality. However, paragraph 5(2)(c) of the Municipal Policing Agreement contains a clause, whereby Canada shall not be required to fulfill any requested increase where the Solicitor General, in a report to the Chief Executive of the Municipality, indicates in his opinion it is impossible to do so.

9. In conclusion, I wish to point out that the positions created by the approved manpower increase for April 1, 1977 were filled, forthwith.

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Re: Manpower Requirements - R.C.M.P.

Attached are copies of letters from the Officer Commanding, R.C.M.P., Supt. C.L. Thomas, re manpower requirements for 1977.

In one letter, Supt. Thomas states that he is being "asked to advise as soon as possible how many extra positions Burnaby would be prepared to contract for in 1977 followed by the usual letter of request, and in addition approval in principle of the suggested increase in police personnel for 1978".

In the other, he points out the possibility of obtaining six officers during the period September to December 1976. He mentions also that the R.C.M.P. are not likely to be able to supply in full his forecasted requirements of 22 additional men in 1977.

As it happens, through loss of manpower in 1976 and its attendant savings in dollars, we can afford to employ six additional men in 1976 at a cost of approximately \$26,000. Of course, in 1977 the outlay in funds will be greater, approximately \$108,000.

At the best of times, it is difficult for the R.C.M.P. to fill Burnaby's requests for manpower. Obviously, we will need six additional men or more in 1977 and we should take this opportunity to bring them on staff if they are available now. This would be Mr. Shelley's recommendation if he were here. The matter of the total number of men we should apply for to come on strength in 1977 should await his return to office.

RECOMMENDATION

1. THAT the R.C.M.P. be requested to bring on strength six additional officers during the period September to December 1976.

I refer specifically to paragraph 2 of my letter regarding the contract strength of Burnaby Detachment, for the years 1977 and 1978, dated August 5, 1976. I have been unofficially advised that our forecasted increase of 22 members for Burnaby contract establishment will be reduced to approximately 6 members for the year 1977.

On May 28, 1976 I was informed that our Headquarters, Ottawa advised they were able to provide 36 additional Municipal positions for this fiscal year. I discussed the possibility of acquiring some of these members with the Municipal Manager in view of the anticipated reduction in our requested establishment increase for 1977. He advised at that time, because the Municipal Budget for 1976 has just been struck, there would be no possibility of providing additional members at this time, but would be prepared to review this request at the time of Budget Re-cast and determine if there were sufficient monies in the Police budget to provide some relief in the way of increasing the Detachment police personnel.

Since talking with the Municipal Manager, I have been able to identify 426 man-day shortages thus far in 1976, or approximately two man-years, for which the Municipality will not be billed. This 426 man-day shortage resulted from transfers, members off duty sick over 30 days, etc. The two man-years would represent 6 additional members for the remaining four months, September to December, 1976.

It would certainly alleviate the manpower shortage, I foresee in the year 1977, if you could possibly see your way clear to advance these 6 positions in 1976.

I am being asked as soon as possible how many positions Burnaby would be prepared to contract for in 1976 if I am not already too late to take advantage of these surplus positions. If you are prepared to authorize these 6 additional positions for 1976, may we have your usual letter of request.

In our discussion regarding manpower increases for the fiscal year 1977/78 and after ratification of the 1976 Annual Budget, wherein 11 Municipal Employee positions plus one additional Traffic Patrolman were approved, I informed you I would supply comparison statistics from various other Police Departments and neighbouring Municipal R.C.M.P. Detachments. I regret I was unable to submit this request earlier, however, was delayed awaiting reports from various police departments.

As you are aware, our estimates for manpower increases have to be initiated approximately 18 months in advance of the fiscal year. Last August, my predecessor, based on the rapid escalation of crime in 1974 and a continuing increase in the first 7 months of 1975, predicted our minimum manpower requirements would be an additional 22 members and 5 municipal employees in 1977. This estimate was based on his request for 14 additional members for 1976, but which had been reduced to 4 only by R.C.M.P. Headquarters, Ottawa. In addition to the 4-member increase, an 11-municipal employee increase was approved in the 1976 budget. Nine of the additional municipal employee positions were designated as 'Complaint Takers' required to provide better services to the public and to alleviate the necessity of dispatching the operational policeman on patrol to attend a call which could have been handled by telephone had we a person to take that information, or to come back to the detachment to assist the Complaint Taker during peak crime periods.

One of the two remaining municipal positions was designated as a Radio Operator required to cope with the volume of radio dispatching and C.P.I.C. information. This was a direct result of the installation of modern communication equipment supplied by the Force to provide superior support service to the field members. The eleventh position was a Clerk-Typist to provide administrative assistance in the office.

Since there was no record maintained as to the number of manhours where operational policemen were dispatched to a patrol which may have been handled by telephone, or where one was called

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in to act as a second Complaint Taker, and since to date we are still in the process of hiring municipal Complaint Takers, I am not in a position to advise what relief in the way of manhours is offset by the additional Complaint Takers.

In my introductory remarks, contained in our Annual Report for 1975, which I am attaching as Appendix "A" to this request, I pointed out an increase of 9.6% in crimes and 21.1% in motor vehicle accidents in 1975. Statistics for the first 6 months of 1976 indicate we are experiencing an overall increase of 11% in Criminal Code offences (see Appendix "B"). With greater emphasis on traffic law enforcement, this year to date, July 31, 1976, there has been an 89% reduction in fatal motor vehicle accidents, 27% reduction in injury accidents and 9% reduction in property damage accidents. Enforcement of traffic related Municipal By-laws, Provincial Traffic Act and traffic related Criminal Code offences has increased by 13.8% (see Appendix "C"). During the period 1970 to 1973, the average case burden per man remained fairly constant at 65 cases per man. In 1975 there was a 20.9% increase in Criminal Code offences resulting in an increase to 78.3 case burden per man. In 1975 there was an increase of 9.7% in Criminal Code offences resulting in a case burden of 84.4 cases per man. If the Criminal Code offences continue to increase over the next 6 months, and I anticipate they will, as the last six months of the year are normally higher than the first six months, the case burden will increase to 93 cases per man. Statistics for the first 6 months of 1976 indicate there will be an overall increase of 12.4% in Criminal Code offences. History has shown over the past several years that as the case burden rises, the clearance rate generally falls as members are unable to devote the attention they should to preventing and solving crimes because of the increased work load. This decrease in solved crime is very evident over the past six years (see Appendix "D"). In 1975 our clearance rate, with a case burden of 84.4 cases per man, was at an all time low of 21.5% of all Criminal Code offences cleared.

In order to maintain an acceptable level in our case burden per man and improve the clearance rate, an increase of 21 additional members was requested for 1977. This increase should maintain our case burden at approximately 83.7 per member.

I have been unofficially informed that Treasury Board has drastically reduced the number of Municipal Policing positions and that our requested increase of 21 members has been reduced to approximately 6 members. If only 6 additional members are made available to Burnaby Detachment in 1977, and in anticipation that we can reduce crime through our Crime Prevention Programs, and improve our clearance rate, I would still be forced to request no less than 28 additional members in 1978.

The policing problem is becoming more dangerous with the increase of more serious offences. For example, in 1974 there were 4 murders, 79 robberies, and 46 offensive weapons cases; while in

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1975 there were 9 murders, 4 attempted murders, 127 robberies and 98 offensive weapons cases. Further inroads were made in preventive patrols time by a 3.05% increase in calls for assistance to the public, which reached an all time high of 37,735. If the trend for the first 6 months of this year continues, the calls for assistance to the public will exceed 40,000.

With an increase of only 4 members in 1976, the police/population ratio remains relatively constant, but is exceedingly high by comparison with neighbouring municipal police departments as shown below and in attachment (see Appendix "E").

This compares most unfavourably with the ratios of 1:494 and 1:545 of the neighbouring police forces of Vancouver and New Westminster this year. One very significant factor which to me seems to be completely ignored is the fact that the Municipality of Burnaby is centrally located between the Municipalities of New Westminster and Vancouver with arterial routes from most all other large municipalities leading through Burnaby, and particularly from the East Fraser Valley municipalities. Burnaby is vulnerable to the criminal element from Vancouver and other municipalities and vice versa. If Burnaby Detachment was increased by 22 members in 1977, our predicted ratio would be 1:676, based on a population increase of 2,100, which is in my opinion very conservative.

I would like to draw your attention to the police/population ratio shown in Appendix "B" for the prairie cities of Saskatoon, Regina and Winnipeg.

I realize the financial impact an increase of 22 members would make to Burnaby; I would be remiss in my responsibilities and loyalty if I did not adequately advise you and Council of the situation that currently exists and what I consider would be a bare minimum increase necessary to improve conditions and standards of policing in the Corporation of the District of Burnaby. I do not want to be critical of past administration of Burnaby Detachment, but by conservative standards with Municipal Police Departments locally and across Canada, I have been faced with having to attempt to bring the personnel establishment and number of police vehicles up to a more acceptable standard.

I would be extremely remiss if I did not point out the fact that my predecessor did not recognize the fact that the

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detachment was severely under strength and it was he who requested the increase of 22 members immediately prior to my assuming command of Burnaby Detachment.

I would like to point out that in order to provide a 24-hour day, 7 days a week, all year round service, which takes roughly 5 men to put one extra man on the street around the clock, my request would only mean an extra 4 men on patrol during an 8-hour shift and the other position would be employed to good advantage.

Please accept this as advance notice of my request for personnel increase for the year 1977 and 1978.

I am being asked to advise as soon as possible how many extra positions Burnaby would be prepared to contract for in 1977 followed by the usual letter of request, and in addition approval in principal of the suggested increase in police personnel for 1978.

1975 Annual Report

I have the honour of submitting this annual report on the policing of the Municipality during the year 1975 in accordance with the terms of the R.C.M.P. contract.

In 1972 and 1973, Burnaby experienced very moderate increases in crime at 5% and 3.4% respectively. In 1974, there was a substantial increase of 21% in crimes and 29% in accidents. Although there is an increase of 9.6% in crimes and 21.1% in accidents in 1975, these overall increases are substantially lower than those in 1974. The increase in crime and accidents compares quite favourably with neighbouring areas and indeed, the national average. The increase in crime and motor vehicle accidents is commensurate with population growth in the Municipality.

There was a very substantial increase in the incidents of homicide in 1975. There were 9 homicides and 4 attempted homicides. Three of the homicides had an underworld connotation, which is quite foreign to the community, and were for the most part drug orientated; and the others mostly related to domestic problems. Seven of the nine homicides and three of the four attempted homicides have been solved and have either been concluded or are at various stages in the courts. The more serious crimes have increased substantially during the past year. There has been a dramatic increase in the incidents of robbery and possession of offensive weapons. In 1974 there were 79 robberies as compared with 127 in 1975. The targets of these robberies involved banks, credit unions, stores, service stations and/or individuals and the motive was for the most part to obtain ready money, often for drug purchases. Most robberies were perpetrated by armed individuals. There were 46 cases of possession of offensive weapons in 1974 as compared with 98 in 1975. The incidents of rape also increased substantially in 1975 with 20 actual offences being reported as compared with 12 actual offences being reported in 1974.

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Offences against property increased substantially in the following categories; breaking & entering, theft (value over \$200.00) and possession of stolen property. There is a substantial increase in the incidents of fraud reported. In 1974 there were 840 fraud cases investigated as compared with 1,113 in 1975. Arson is also on the increase with 26 actual cases being investigated in 1975 as compared with 9 cases in 1974. Theft of motor vehicles remained quite stable; in fact there was a negligible decrease of .07% over 1974.

The number of juveniles charged with offences has decreased substantially, from 664 in 1974 to 274 in 1975. The majority of the charges were breaking & entering, theft, and theft of auto. It is interesting to note there were only 10 juveniles charged with drug offences.

The motor vehicle accident picture for 1975 remains an enigma. During the past year there was an increase of 29.2% in the number of prosecutions for drunk driving offences, however, in spite of this the total reportable accidents increased by 21.1%. Reportable accidents increased by 29.5% in 1974. In 1974 there were 16 fatal accidents with 18 persons killed, as compared to 17 fatal accidents in 1975 with 20 persons killed. There was a decrease of 2.7% in injury accidents and 3.4% in the number of persons injured.

It is difficult to attribute the continued increase in crime to any one factor. Certainly increased permissiveness, relaxed bail and remand procedures, a growing tendency to take some categories of offences less seriously, together with the criminal offences committed by drug addicts and traffickers in support of their habit and trade are all contributing factors. Our inability to increase our manpower strength throughout the years commensurate with the crime increase and the granting of time off in lieu of overtime worked is also a contributing factor. The efforts of members on the Detachment establishment were not relaxed in any way but the average workload of each has become so great that follow-up investigations and preventive police work is suffering. The case burden per member in 1975 based on police personnel per 1,000 Criminal Code offences was 84.4. With an increase of only 4 police personnel being provided in 1976, the case burden will be 90.3 based on police personnel per 1,000 Criminal Code offences, projected from the average of the previous 6 years increase. Greater demands on the patrolman's time is apparent by the ever increasing calls for assistance to the public, which rose to 37,735 in 1975 from 35,261 in 1974, an increase of 7%. We still respond when required but some delays are now being experienced because of these workload increases.

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The computer aided dispatch system is progressing favourably and we anticipate it will go into operation during April, 1976 and will provide Burnaby Detachment with a very modern and up to date communications system, which will be linked with the Lower Mainland District.

We are increasing our efforts to encourage public participation in crime prevention and while we have several projects operating on a continuing basis, our most recent project is "Operation Identification". This project has received excellent support and financial assistance from the Burnaby-Kingsway Rotary Club, His Worship the Mayor and Members of Council of Burnaby and the British Columbia Police Commission. Although the pilot project of Operation Identification has only been in effect for slightly over two months and while not wanting to be too optimistic, thus far the results are good. The project is receiving excellent support from the community and has now been extended to take in the entire District of Burnaby, with the actual marking of the property being carried out by service clubs and other organizations. It is recognized that our greatest hope in reducing crime and accidents is in public support and co-operation.

The continued support of the Municipal Council, the Manager, other Municipal Departments, the municipal staff who are employed at Burnaby Detachment and the valuable contribution of our Auxiliary Police is gratefully acknowledged.

Reports of Departmental activity and statistical information follow.
