
Members of Council will recall that in the past the Officer-in-Charge of the Burnaby Detachment of the RCMP forwarded at periodic intervals a statistical report to the Council, outlining the various operational statistics for the Detachment.

It has now been some time since such a report has been submitted, that delay being as a result of the fact that the statistical systems and format for reporting of police data has been under review by the RCMP. The object has been to develop a standardized format for reporting to Municipal Councils on Municipal Policing.

Quarterly reports for the first three quarters of 1983 are attached. Included as a part of the report for the 3rd Quarter are comments of the Officer-in-Charge on recent trends and problems.

One term used in the "Enforcement" section bears definition, that being the Enforcement Index. That index is the ratio of hazardous moving violation charges to fatalities and personal injury accidents within the municipality. A ratio or Enforcement Index of 20 is generally regarded to be an acceptable standard by police authorities, indicating that adequate enforcement measures are being taken in the traffic area. Members of Council will note that the Enforcement Index in Burnaby within the past nine months ranges from 26.5 to 33.5, indicating that the Enforcement Index is considerably better than the standard.

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COMMENTS ON CRIME TRENDS AND POLICING PROBLEMS:

On January 1, 1983, the establishment of the Detachment was reduced by four regular members in support of Council's restraint program.

During the later part of 1982 and the early part of 1983, we implemented and refined an electronic data collection system that will automatically gather essential management statistics and police information for investigators. These systems will allow us better and more prompt analysis of problems, deployment of resources and also allow our investigators to spend more of their time actually investigating incidents vs. manual retrieval. This refers to the Police Information Retrieval System.

Traffic accidents are down 15% over the first three quarters of this year as compared with last year at the same time. Our fatalities have also dropped from 9 to 6 over the same period. However, there has been an increase in the number of persons injured, while property damage is down.

With the exception of an increase in injury accidents, this favourable trend can be attributed to a number of factors, such as, increased emphasis in traffic accident investigation, traffic law enforcement and a drop in traffic volume due to the present depressed economy.

Crime generally is on the increase in the Municipality, with resident and commercial burglaries the major cause of concern. However, we have made some significant changes in the organization of our burglary section and hope to see a turn around in the near future.

Some of the problem experienced with burglaries was our necessity to divert resources to investigate armed robberies that are slightly on the increase. While these temporary diversion of resources resulted in a remarkable solve

rate of armed robberies (almost 100%), it has hurt burglary clearance rates.

In addition, we had three major investigations drawing on our resources, and all three have been brought to a successful conclusion. One involved the brutal slaying of an "exotic dancer", and a suspect is before the courts for that murder. Second, we investigated a major "gun running" investigation of international complexities. That is also before the courts. We also experienced an unusual major art theft or work by renowned artists that was stolen from a warehouse in Burnaby while in trans-shipment. Most of the work was recovered and two men charged with the offence.

Our overtime cost to date is within the projected consumption for the calendar year and we look forward to being able to maintain the "status quo" in the fourth quarter.

I am pleased with the quality of service we have been able to provide to the Municipality, not withstanding these times of restraint and other complexities that continue to challenge the ingenuity of the members of the Detachment and our support staff.
