It should be recalled that in 1977, Council received correspondence from the Second Burnaby Mountain Scout Group Committee, in which they expressed concern that a private operator's proposal to regularly collect used newspapers in Burnaby could result in the loss of fund raising activity that Boy Scouts and other community groups rely upon. A copy of Item 3(e) and Item 8, Manager's report 65, 1977 September 26 are <u>attached</u>.

The Regional Co-ordinator of the Boy Scouts advises that as a fund raising activity, collecting used newspapers is fairly widespread throughout the municipality. Each scout troup decides when they will conduct a paper drive in their neighbourhood. Further, the selling price of paper fluctuates extensively and is currently high at approximately \$30 per ton. In their experience, many organizations or private operators will engage in collecting paper when the price is high but will abandon such activity when the price drops off. The Boy Scouts attempt to provide a community service by conducting regular paper drives.

It has come to our attention that an application has been made, or is about to be made, for a licence to recover used newspapers on a commercial scale for recycling purposes.




