(c) Mr. R.D. Sinclair then addressed the members of Council concerning the Burnaby Sign Bylaw. The text of Mr. Sinclair's presentation is contained hereunder:

"On previous occasions, at various committee meetings, I have addressed the function of billboard or poster panel advertising, its benefits and the opportunities it offers to local merchants as a low cost efficient means of local advertising. I have also made various submissions as to the form that that part of the Sign Bylaw might take were Council to permit the continuance of poster panel advertising, or the industry, in Burnaby. evening, however, I would like to address myself primarily to the Director of Planning's report. That report states that Council's policy of prohibiting billboard type advertising since 1972 has been successful in reducing the number of signs. In this regard please note on page 127, Item 3.2, the table showing a comparative number of panels from 1972 to 1983. It most certainly shows a reduction from 99 faces to 59 faces. The prime issue, I believe, is that over this period only two roof mounted panels have been removed and surely those are the ones which tend to interfere more with the environment than any others. I can assure Council that both my company and the outdoor advertising industry would like to be able to relocate these panels from these locations, but so long as the current leglislation remains we have no option but to retain and maintain our structures there. landlord standpoint they represent additional revenue so they have no particular desire to have them removed. The statement in Item (a) that

they are nearing the end of their physical lifetime is really not correct. The faces that have come down are primarily those that were on properties that were needed for development. The report makes mention of the use of billboards being an uneconomic use of property. In actual fact, billboards on almost any property where they are the sole principal user are only considered as a temporary, or interim use, and a means of providing revenue while the property is in an undeveloped state, although this state may continue for a number of years if the property owner is not in a position to develop. It does, however, afford some revenue to the owner in this interim period.

On page 126, Item 3.1(a) the report states that they are a hazard on heavy traffic thoroughfares. Frankly I have never heard of, nor have we ever been accused of causing traffic accidents. I do know that studies have been done on message centre type signage and there is no evidence whatsoever to substantiate this statement. Item 3.1(b) states that this type of structure tends of obliterate the view. The precise thrust of our offer to remove all roof top structures and control in the proposed amendment would ensure protection against view obstruction. I believe the City of Vancouver bylaw, after which this amendment was modelled, has proven that factor. Item 3.1(c) talks of unsightly supporting structures. were to allow us to upgrade our current ground structures, remove the roof panels and merely follow the proposed amendment, this area of concern would be eliminated, as specific reference is made to support and lighting structures within that proposal. Item 3.3 in the report states that a poster panel type sign could be approved on a suitable qualifying site under the present bylaw as a non-accessory sign in C3, C4 C7 Districts. is a bit misleading. As a 200 square foot sign under the current bylaw is required to be located on a one acre lot, and the only one acre lots that we are aware of are areas that are specifically restricted from this type of Item 4.2 relates to a concern that in setting the current number of signs as a limit or ceiling on permitted poster panels would favour one I have submitted examples of half a dozen other municipalities across the country in various provinces that had a maximum number of poster panels permitted. In order to assist in this dilemma I recommended that a statement might be included that no single company may control more than $90\,$ percent of the sites. This was merely an arbitrary number or proposal that I put forward. Another alternative could be the minimum number be increased from the current 59 panels, or not even set a minimum level or As mentioned in the Director of Planning's report, the proposed amendment does establish setback and height restrictions and a distance separation criteria for poster panels on the same street. It restricts the structures to purely commercial and industrial areas with specific provision to protect against encroachment on any residential areas. Frankly I believe this amendment would, on its own, ensure against proliferation or overbuilding of poster panels without any reference being required to specific number of faces or percentages of control, thereby completely erasing the legal concerns that have been voiced. Item (a) on page 124 states that billboard type signs are as inappropriate today as they were in It would appear to me that this is merely an opinion of the Planning Department which has not been challenged or changed in eleven years. have been unsuccessful, I am afraid, in having the Planning Department sit down and discuss their views or the rationale behind them, and to that end decided that possibly we should ask the community for their opinion. Therefore, in February of this year we commissioned an independent and highly regarded research company called Canadian Facts to poll the residents and obtain their views. This study is entitled "Public Opinion on Outdoor Advertising among Vancouver, Burnaby and New Westminster Adult Residents' and it gave some interesting results. The survey was conducted with 300 telephone interviews of adults being 18 years of age and older. considered a large enough sample to give good representation. I intend to cover the highlights of the report, but under objectives they state that the central aim of the research is to evaluate consumer attitudes towards outdoor advertising, the specific objective being, (1) to measure attitudes and perceptions of outdoor advertising, its appeal, utility, and role within an urban environment, and (2) to evaluate public preferences for various forms of advertising, billboards, newspapers, magazines, television, radio,

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etc., and the reason for the introduction of the other media was to cover the outdoor advertising aspect to reduce potential bias. highlights the important statements are and I quote, (1) the majority of adult residents have a neutral or positive attitude towards billboard advertising, and (2) a significant majority, almost three quarters of the residents of Burnaby and New Westminster, regarded billboard advertising as an acceptable form of advertising with acceptable distribution. past ten years the outdoor industry has changed dramatically. We have a new size format which is approximately 40 square feet or 20 percent smaller than the structures currently in Burnaby. They are of a new slimline design and far lighter in visual appearance. We are seriously concerned about our effect on the surrounding environment, but believe that we have an important role to play in the community. We have, after all, been here in this business since 1911. We most certainly agree that many, if not most, of our structures in Burnaby do not complement or work with the overall development of the community. They are old fashioned and out dated. However, the basic reason for this is that we have literally been hand tied over the past decade and the most we could do being to add the odd bit of paint or to replace a rotten support beam. If you permit us to once again install updated poster panels in Burnaby I can assure you that our program to update will be rapid and quickly seen. We know we are a highly visible medium and as such we care about our appeal and image. I believe we have demonstrated our desire to cooperate with the City of Vancouver and would like to be able to demonstrate the same attitude in Burnaby. I do not believe that turning backs or closing one's eyes on this will make us go At least not for a very long time yet. Surely it is not unreasonable to ask to be permitted to continue our presence in the community, but on a cooperative basis where we are all working towards the same common goal. This can be done, and I suggest that adopting our proposed amendments will go a long way to achieving that goal."

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building Inspection addressing the proposal submitted by Seaboard Advertising Company in connection with the text amendment proposals put forward by the Sign Bylaw Committee of the Chamber of Commerce in 1982 November. It assesses the ramifications of the proposal to permit poster panels up to 200 square feet in area on an exchange basis for existing billboards, and reports on the effectiveness of the Sign Bylaw as adopted in 1972 in controlling and, in fact, reducing substantially the number of billboards in Burnaby. The report also discussed the two topics of a former report that were referred back to staff for consideration in conjunction with the subject of poster panel signs.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- (1) THAT the Burnaby Sign Bylaw 1972 not be amended to permit the introduction of poster panel signs or other billboard type advertising displays.
- (2) THAT the Sign Bylaw not be amended to permit the introduction of signs with changeable copy incorporating rotating or revolving parts.
- (3) THAT the Municipal Solicitor be authorized to draft the amendments to Section 3(1) and 3(3) of the Burnaby Sign Bylaw to reflect the changes proposed in Item 3.11, Attachment #2 to the report.
- (4) THAT copies of the report be sent to Mr. Robert Boyce, Chairman, Sign Bylaw Commitee, Burnaby Chamber of Commerce, Lougheed Mall, 100 Lougheed Mall, Burnaby, B.C., V3J 1N4; and to Mr. R.D. 4. Building Permit Tabulation Report with Revenue/Expenditure Statement Report No. 10 from 1983 August 28 to September 25

Staff is in the process of checking the data base for consistency, assembling documentation and reviewing needs for the methods of maintaining the data base. \$41,250.00 is required for programming and programming equipment to facilitate completion of the data base and to ensure that maintenance and utility procedures are put in place. Money for this work is available from the Municipal Incentive Grant Reserve account.

While being completed, the data base will be used to refine the neighbourhood specific compaction proposals presently being prepared by the Planning and Building Inspection Department. A report outlining a draft residential framework and presenting generalized working designations of neighbourhoods for compaction will be submitted to Council for consideration by the end of 1983 October.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- (1) THAT Council approve the expenditure of \$41,250.00 to complete the graphic computer data base for the housing compaction study utilizing Municipal Incentive Grant Reserve funds.
- (2) THAT Council approve the preparation of a bylaw to appropriate the necessary funds from the Municipal Incentive Grant Reserve account.

If Council approves the advertisement, it is proposed to place it in the Vancouver Sun and Province newspapers, allowing one month for replies. Following this, the submissions will be reviewed and evaluated and a report will be submitted to Council describing the proposals and making a recommendation.
