REPORT OF THE GRANTS AND PUBLICITY COMMITTEE

HIS WORSHIP THE MAYOR  
AND MEMBERS OF THE MUNICIPAL COUNCIL:

Madam and Gentlemen:

Your Committee would report as follows:

<u>Application No.</u>		<u>Recommendation</u>
3.	<u>Canadian Wheelchair Sports Association B.C. Division</u>	\$1,000.

The National Wheelchair Basketball Championship for 1982 was held at B.C.I.T. from April 28 to May 1, 1982 and was hosted by the above organization who have requested a municipal grant to offset some of the expenses that were involved.

Since this application meets the criteria of the Policy and Guidelines under "Recreational - Sports", your Committee would recommend that a grant in the amount of \$1,000. be given to the B.C. Division of the Canadian Wheelchair Sports Association.

5. Letter Carriers Union of Canada, Local 12 nil

An application for a grant was received from the above organization for a programme they are sponsoring called "Letter Carriers' Alert". The programme is being conducted in co-operation with the United Way of the Lower Mainland.

Due to budget restraints this year, your Committee is taking a harder look at new applications. Your Committee recommends that this application be denied.

8. Society For The Preservation And Encouragement Of  
Barber Shop Quartet Singing In America nil

The Burnaby B.C. Chapter of the above Society has earned the right to represent the District of Burnaby at an International Convention and Competition in Pittsburgh, United States, in July 1982. They advise that this is the first time any B.C. Chorus has attained such an honour after competing with 14 other Pacific North-West Chapters. A request has been submitted for financial assistance to travel to Pittsburgh.

As this application does not meet the requirements laid down in the Policy and Guidelines, your Committee recommends that no grant be given.

The Arthritis Society, B.C. Division

The Burnaby Branch of the above Society is located at 228-5000 Kingsway where patient services are administered by physiotherapy staff.

Their annual budget is based on an estimated 4,030 treatments administered through the Burnaby clinic where costs are partially defrayed by medical plan payments, government grants and United Way revenue.

Volunteers provide a variety of direct clinic and patient services which enable them to make significant economies in the clinic day-to-day operation.

The society has advised that municipal grants are used for "negotiated salaries, benefits, transportation and clinic rental costs" and that the grant being requested would be applied to these same expenses incurred on behalf of patients residing in the District of Burnaby.

The request is for \$4,906. to offset the estimated operating deficit for the Burnaby clinic.

They have received municipal grants in the past, the most recent being \$3,000. in 1980. No application was submitted in 1981.

After carefully reviewing this application, your Committee has decided to recommend that no grant be given for 1982, bearing in mind the need for budget restraints.

British Columbia Scottish Festival

The above organization intends to hold a "Scottish Festival" in Burnaby this year, in conjunction with Simon Fraser University. It is hoped that such a Festival could become recognized as an annual S.F.U./Burnaby event like the "Hyack" or "Sea Festival".

The Festival Committee has submitted a request for municipal funding and advise that they have also asked for financial assistance from the Provincial and Federal Governments.

Funds permitting, they hope to put on a tattoo to include Highland Dancing Championships, Highland Games, Pipe Band Championships, Scottish Field Events and Solo Piping Championships and local Scottish Ethnic groups would provide several displays.

The prospect of this kind of Festival on an annual basis is an exciting one for Burnaby but this year, due to budget restraints, your Committee is unable to recommend any financial assistance. However, it is recommended that Council give "moral" support to the project and assistance "in kind" be given with respect to traffic, parking and security matters that usually attend events of such magnitude.

20.	<u>Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Greater Vancouver</u>  The Boys' and Girls' Clubs of Greater Vancouver have been facilitating services to young people in Burnaby for approximately 14 years. From the early beginning of providing street work and extension programs to the present operation of the Clubouse at 518 Howard Avenue, much has been accomplished.  The organization is seeking ways and means of expanding and extending their services in the hope of reaching more young people in the municipality and to that end, they are requesting an operational grant in the amount of \$6,000.  Since the taxes on the property at 518 Howard Avenue have been exempted for 1982 by "Burnaby Taxation Exemption By-Law No. 4, 1981" (B/L#7821), your Committee, by a majority vote, recommends that this request be denied.	nil
21.	<u>Burnaby Family Life Institute</u>  In 1979, Council approved a grant of \$2,000., in 1980, \$2,200. and in 1981, \$2,200.  The Institute provides programs to promote family life education and family problem prevention in Burnaby. The work is conducted primarily by volunteers.  Your Committee recommends that Council approve a grant in the amount of \$2,200. for 1982.	\$2,200.
22.	<u>Burnaby Information &amp; Referral Society - Volunteer Transportation Program</u>  The Volunteer Transportation Program is designed to assist the elderly and handicapped people residing in Burnaby to obtain medical services, who, because of age, frailty or physical handicap, are unable to use public transportation.  In 1979, they received a grant of \$3,000., in 1980 a grant of \$3,300. and in 1981, \$4,000.  Your Committee would recommend a grant in the amount of \$4,000. for 1982.	\$4,000.
23.	<u>Burnaby Information &amp; Referral Society (Operational Expenses)</u>  This organization was incorporated as a non-profit society under the Societies Act and accepted as a financially participating agency of the United Way. Prior to 1980 January 01, the Information Centre was sponsored by a Standing Committee of the Burnaby Division of the United Way.	\$4,000.

23. Burnaby Information & Referral Society  
(Operational Expenses)

Continued:

The main functions of the Society are to provide accurate information about community resources and to make referrals to appropriate agencies. The Society also assists citizens with informal counselling, completing forms and writing letters, etc. The Centre serves as a headquarters for the Christmas Bureau and operates a Toy Shop stocked with new toys which are donated.

The Centre also sponsors and co-ordinates the Volunteer Transportation Programme. (See Application No. 22).

In each of the years 1980 and 1981 they received a grant of \$4,000.

In 1982, the Centre will be assuming from the Health Department responsibility for the Campership Program which is to send children of low income families to Camp. As the Centre is expecting an increase in rent this year in addition to anticipated higher costs for increasing needs, they are requesting an increased grant in the amount of \$5,262.

Due to budget restraints, your Committee would recommend that a grant be given in the amount of \$4,000. for 1982.

24. Burnaby Volunteer Centre \$5,000.

The Burnaby Volunteer Centre provides a valuable service to the municipality in encouraging and co-ordinating volunteer activities which involve soliciting for volunteers, recording and keeping a file of volunteers available in the community through contacts with other agencies that have volunteer programmes and, after considering the various interests and skills of such volunteers, referring appropriate persons to agencies requiring their services.

The Committee has received a request for \$7,500. In 1980, Council approved a grant of \$3,000. and in 1981, a grant of \$3,500.

Your Committee has reviewed this application very carefully and would recommend that a grant of \$5,000. be given to the Centre for 1982 to cover increased costs.

26. Fraser Correctional Resources Society \$3,000.

P.U.R.P.O.S.E. offers intensive counselling, a life-skills program and recreational service to delinquent and pre-delinquent youth of Burnaby.

26. Fraser Correctional Resources Society

(for male and female young offenders  
17 to 28 years of age living in Burnaby,  
New Westminster, Coquitlam, or immediately  
adjacent areas);

Purpose, 7123 Curragh Avenue  
(for male and female youth, who have problems at  
home, school and in the community who have come  
into contact with the law - 13 to 17 years of age,  
and who live in Burnaby and adjacent areas).

This is the first time the Society has requested a  
"grant in lieu of taxes" which is due to the considerable  
growth in taxes from other years, as well as the fact  
that the level of funds received from the Corrections  
Branch and Human Resources has somewhat decreased over the  
last several years. ("This", it is stated, "in no way  
reflects less support for the programs but rather the  
restricted funds in the grant area.").

For the years 1977 to 1980 inclusive, "purpose"  
received a municipal grant of \$2,500. each year and  
in 1981 it was increased to \$3,000.

The Society further advises that they will be submitting  
an application for a "normal grant" in the near future.

Your Committee would recommend that the request for a  
"grant in lieu of taxes" be not considered, but that  
Council approve \$3,000. as a municipal grant for the  
1982 "Purpose" program as has been done in the past.

28. Miss Burnaby Pageant Committee 1982

An application for a grant has been submitted for  
funding the Miss Burnaby Pageant in June, 1982.

The Pageant Committee is making efforts to raise  
donations and prizes from local businesses.

Last year, Council did not approve the requested  
grant of \$2,200. but later approved \$850. which  
represented a matching grant to the sum of donations  
by Burnaby merchants.

Your Committee recommends that no grant be considered  
for 1982.

29. New Westminster Chamber of Commerce

\$550.

A grant in the amount of \$550. is requested for  
assistance in operating the Tourist Information  
Centre at 333 Brunette Street, New Westminster.

The Centre operates from mid-May to September and  
during this time it operates for 12 hours a day, 7 days  
a week. Your Committee feels that benefit accrues to  
Burnaby through the direction and information supplied  
to tourists about our municipality.

In 1981, Council authorized a grant of \$550. Your  
Committee would recommend a similar grant of \$550. for  
1982.

RE: KUSHIRO/BURNABY STUDENT EXCHANGE

Burnaby's sister city, Kushiro, Japan has initiated a reciprocal exchange this summer, from July 28 to August 10, 1982. The program is structured so that visiting Japanese students will be billeted in Burnaby homes. The procedure will be reversed upon a return visit to Kushiro. While the Japanese students are in Burnaby they will be involved in a series of educational and cultural visitations and activities as outlined on the accompanying enclosure.

The purpose of this exchange is to provide students with an opportunity to discover and understand other parts of our narrowing global community. As well, the exchange will enable our young people to meet and make friends with young people from Canada's major Pacific Rim trading nation. The exchange will also provide a special opportunity for students to participate in the family life of another culture. By experiencing diverse language, customs and traditions, our young people should gain a greater understanding of their role as a global citizen.

Students will be responsible for their own travel expenses, estimated at \$1,500.00, and parent hosts will assume responsibility for the guests' accommodation and some meals. However, additional anticipated costs for the educational and cultural activities and arrangements will have to be met through donations, grants, and volunteer assistance.
