RE: BUILDING DEPARTMENT YEAR END PERMIT REPORT
(ITEM 4, REPORT NO. 6, 1979 JANUARY 22)

During Council's consideration of a year end report on building permits on 1979 January 22, a request was made for additional information on certain aspects of this matter. This information is contained in the following report from the Chief Building Inspector.

RECOMMENDATION:

THAT this report be received for information purposes.

REPORT:

With receipt of the Building Department Year End Permit Report, the following motion was adopted:

"THAT Council receive a report showing the staff complement in comparison to permits and values in the last ten years and a comparison of other communities insofar as their building breakdown is concerned."

Attachment No. 1 lists the staff complement of the Burnaby Building Department and the permits and values of construction in Burnaby for the last nine years (1970/78). This material has been broken down to show the four major types of permits issued (building, electrical, plumbing and gas), and the staff complement per inspection discipline. It may be noted that all plumbing inspectors hold gas inspectors certificates and hence can perform a twofold inspection service.

Attachment No. 2 is based on information requested of other municipalities in the Greater Vancouver area and shows comparative building permit figures and construction values in those jurisdictions for the past years, 1977 and 1978.

OBSERVATIONS:

1. It is normal for the public at large to associate quantity of building permits and dollar value of construction with numbers of staff, and perhaps to expect a linear relationship to be maintained.

A rudimentary relationship may exist between number of permits and number of staff, but such a relationship cannot be relied upon alone to determine productivity or effectiveness of an
