(a) Barbara Gudmundson then addressed Council on the subject of the intersection of Canada Way and Edmonds Street. The following is the text of Mrs. Gudmundson's submission:

"In the past we were able to function without the automobile playing a major role in transportation; in the present we function around the needs of the automobile. In the future the automobile will no longer be a viable form of transportation; as we run out of gas we will see fewer and fewer automobiles. In the present we must look at the threat posed by extreme amounts of traffic to the most vulnerable group in our society — our children. Children have not lived their lives to the fullest; to have a child killed by a vehicle at the beginning of his life is a reality for which our society must accept responsibility, since a small child's mind cannot comprehend the danger presented by the automobile.

Five years ago, two children were hit - one on Wednesday the other on Thursday - on the corner of Canada Way and Edmonds Street in Burnaby, I saw the need for public inter-action regarding the young students' access to and from Edmonds Elementary School. I went through all the proper channels of government dealing with this problem. A petition, with the names of one hundred and fifty concerned residents, was presented to the Burnaby Traffic Safety Committee, by myself and the mother of one of the children struck at this corner. This petition dealt with two aspects of the problem presented at the corner of Canada Way and Edmonds Street:

- (1) that an adult crossing guard be hired to assist the children crossing to attend classes at Edmonds Elementary School,
- (2) that a two second delay in the walk signal be implemented to allow traffic to clear the intersection before the walk signal indicated to the children that it was all right to cross the highway.

Our request for an adult crossing guard was referred to the Burnaby School Board for examination and possible action. The request for a delay in the walk signal was referred to the British Columbia Provincial Highways Department. The Burnaby Engineering Department was instructed to contact the Provincial Highways Department and refer the request to them as Canada Way is a Provincial Highway.

What followed showed me the callousness of the Burnaby Engineering Department, and how the callous attitude of the Burnaby Engineering Department would turn the hopefully immediate solution into one that would take four years to implement. In a letter from Harry Bacon, Burnaby Traffic Supervisor, and E.E. Olson, Burnaby Municipal Engineer, to Mr. Guttman of the Burnaby School Board, this callous attitude was displayed: 'Having observed the crossing habits of pedestrians at this intersection, we cannot see much to be gained by the delay to the walk indication as a high percentage of the pedestrians pay little attention to the signal indications'; and 'It is also our opinion that once you hire an adult to supervise or even to control by themselves the crosswalks at signalized intersections you will be setting precedent for similar actions at many other such crossings, i.e. Canada Way at Imperial, Canada Way at Douglas, Canada Way at Burris, Canada Way at Twelfth Avenue, just to mention a few'.

This uncaring attitude toward the problems these young children had to face daily was not only displayed by the Burnaby Engineering Department but also by the Burnaby School Board and the Provincial Highways Department. The only reason the Burnaby Engineering Department should be held responsible for the length of time it took for a solution to this specific problem is the wording of the letter sent to Mr. Guttman of the School Board.

With reference to the letter sent to the Burnaby Engineering Department, from Mr. J.H. Harding, Senior Traffic Engineer of the Department of Highways in Victoria, B.C., certainly this letter proves that the same information was received by them as was received by the Burnaby School Board. result of the wording of this letter, the installation of a two second pause in the walk signal was delayed for approximately two years. This delay was one which could have proven fatal to a small child. The last child hit before I took on the job of trying to find a solution to this problem of children's access to and from school - was hit because there was no delay in the walk signal. The six year old boy went to the corner of Canada Way and Edmonds Street to wait for the walk signal to cross Canada Way. A van travelling along Canada Way at the same time, ran an amber light, but before the van got through the intersection, the light turned red. Immediately the walk signal came on, the boy saw the walk signal and proceeded to cross. The van hit the boy and the impact threw him twenty-five feet through the The child was not critically injured but did obtain a concussion.

The law stated that since the boy did not look both ways before he proceeded to cross, he had to be considered partially at fault.

If another child had been hit and killed on this corner in the interim period - between when I started my work and when it was completed - who would have been to blame? If the accident had happened in exactly the same manner and a child's death had been the result, it would have been the fault of those people who were in the position to create the change, and wouldn't. The basic responsibility for inaction lies with the people who referred my information in the manner that the Burnaby Engineering presented it.

Each aspect of government passed the buck elsewhere: the police said the solution had to be a School Board responsibility, and the Burnaby Engineering Department said the highway is provincial and therefore out of their jurisdiction. The Burnaby School Board stated this corner did not warrant an adult crossing guard because it did not adhere to the regulations set forth by the provincial government regarding where adult crossing guards should be implemented. It was also stated by Mr. Guttman of the Burnaby School Board, in a phone conversation with me, that the Board would not be prepared to set a precedent by installing an adult crossing guard on a signalized intersection. Thanks to these attitudes it took four years to attempt to ensure the safety of the young children at Edmonds Elementary School.

When Mr. Guttman was discharged, I was referred to Mr. Hurford. Mr. Hurford directed me to send a letter to the School Board explaining the situation. It took about a month for the recommendation to be passed, and another month for the adult to be found and hired. I must acknowledge the fact that these members of the Burnaby School Board had the insight to see the problem at this time and the grit to break their pattern of indifference.

When I look at the problem presented on the corner of Canada Way and Edmonds in Burnaby, the writings of Lawrence Halprin in <u>CITIES</u>, describe my sentiments exactly, 'In the process of a single minded approach to mobility, every other aspect of environmental design has been sacrificed, as though speed and mobility were the only and ultimate justification, with an over-riding justification of their own, etc.'.

Our Burnaby Engineering Department have told me that it is their job to ensure traffic keeps moving: to them I must refer to this statement from the writings of Lawrence Halprin: 'To think of traffic being kept moving at the cost of children's lives is too high a price to pay. Municipal Engineers fail to realize is that these are the children of people who pay taxes, and ensure Municipal Engineers' wages'. the wants of a few for speed, they ignore the wants and needs of a majority These engineers have put the access of automobiles before for safety. the access of the people competing with these automobiles. be accomplished now, is for the Municipal and Provincial Engineers to come to the realization that their priorities are backwards. People's lives are more important than machines and how fast these machines are able to travel. In 1975 traffic counts, it is shown that fifty-three thousand, four hundred automobiles per weekday travel through the intersection of Canada Way and Edmonds Street. When dealing with such a large amount of vehicles our priorities must be logically based.

These children, suffering most from our society's inadequacies, should not be the ones who undergo most of the repercussions as they have no say in the way things are. They have no guilt attached to them for the problem, yet they are the ones who suffer most. Of all the intersections mentioned in a recent survey done by the Burnaby Engineering Department, the corner of Canada Way and Edmonds was considered the second most severe as far as serious accidents were concerned. Willingdon and Hastings is considered to be the most dangerous. The fact that there is a public school adjacent, puts Canada Way and Edmonds into a unique position. A major change in the access allowed automobiles at this intersection is the only logical way to right this wrong."

(b) Mrs. Barbara Gudmundson then addressed Council and enquired of the present status of the Housing Committee's review of Residential Occupancy Standards in the municipality.

His Worship, Mayor Mercier, advised Mrs. Gudmundson that Council on 1980 February 25 had received a report from the Housing Committee on this subject and had adopted the following recommendations contained in this report:

- (1) That the Chief Building Inspector be directed to discontinue the houseto-house survey of dwellings suspected of containing a non-conforming suite.
- (2) That the Chief Building Inspector continue the investigation of complaints received from Burnaby residents regarding the alleged existence of non-conforming suites within dwelling units.
- (3) That the Chief Building Inspector deploy the services of the Housing Inspector to determine the location of all fourplex dwellings located within the Municipality of Burnaby.
- (4) That staff be directed to investigate the feasibility of creating a fourplex zone.

His Worship advised that the procedures outlined in the aforementioned recommendations were presently being followed by the municipality.

(c) Mr. Alec G. Nelson then addressed Council on the subject of the Boundary Road widening from Clinton Street to Rumble Street.

Mr. Nelson thanked the members of the Transportation Committee for their action in recommending the retention of the trees and the changes in design to the access road abutting his property.

Mr. Nelson noted that the current plans for noise abatement at this location do not appear to be adequate and he reserved the right to appear before Council at a future date in this connection.

Mr. Stan Bender did not appear before Council as a delegation this evening.

If they continue to win the western finals they will play the winning eastern team for the Hardy Cup and the Canadian Championship.

The fans are asking about Burnaby's arbitrary attitude. Where is the community pride? How do we explain to the players and visitors? What about the business the area has been denied? When have other groups suffered and no one spoke up? Does Council care?

We ask Burnaby to work on a policy of responsibility to the groups that use its facilities, stressing fairness, flexibility and support.

The Municipal Manager advised that the reduction in the number of lanes on Boundary Road was in that section north of Rumble Street. The section of Boundary Road south of Rumble Street to Marine Way is still of the same standard as it was when we covered a series of concerns of Mr. Barnes in Item 18, Municipal Manager's Report No. 83, 1979 December 10. As the 1979 report is still valid we feel no further input is required at this time.

The Officer-in-Charge looks to the meetings being beneficial to the business establishments and the police.

For Council's information, twenty-eight sirens are strategically located in Burnaby, eighteen agreements for sirens have been entered into with the municipality, nine with the School District and one with the B.C. Telephone Company.

The sirens are primarily intended to warn citizens of nuclear attack. Although detente has reduced the risk of such an occurrence in recent years, the position of the federal government is that it is nevertheless essential for an attack warning siren system to be maintained for national security reasons. Council is, therefore, occasionally requested to authorize the renewal of agreements.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT the subject siren agreements be executed on behalf of the municipality in accordance with the terms and conditions as noted in the report.

This item was dealt with previously in the meeting in conjunction with "Burnaby Zoning By-law 1965, Amendment By-law No. 7, 1980", By-law No. 7476.

12. Study of alternative methods for Solid Waste Disposal

The Municipal Manager provided a report from the Municipal Engineer concerning a study of alternative methods of solid waste disposal.

The Municipal Manager reported that a meeting of the Pollution Committee was held on 1980 February 07 with some Members of Council, Mr. Frank Bunnell, Commissioner of Operations, G.V.R.D., and Mr. Walter Mechler, Senior Assistant Engineer, G.V.R.D., regarding a review of the Terms of Reference and a brief update of the G.V.R.D. study being conducted with respect to alternate means of garbage disposal.

The Greater Vancouver Regional District has now reported that it would appear appropriate that Burnaby and the Regional District pool their resources and investigate a specific application in Burnaby, the results of which can then be transferred and extended to other situations. To this end, we have had preliminary discussions with consultants and incinerator suppliers and it appears that we should now seriously consider the retention of consultants and a further examination of installations.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- (1) THAT the Greater Vancouver Regional District's proposal for cost sharing as described in the letter from Mr. F.R. Bunnell dated 1980 March 21 be approved.
- (2) THAT Mr. W.M. Ross, Assistant Municipal Engineer, be authorized to make site visits to view solid waste disposal facilities, as outlined in Mr. Bunnell's letter, at an estimated total cost of \$1,200.00.
- (3) THAT the Pollution Committee be provided with a copy of this report.
