(a) Mr. Albert W. Basile, 5451 Rawlins Crescent, Delta, read from a prepared brief submitted prior to this evening's Council Meeting, the text of which is as follows:

"Imperial Taxi Ltd. by its letter of May 28, 1985, to the Mayor and Council of the District Municipality of Burnaby, applied to have Burnaby Cab and Commercial Vehicle Bylaw No. 3102 amended 'to permit the licensing of fifteen (15) additional taxis.' Your Council has already heard submissions from Bonny's Taxi Ltd. (Allen G. Lacroix), and Bel-Air Taxi (1982) Ltd. The former argued against the amendment, whereas the latter supported the amendment in its self interest to get the necessary authority to service the Lougheed Mall. You have also tabled the Municipal Manager's recommendations regarding 'Taxi Cab Service'.

Imperial Taxi Ltd. is a wholly owned subsidiary of Royal City Taxi Ltd. Both of these companies are controlled by Duart S. MacLean and his son Gordon MacLean.

Duart S. MacLean has been in the taxi business since 1951; that is for thirty-four (34) years. Over this said time span he has seen many changes in the taxi industry of the lower mainland of this province. The most advanced development is the implementation of a fully automated computer dispatch by Royal City Taxi Ltd. The attached Schedule A lists the information available from the computer about each transaction serviced by Royal City Taxi Ltd.

Imperial Taxi Ltd., on February 11th, 1985, filed an Application for License to Operate a Limited Passenger with the Motor Carrier Commission; a copy of the application is attached hereto as Schedule B. The Commission, however, will not deliberate on the application until or unless the District of Burnaby amends its Burnaby Cab and Commercial Vehicle Bylaw No. 3102, to increase the number of taxi authorized to carry on business in Burnaby.

The Commission, I understand, has also received other taxi applications to serve Burnaby, which have received the same status as Imperial's.

Imperial Taxi Ltd. should like to submit that the Municipal Manager's recommendations regarding Taxi Cab Service should not be acted upon until after the requested amendment has been considered and voted upon by this Council. In support of this submission, Imperial Taxi Ltd. asserts the following answers to concerns expressed by this Council, and citizens and businesses in Burnaby.

- a) Imperial Taxi Ltd. believes in a local, neighbourhood taxi concept, which should come under municipal control. It does not intend, for example, to become licensed in Burnaby and then engage in an airport service. Royal City Taxi Ltd., it should be noted, does not have airport authority; it has never applied for airport authority, nor does it intend to apply for same. If Imperial Taxi Ltd. is licensed, it will remain a local taxi company, and will not apply to operate out of the airport.
- b) The history of taxi service in Burnaby shows that more than one taxi company has been licensed to operate within the municipality only to be swallowed up by Bonny's Taxi Ltd. The reason for the mergers has always been that Bonny's was the only company that could afford to maintain a dispatch office. Imperial Taxi Ltd. if licensed, intends to operate under the automated computer dispatch system of Royal City Taxi Ltd. The importance of this factor is that this Council has expressed the concern that in the past it licensed other taxi companies to provide competition, only to have them taken over by Bonny's Imperial Taxi Ltd., by tying into Royal City's computerized dispatch system, will overcome the biggest obstacle to providing an independent competitor to Bonny's. It acknowledges that a fleet of fifteen (15) cars cannot survive by itself, but by tying into Royal City Taxi Ltd.'s computerized dispatch system the business become viable. In further answer to this concern, Imperial Taxi Ltd. is prepared to accept licensing of the fifteen (15) taxis upon the condition that the licenses shall not be transferable without the consent of the District of Burnaby and the Motor Carrier Commission. Imperial Taxi Ltd. is interested in going into the taxi business; it is not in the business of selling taxi licenses. It costs approximately \$15,000.00 per car to get on the road, which for fiften (15) cars represents an investment of \$225,000.00.
- c) The citizens and businesses of Burnaby that have given support for Imperial's application, almost without exception, expressed the need for the licensing of a competitor to Bonny's Taxi Ltd. Imperial Taxi Ltd. believes that there is a need for a viable competitor. The experience on the North Shore with licensing of Sunshine Cabs Ltd. has demonstrated that competition does benefit the community, by creating a marked improvement in service to the public. A company that has a monopoly such as Bonny's, has a difficult task to motivate its employees to provide exemplary service. The threat of competition, to illustrate, has made Bonny's improve its service considerably in the last few months.

Imperial Taxi is of the view that the growth and maturity of Burnaby from a bedroom community of Vancouver to a competitor of that city, should not go unnoticed. The development, for example, of major shopping malls, Metrotown, and the ALRT, all demand more diversified ground transportation systems to service them.

Imperial Taxi Ltd. welcomes the arrival of ALRT. It views the advent of ALRT as good news for the taxi industry as a whole. When one studies taxi usage across North America, one sees that, almost invariably, cities with a commuter train system have very high taxi usage.

d) Imperial Taxi Ltd. has the expertise to deal with the problems of transporting disabled persons. Mr. Duart MacLean has operated the North Shore Handy-Dart for the past five (5) years. Royal City Taxi Ltd. has had, for the same length of time, an agreement with B.C. Transit which provides for transportation of approximately 11,000 handicapped persons annually. Imperial Taxi Ltd. is prepared to operate a vehicle, at a loss, to provide specialized service to the disabled.

- e) This Council expressed the conern that if Bel-Air Taxi Ltd. is licenced to serve Burnaby, would it object to Bonny's serving Coquitlam. Imperial Taxi Ltd. is applying to operate fifteen (15) vehicles in Burnaby in competition to Bonny's. These fifteen (15) taxi licences, if granted, would represent about 20% of the expanded ninety-two (92) taxi licences issued in Burnaby. Royal City Taxi Ltd., which has thirty-three (33) licences in New Westminster, is in competition with Queen City Taxi Ltd., which is owned by Bonny's Taxi Ltd. Queen City Taxi has eight (8) licences in New Westminster, which represents about 20% of the forty-one (41) taxi licences issued by New Westminster.
- f) Imperial Taxi Ltd. has in its possession a report prepared by Multisystems, the Consulting Division of Multiplications Inc., titled 'Decontrol and Recontrol: Atlanta's Experience with Taxi Regulations'. This document may be of some use to the District of Burnaby.
- g) Imperial Taxi Ltd. commissioned a taxi survey to be done in Burnaby. The survey will be provided to this Council, upon the condition that it be used for internal use only, and that it is not to be given to other taxi companies. The purpose of the survey was to ascertain if Burnaby's taxi users are satisfied with the existing service, and to get an indication of whether or not there is an untapped taxi market in Burnaby.

The survey which is made up of 505 responses revealed that only 30% of those questioned use taxis. Of this 30%, 65% said they were satisfied with the existing service, and that 32% responded that they were dissatisfied. The 505 responses indicated that 54% of them would use taxis more often if an additional well run taxi company were licenced.

h) The Municipal Manager's recommendation is that the licensing of taxis be referred to the GVRD and the Motor Carrier Commission to have the whole issue of regional licensing considered. The Commission has already held a forum and rendered its report on this matter; it also, on July 4, 1985, published that it will accept applications from taxi licence holders to add 'or vice versa (a) for charge customers only, or (b) when firm arrangements have been made beforehand.' A copy of the Commission's said publication is attached hereto as Schedule C.

The whole concept of regional licensing is very complex, and would, in all probability, necessitate amendments to the Municipal Act and Vancouver City Charter. One only has to ask the question whether or not the City of Vancouver will go along with regional licensing to understand how difficult it will be to institute regional licensing.

i) Imperial Taxi Ltd. submits the immediate concern of the District of Burnaby should be to its citizens and businesses, which have expressed the need for licensing of a competitor to Bonny's Taxi Ltd. Attached to this brief, as Schedule D, is a list of ratios of persons per taxi for the areas arounds Burnaby. If the District of Burnaby licences the fiften (15) cabs of Imperial Taxi Ltd., the ratio will be one (1) taxi per 1,536.63 persons, which would still be less than the GVRD average of one (1) taxi per 1,316.02 persons.

Imperial Taxi Ltd. affirms its requests that the Burnaby Cab and Commercial Vehicle Bylaw No. 3102 be amended to increase the number of taxi licences from seventy-seven (77) to ninety-two (92). It submits that if the bylaw is amended, that the public interest would best be served by issuing of the fifteen (15) new licences to Imperial Taxi Ltd. If, however, this Council feels that it does not want to be placed in a position where it must choose between competing taxi companies for the new licences, it is respectfully submitted that the matter be left with the Motor Carrier Commission to determine which company should be issued the new licences."

NOTE: A copy of the foregoing brief and attachments thereto is on file in the Municipal Clerk's Office.

(b) Mr. Douglas Oldham, President of Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd., 109 - 2544 Douglas Road, addressed the members of Council regarding the proposed establishment of a new taxi service in the municipality. The text of the delegation's presentation is as follows:

"I was born and raised in Vancouver East and maintained honours standing throughout my education; I have trained and instructed military radio operating and driving. I have been driving taxi for the last 13 years in the Lower Mainland. In Burnaby I have been driving taxi for the last seven years without receiving a single driving infraction. I am proud to announce the start up of Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd., August 1st, 1985. My goal is to create a select fleet of taxis to service Burnaby with an emphasis on customer safety and satisfaction. I feel that as the owner of a small fleet of taxis I can personally maintain and guarantee the high level of safety and service that I demand of my taxis and drivers. I have been greatly encouraged by the public response to my concept of a small personal fleet with a high standard of operation. I have not encountered a single negative response. I have utilized the latest technology in radio/telephone communications to keep my overhead costs low and my efficiency high. Standardization of equipment has been and will continue to be an effective means to control cost efficiency and maintain safety standards.

Presently, the startup fleet of Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. is limited to one taxi licence which Douglas Oldham Ventures Ltd. is transferring to Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. There is also the future possibility of the transfer of two vehicles and licences of Douglas Oldham Enterprises to Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. In addition to these vehicles and licences, Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. has two cars propaned and ready for taxi service immediately if so licenced. Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. is also negotiating the acquisition of already licenced Burnaby taxis. However, for the immediate present Burnaby Select Taxi is limited to one licenced taxi; therefore, in order to provide proper servicing of its customers, Burnaby Select Taxi is requesting the honourable Mayor and Council of Burnaby to permit the licensing of an additional seven taxi licences to Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd.

I would like to point out that according to the latest Manager's report it would be necessary to licence an additional four taxis to maintain the same ratio of taxis per population as in 1977 when there were 77 taxis; however, I feel that this is somewhat inaccurate as it was not mentioned that in 1977 all 77 licences serviced Burnaby and only Burnaby whereas the situation has now changed somewhat with virtually all of Burnaby's taxis holding airport licences, as was not the case in 1977. Therefore, at any given time one can witness numerous Burnaby taxis waiting at the airport for long periods of time. When the number of taxis en route to and from the airport is considered one can see that the ratio of cabs to service the population of Burnaby has greatly decreased; therefore, Burnaby Select Taxi feels that when this is tempered with the present economic situation, the licensing of seven additional licences is a conservative estimate for the number of cabs needed to upgrade Burnaby taxi service.

I would like to also mention that present drivers who are not driving for me as Burnaby Select Taxi but under Douglas Oldham Enterprises and/or Douglas Oldham Ventures have been driving in Burnaby as taxi drivers for 15 years. I might also mention that as I have been an owner/operator in Bonny's Taxi for the last two and one half years I have encountered no difficulties within the company and I have also witnessed an upgrade of Bonny's Taxi. I feel that Burnaby Select Taxi Ltd. will be a further impetus and constant stimulus in keeping the service to the high level which I personally wish for my company. As the matter of handicapped vehicles goes, I have been in discussion with Bonny's management and they informed that they are desirous of acquiring handicapped vehicles and they will be either using their existing licensing or perhaps if there are other licences available they will be taking care of the handicapped transportation, as it is recommended that 3 to 5% of the fleet's vehicles be for the handicapped. With my small fleet it wouldn't be feasible so I would leave the handicapped servicing to Bonny's Taxi.

I do feel, both as representative of Burnaby Select Taxi, a small Burnaby fleet, and a Bonny's shareholder that the licencing of a large fleet of taxi would be detrimental to Burnaby's taxi service in an economical sense. I have been and will continue to work very cooperatively with the present large fleet which is servicing Burnaby, Bonny's Taxi, and that is an integral part of my operation to work cooperatively with the other taxi companies in servicing the public. In summation I would like to repeat my steadfast desire to create this company and expand and grow. Friendly competition is my mandate as well as service and safety."

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN BROWN:

"THAT Items 20 and 21, Municipal Manager's Report No. 51, 1985 July 29 be now brought forward for consideration at this time."

20. Taxicab Service

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Finance written in response to further information requested by Council at its regular Council Meeting held on 1985 July 15 regarding the situation with respect to taxi licences in other major jurisdictions. The report lists studies and articles dealing with the taxicab industry in other parts of North America, copies of which are available for Council in the office of the Director Finance. The report advises that the majority of Canadian jurisdictions control the number of taxis either at the local government or provincial level, or both. The report provides details of the role of the Motor Carrier Commission, noting that the Commission controls or monitors fares/rates, safety, cleanliness and driver attitude.

A recent directive of the Motor Carrier Commission allows taxicab companies to make application to the MCC to expand service to the public in areas outside their normal jurisdictions. The report concludes with advice that progress in examining the issue of a regional taxi service by the GVRD and MCC, will be subject of a report to be presented to Council early in 1986. The report will include an overview of the effect on the taxi industry of the MCC's 1985 July 04 decision to allow taxis a wider range of pickup.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT the report be received for information purposes.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN BROWN:

"THAT the recommendation of the Municipal Manager be adopted."

21. Taxicab Service: Role in Transporting the Handicapped

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building Inspection which was written in response to a Council enquiry regarding the potential role of taxicab service in transporting the handicapped/disabled. The report advises that the existing HandiDART and taxicab services provide for many of the essential trip needs of the disabled in Burnaby. The report also suggests that provision of taxicabs which meet the accessibility requirements of wheelchair users would be a positive addition to the overall transportation services in Burnaby and would serve to provide mobility opportunities which would otherwise be limited.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- THAT Council approve in principle that taxicabs with accessibility for wheelchair passengers be provided as part of the taxicab service in Burnaby.
- (2) THAT Council, when considering additional taxicab licences or a change in policy regarding existing licences, consider requiring that 3 - 5% of the taxicab licences issued in Burnaby, or serving Burnaby, be wheelchair accessible, and
- (3) THAT Council present this position to the Motor Carrier Commission (MCC) and the Greater Vancouver Regional District.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN RANKIN:

"THAT the recommendations of the Municipal Manager be adopted."

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

(c) Mr. Tony Verlaan introduced Mr. James R. Liddle, 5031 Halifax Street, who addressed the members of Council regarding his rezoning application for the subject property. The text of Mr. Liddle's submission is as follows:

"I am here tonight to make a submission in support of our request for the rezoning and subdivision of our present property, a matter which is of great importance to us as we seek to implement some of our plans for my retirement years which will be beginning, incidentally, at the end of August. I want, first of all, to express my appreciation for the opportunity of appearing before you to speak about our application. I want also to voice my appreciation to the staff of the Planning Department for their efforts on our behalf in seeking a way to rationalize their bringing this matter forward for your consideration. A technicality arising out of Burnaby's change to the metric system might have otherwise made it inappropriate for them to even process our application. I am also pleased that the Planning Department's report to Council last week supports our proposal and recommends its approval by Council subject to satisfactory resolution of the problem created by that technicality.

Notwithstanding the sincerity of my appreciation for the things that have been done thus far to facilitate our request, I find it extremely frustrating that such a technicality should threaten the approval of plans which otherwise appear to have the support of all concerned, including all of our immediate neighbours who signed the petition of support which was attached to our original application. In a society where regulations surely are intended to serve people not to enslave them it seems to me with all due respect to be totally absurd that two proposed lots which only a short time ago would have complied in every respect with R3 requirements for area and width should now be unacceptable only because of the rounded off figures adopted to more conveniently describe their dimensions in metric terms. The resultant increase in minimum area, incidentally, is less than half of 1% of the total lot size. I understand that at last week's Council Meeting someone asked if there were not discretionary powers available to approve such a minimal shortfall and was answered that some discretion was permitted with regard to lot width but none to area. I find this answer difficult to understand since the fifth and sixth houses east of our property are built on lots that, according to my understanding, were below even the imperial minimum requirements for both width and area for R3 zoning at the time of their subdivision. These lots were created by subdivision in April of 1977 and at that time it is my understanding that the minimum requirements for that area of rezoning was that they should have 60 feet by 120 feet with a 7,200 square foot minimum requirement of area. As it is they wound up with frontage of 59.81 feet for an area of 7,177 square feet which makes them as I see it just approximately the same amount short of area that our two proposed lots are at the moment. I wouldn't be surprised if we translated the base figures for those zonings into metric terms that maybe they are short by about the same amount exactly.

I really only request the exercise of the same discretionary authority in our situation as apparently was used in the subdivision of this neighbouring property. I would like to believe that I could safely rest my case at this point, confident that the same kind of favourable consideration already given to property in the same block surely cannot be denied to a couple who have paid their dues in Burnaby for such a long period of time, not only as taxpayers but as good neighbours and good citizens. Both of us are actively involved both in supportive and leadership roles in the church, school and community activities of our neighbourhood. However, if it should be your final judgement, and I certainly don't think it ought to be, that our application can only be approved if we acquire those few extra inches of land, then at least don't make its availability contingent upon Council's willingness to approve a permanent road closure and cul-de-sac construction. This should be a completely separate issue and might quite possibly be an extremely controversial one. I believe that the present traffic barrier is filling a real and continuing need but I can understand and respect some Councillors' feelings that it is still premature to make such an arrangement permanent. Rather, allow us to acquire from the municipality, hopefully at minimal or perhaps even at no cost, the few extra inches of footage required to create the necessary extra area. If at sometime in the future those few inches are needed again for a cul-de-sac or perhaps to even reopen the street to through traffic it should be a simple matter to annex the equivalent amount of land from the undeveloped park area across the street."

Council chose not to lift this matter from the table this evening.

 - (c) Corporation of the City of New Westminster City Clerk, 1985 June 19, Re: Outdoor Burning

A letter dated 1985 June 19 was received from the Corporation of the City of New Wesminster regarding outdoor burning. The letter provides clarification of the City Council's position with respect to outdoor burning and notes that Council's concern arises from burning being permitted at the Stride Avenue dump, which often results in smoke and pollution dispersing over the west end of the City of New Westminster, rather than with outdoor by the residents of Burnaby.

Item 19, Municipal Manager's Report No. 46, 1985 July 02 was brought forward for consideration at this time.

 Letter from the Corporation of the City of New Westminster, City Hall, 511 Royal Avenue, New Westminster, B.C., V3L 1H9, Outdoor Burning

The Municipal Manager submitted a report written in response to the correspondence received from the City of New Westminster with respect to outdoor burning. The report notes that in the past, complaints from New Westminster had coincided with periods of allowable outdoor burning by Burnaby residents during which time no burning took place at the Stride Avenue Dump.

The report further advises that the most recent complaint from New Westminster followed an open burning which took place at Stride Avenue during the early hours of the morning of 1985 June 15, which was set by persons unknown. In a previous report to Council on 1985 June 03, Council was advised that a trench burner will provide a viable means of disposing of some portion of the total volume of garden refuse after pre-operational shakedown measures have taken place. The report concludes with advice that New Westminster's staff will be kept informed of progress on the trench burner installation so that New Westminster City Council will have the opportunity of being more directly informed by its own staff members concerning operations at the Stride Avenue Dump.

- (c) Funding Implications and budgetary impact of major capital projects
 - 14. Funding Implications and Budgetary Impact of Major Capital Projects

The Municipal Manager submitted a report regarding funding implications and budgetary impact of major capital projects. The report advises of the review of funding implications and the budgetary impact of a \$20.9 million capital five year program proposed by the Library Board, the Parks and Recreation Commission and the Burnaby Village Museum Board. The work program had been reviewed as a total unit with phased-in construction over five years with each project being able to proceed on a pre-determined construction schedule, balanced to spread the cash flow fairly evenly over a five year period. The impact on the tax levy resulting from the proposed program would be a 2.6 percent increase in taxes in addition to inflation allowed for 3 percent and after allowing for growth in the assessment base resulting from new construction. The report recommends that the \$20.9 million capital program be pursued on a rigidly phased basis over the five years 1986 - 1990.

The report further recommends that the full \$20.9 million be borrowed internally from the Capital Works Financing Fund and the Tax Sale and Corporate Lands Fund and that it be amortized over a 20 year period. The report concludes with advice that borrowing internally from reserves rather than externally in the market did not preclude Council from putting the question of borrowing to the voters, nor did it require that Council put the question to a vote unless directed to do so by the Minister of Municipal Affairs. Given the five year capital budgetting approach with internal borrowing and the need for the program of work being proposed, the report suggests that the political question to be answered by Council is whether or not the matter of proceeding with the program should be put to the electorate.

The Municipal Manager and Management Committee recommended:

 - e) The installation of all electrical, telephone and cable servicing, and all other wiring underground throughout the development, and to the point of connection to the existing service where sufficient facilities are available to serve the development.
 - f) The submission of an undertaking to remove all existing improvements from the site within six months of the rezoning being effected but not prior to Third Reading of the Bylaw. In the event that existing improvements on the site are vacant and considered to be a hazard to life or property, the Fire Prevention Office may issue an order to demolish such improvements and remove the resultant debris prior to Third Reading.
 - g) The subdivision of the subject site in order to create the proposed development site, and the parcels to be deeded to the Municipality at no cost for park purposes as illustrated on sketch #3 of the Director Planning and Building Inspection's report.

- h) The granting of any necessary easements.
- i) The approval of the Ministry of Transportation and Highways to the rezoning application.
- j) The retention of as many mature specimen trees as possible on the site.

30. Results of Investigation into the 1985 June 13 Toxic Chemical Discharge to Brunette River

> The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Chief Public Health Inspector outlining the results of investigations into the 1985 June 13 toxic chemical discharge into the Brunette River. The report advises that the Environment Health Division has located a Lake City industry discharging a chlorinated phenol into the Burnaby storm sewer which discharges to a tributary of Burnaby Lake. The report advises that Environment Canada staff have stated that they did not have sufficient evidence to prove the discharge as the cause of the 1985 June 13 Brunette River fish kill. Presently, the Environmental Health Division is proceeding with discussions with Provincial Crown Prosecutors on the laying of charges under authority of the Provincial Health or the Burnaby Sewer Bylaw for illegal discharge of an industry waste into the Burnaby storm sewer system.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

(1) THAT the report be received for the information of Council.

31. Enlarged Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District Burnaby Incinerator

> The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Engineering with respect to proposed enlargement of the Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District Burnaby incinerator. The report discusses the various factors which have a bearing of the enlargement of the G.V.S. & D.D. Burnaby incinerator from a capacity of 140,000 tonnes to 210,000 tonnes per year and concludes that it is justified when it forms part of an overall Solid Waste Disposal Plan for the entire region.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

Alderman Brown

Alderman Brown noted further complaints with respect to unsightly premises on the southeast corner of Imperial Street at its intersection with Frederick Avenue and requested that action be taken to remedy the situation.

Alderman Nikolai

Alderman Nikolai enquired as to the possibility of preparing an inventory of municipally owned vacant lots and suggested that these lots be sold in order to reduce areas of unsightliness in the municipality and also to generate further revenue by the sale of such lots.

In response, the Muncipal Manager, Mr. M.J. Shelley, undertook to provide a report on this suggestion.

Alderman Nikolai further advised that the R.C.M.P. Riot Squad had been required to attend a disturbance at a house located at 6078 McKay Avenue and suggested that a possible solution to the problem might be that the municipality condemn the residence?

In response, His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, noted that complainants in the area had been advised to contact the Environmental Health Division's 24 hour emergency number in the event of further noise disturbances.

Alderman Lawson

Alderman Lawson enquired with respect to difficulties for motorists wishing to turn left at the Grandview Highway intersection with Boundary Road, where left turns are presently restricted.

In response, the Director Engineering, Mr. E.E. Olson, advised that the Burnaby R.C.M.P. and Vancouver City Police had been contacted regarding this situation and both had been asked to monitor the intersection.

Alderman Lawson further enquired whether staff could be instructed to remove overgrowth and vegetation obstructing the street sign at the intersection of Broadway and Underhill Avenue.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN MCLEAN:

"THAT this regular Council Meeting do now adjourn."
