REPORT

At the Council meeting of 79 11 05 when dealing with the Manager's Report No. 75, Item 12, the issue of a parking ticket received while parking in the "No Parking Zone" in front of the William Street door of the captioned address was raised.

Because of the concern of the tenant, Dependable Industries, in obtaining loading access to the above-mentioned door we had a no parking zone placed adjacent the curb. We did not place a commercial loading zone as it is not our policy to do so when Burnaby tries to encourage off-street loading and in fact makes this a requirement of preliminary plan approval (P.P.A.) and the Burnaby Zoning Bylaw 1965. It was explained to Mr. Prior of Dependable Industries and to Mr. Staudacher, that as long as a vehicle was in the process of loading or unloading they would not be issued a ticket. This was confirmed by the parking patrol.

The ticket that was issued was to a vehicle that had been left parked in the no parking zone with no one in attendance and the door of the building closed. Because of the apparent confusion in this matter we have had the ticket cancelled.

In a later phone discussion with Mr. Staudacher we advised that we would change the no parking zone to a ½ hour parking limit. He continued to request a commercial loading zone, however we pointed out that from our own observations many of the vehicles loading were not licenced commercial vehicles and would receive tickets if in a commercial zone. The ½ hour limit would keep the area fairly free and still allow not only loading from private cars and vans but for short business transactions.

The final outcome was the posting of a 1/2 hour time limit in the previous no parking zone.

Subject: Bag Lunch Room - 1244 Boundary Road

The above-noted premises were inspected by the Health and Building Departments on 1979 November 15 in relation to the above-noted subject. We would advise as follows:

There is a mezzanine floor in this building which is divided into two parts. One portion of the mezzanine floor, approximately fifteen feet from the William Street overhead door opening, is used for the storing of small miscellaneous equipment. The second portion of the mezzanine entry to this area is by a separate stair case. This area contains two rooms, one a small paint storage room and the second a bag lunch room. The lunch room contains a two-compartment sink equipped with hot and cold running water

This bag lunch room is a requirement of and complies with Section 30 (2) of the Factories Act and Regulations,
