PUBLIC HEARING

"Burnaby Highway Exchange Bylaw No. 1, 1981" - Bylaw No. 7626 A Bylaw to dispose of a portion of road dedicated by Plan deposited Number 1452 containing 475 m² (5575 Woodsworth Street) in exchange for a part of Parcel One, Explanatory Plan 8478 of Parcel "A", Block 6 of the South 1/2 of District Lot 74, Group 1, Plan 1852, New Westminster District, containing 88 m² (3677 Douglas Road).

Miss Darlene Trca, 3650 Douglas Road, then addressed Council relative to "Burnaby Highway Exchange Bylaw No. 1, 1981" Bylaw No. 7626.

Miss Trca enquired as to whether it was planned to extend Woodsworth Street to intersect with Douglas Road and also whether the associated lane would connect to Douglas Road.

Miss Trca was of the opinion that if Woodsworth Street is extended to intersect with Douglas Road, a definite hazard will be created through increased traffic, etc.

The Director of Planning advised that Woodsworth Street would intersect with Douglas Road at a jogged intersection but that there would be no lane connection to Douglas Road. The Director of Planning pointed out that the Highway Exchange Bylaw would create no new road allowance and that the road will be contained within the existing road allowance.

There were no other submissions received in connection with "Burnaby Highway Exchange Bylaw No. 1, 1981" Bylaw No. 7626.

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

(a) Mr. Terry Smythe, speaking on behalf of Public Freightways Ltd., then addressed Council on the Company's application to temporarily enclose a portion of Still Creek.

The following is the substance of Mr. Smythe's submission:

"I am sure that Council is already familiar with our application to temporarily enclose a portion of Still Creek but I would like to review this application briefly.

Our site is unlike any other along the entire length of Still Creek in that it is surrounded on three sides by private property and railway tracks. The only access to Still Creek is through two gates on Still Creek Street. At the moment we are unable to fully utilize the property for truck terminal purposes in spite of the M6 Truck Terminal Zoning. At the moment the north half of the property can be used for little more than a parking lot for trailers. This restriction did not exist at the time we acquired the property. The spirit and intent of the Council policy is to have an open water course available in the event of future redevelopment of the site. In an effort to meet the commendable intent of that policy, we have guaranteed the ultimate removal of the planned enclosure of Still Creek. This undertaking would take the form of a restrictive covenant through our title to the land and would be legally binding on ourselves or any subsequent owner should the land use ever change in the future. We undertake to comply with all Health Department water quality requirements, such as oil interceptors and inspection chambers, etc. Given those safeguards, we note that neither the G.V.R.D. or the Burnaby Environmental Health Department has any objection to our proposal.

Council has expressed concern over the risk of setting a harmful precedent. However, the Planning and Health Departments now confirm that our property is, in fact, unique and that no public creek access is possible from any direction. That unique quality ensures that our proposal cannot, in any way, be viewed as a precedent harmful to Council's policy. Indeed, the approval of our proposal may well advance Council's policy in that subsequent Councils would be under at least a moral obligation to avoid relaxing the policy in the future."

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN BROWN:

"THAT Items 11 and 12 of the Municipal Manager's Report No. 11, 1981, pertaining to this subject, be brought forward for consideration at this time."

The following are the recommendations contained in Item 11, Municipal Manager's Report No. 11, 1981:

- 1. THAT Council approve, as an alternative solution to the culverting proposal, the lining of the open portion of the Still Creek channel on the Public Freightways property, with the provision of removable roof slabs over the waterway, all at no cost to the Municipality.
- 2. THAT the foregoing alternative method of interim enclosure be made conditional upon the registration of an acceptable restrictive covenant under Section 215 of the Land Title Act, and upon satisfaction of the technical requirements of the Engineering and Environmental Health Departments as to pollution control, inspection, and access.
- 3. THAT a copy of this report be sent to Mr. Terry R. Smythe, Divisional Controller, Public Freightways Ltd., P.O. 5300, Vancouver, B.C., V6B 4B6.
- 4. THAT a copy of this report be sent to Mr. A.D. Purdon, Chief Engineer, Greater Vancouver Sewerage & Drainage District, 2294 West 10th Ave., Vancouver, B.C., V6K 2H9.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN LAWSON: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN AST:

"THAT the action by Council in adopting the recommendations contained in Item 11, Municipal Manager's Report No. 11, 1981, be taken without prejudice and that Council's policy on open creeks and streams be reaffirmed."

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

(b) Mr. Michael A.J. Day then addressed Council on the proposed demolition of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel on Kingsway.

Mr. Day presented a petition bearing 1,000 signatures of people opposed to the proposed demoliton of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel.

The following is the preface to that petition:

"We, the undersigned, as residents of Burnaby, are strongly opposed to the proposed demolition of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel at 5152 Kingsway, Burnaby, B.C., and would like to see the building preserved."

Mr. Day was of the opinion that this petition should be taken as a clear indication that a very large number of Burnaby residents are opposed to the demolition of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel. Many residents have expressed a very emotional attachment to this old building. It is a memory of times gone by for some, for others it's a loved one who has passed through its gates, for many it is a quiet place of tranquility along a noisy concrete and asphalt alley, which is called Kingsway. Most people in Burnaby are realistic enough to realize that every historic building cannot be preserved or purchased by governments and turned into a museum. However, many positive suggestions have been made to the possible future use of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel. Many of these ideas would enable the Chapel to pay for itself. It is up to Council to make private developers aware that they have a responsibility to the community where historic buildings are concerned. We feel that Council should be less concerned with maximizing tax revenue and developers less concerned with maximizing profits. One major reason that people are upset is that they question the need for another ugly concrete tower.

The Royal Oak Chapel is of unique architectural and historical significance to Burnaby. Destroy it and you destroy part of our culture. Destroy it and you destroy part of our past. Must we always bow to the almighty dollar.

"THAT the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the District of Burnaby negotiate the purchase of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel at 5152 Kingsway."

MOVED BY ALDERMAN EMMOTT: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN BROWN:

"THAT the aforementioned motion be tabled."

MOTION DEFEATED

OPPOSED: MAYOR MERCIER,

ALDERMEN AST, BROWN, DRUMMOND, LAWSON AND

STUSIAK.

A vote was then taken on the original motion as moved by Alderman Drummond and seconded by Alderman Randall, "THAT the Municipal Council of The Corporation of the District of Burnaby negotiate purchase of the Royal Oak Funeral Chapel at 5152 Kingsway" and same was DEFEATED with Mayor Mercier, Alderman Ast, Brown, Emmott, Lawson and Stusiak opposed.

(c) Pauline Mudrakoff then addressed Council on the problems that are being encountered on the north side of the 3700 block Albert Street.

Miss Mudrakoff was particularly disturbed with the condition in which the north side of the 3700 block Albert Street had been left following installation of water mains, etc. to service the development on the south side. Miss Mudrakoff noted that the Municipal Engineer had reported to Council on 1981 February 02 that it was not expected that the road work would be completed before 1981 September 29, at which time the street will be upgraded to finished standard. Miss Mudrakoff considered that this was completely unreasonable. She pointed out that the installation of the new water lines had now been completed and the boulevard should now be smoothed out and topped with a good grassy turf right now. Miss Mudrakoff considered that this work should take no longer than 30 days. Miss Mudrakoff requested Council's assistance in ensuring that the north side of Albert Street be returned to an acceptable condition, not only for the benefit of the residents of the 3700 block, but for all of the citizens who use this street, immediately.

The Municipal Engineer noted that the date of 1981 September 29 was a deadline date and it was entirely likely that the work on Albert Street would be completed long before that time.

(d) Mr. G. S. Merrifield then addressed Council on the subject of the closure of the Burnaby Mountain Golf Course.

Mr. Merrifield requested information as to why the golf course had been closed to annual pass holders during the current municipal work stoppage.

His Worship, Mayor Mercier, pointed out that the golf course, along with all other municipal facilities, had been closed by a decision of Council for the duration of the current work stoppage and that there was no possibility that this decision would be altered.

(a) Province of British Columbia, Ministry of Finance, Minister, Re: Unconditional Grant for Calendar Year 1981

A letter dated 1981 January 29 was received advising that the Province of British Columbia is providing The Corporation of the District of Burnaby with an unconditional grant in the amount of \$10,041,209.00 for the calendar year 1981 from the Province's revenue sharing fund.

The increase in the unconditional grant over the 1980 grant is attributable in large part to the natural resource revenue of this Province during 1979 - 1980.

The amount of this grant and of 1981 unconditional grants to other B.C. municipalities will be announced in Victoria later today and the Municipality will receive early confirmation of it by letter. Amounts of the several other grant programs to distribute revenue sharing funds will be announced at a later date.

Item 3, Municipal Manager's Report No. 11, 1981, pertaining to this subject, was brought forward for consideration at this time.

The Municipal Manager provided a report from the Municipal Treasurer on revenue sharing grants.

The Municipal Treasurer reported that the amount of the revenue sharing grant was one of the outstanding items when Council met to review the budget in 1980 December and 1981 January. Other items which are still outstanding and need to be known before the 1981 mill rate can be set are:

- 1. R.C.M.P. contract amount of a proposed increase.
- 2. Salaries and wages amount of increase.
- 3. Surplus, if any, for 1980.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(c) Conse - C Enterprises Ltd., President,
 Re: 3911 - 3921 Carrigan Court Adjacent Construction Site in Deplorable State

A letter dated 1981 January 29 was received advising that there is considerable construction going on in the area of Lougheed Highway, Government and Cheswick Roads, and Carrigan Court in the way of multiphased housing developments. As a result of this, which will probably take place over a few years, the construction site is in a deplorable state, i.e., mud, clay, construction debris, etc. The sidewalks and roadways are covered in a thick coating of mud and clay and as a result is tracked into this condominium complex onto the carpeting of the hall-ways, elevators, underground parking areas, etc. and is causing a great deal of expense to the owners for cleaning, not to mention the great amount of extra cleaning duties by the caretaker in the building.

Council was advised that a staff report on this subject would be available on 1981 February 23 and further consideration of the matter was deferred until that time.

(d) Solicitor General of Canada, Re: Cost of Royal Canadian Mounted Police Municipal Police Services

A letter dated 1981 January 29 was received providing information on Council's express concern over the proposed increases in the cost of R.C.M.P. Municipal Police Services that are currently the subject of Federal - Provincial negotiations.

The Municipal Engineer has written to the City of Vancouver who have the responsibility for the design and construction of Boundary Road recommending the installation of a traffic signal.

Payment to the owner of \$361.00 was approved by the Municipal Manager. The truncation measures 2.5 m^2 .

9. Additional Sports Field at Riverway Sports Complex

The Municipal Manager provided a report from the Parks & Recreation Administrator concerning the need of additional sports fields at the Riverway Sports Complex.

The Parks & Recreation Administrator noted that the Parks & Recreation Commission had included in its 1981 C.I.P. \$203,000 for the pre-loading of two additional fields at Riverway Sports Complex. The Council, at its C.I.P. meeting, questioned the need for this item. The questioning was based on an observation that the present fields are not effectively utilized.

A comparison of use has been made between Riverway Sports Fields and Burnaby Lake Sports Fields. Currently, all fields at both sites are fully allotted. There is 25-30 hours per week of allottment currently in effect. This is an optimal use level for organized sports use of turf fields.

Several years are needed to develop a quality sports field. By commencing the ground work in 1981, a field at Riverway would not be available for use until the Summer or Fall of 1983.

At the present rate of growing demand for fields, additional fields will have to be on stream by this time. Otherwise, the over-use of grass fields will become unmanageable. Over-use creates serious problems between user groups and serious deterioration of the grass playing surface.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT the report of the Parks & Recreation Administrator be received for information purposes.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN LAWSON:

"THAT the recommendation of the Municipal Manager be adopted."

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT Council authorize the execution of the amendment to the Burnaby Horsemen's Association lease, as set forth in the Parks & Recreation Administrator's report.

13. Stand-by Compensation for Exempt Employees

The Municipal Manager submitted a report on the question of stand-by compensation for exempt employees.

The Municipal Manager reported that payment for stand-by will be in accordance with the applicable provision as contained in the new collective agreement when it is executed.

There will be no provision for stand-by compensation to the Executive Exempt employees (and those junior and senior exempt employees who are not designated to stand-by).

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT this report be received for information purposes.

This authorization was subject to the same opportunity being afforded to other member municipalities.
