Further to our report to Council of 1980 February 13 relating to the abovenoted subject, we would advise as follows:

We have received information from Environment Canada, Environmental Protection Service, Pacific Region, relating to their survey of the polychlorinated biphenyl levels in the Belkin Paperboard effluent and its impact on resident Fraser River fish species in the vicinity of the Belkin Paperboard outfall.

The information is to the effect that the necessary field work has been completed and data collected is currently under review by Environment Canada staff. It is anticipated that the survey information will be available by 1980 June 01.

Upon receipt of the survey results, we will submit a complete report to Council.
