Armed Robberies of Interest

An investigation is continuing into the \$100,000.00 robbery of the Bank of Montreal at Rumble and Royal Oak. On this occasion the robbers waited until the morning armored car delivery and entered the bank by smashing through the bank window and held up the employees that were processing the delivery. The crime was obviously well planned and executed. While we haven't been successful in the apprehension of those responsible or in the recovery of the stolen money, we are continuing our investigation.

B.E. & Thefts of Interest

In the area of Break, Enter and Thefts, we had two interesting developments. In the first instance we arrested a group of five juveniles who eventually admitted responsibility for 53 house and apartment breakins in the Loughheed Mall area. Secondly, we arrested two young men who admitted responsibility for forty B.E. & Thefts throughout Burnaby.

Comparing Statistics 1984 vs. 1983

Total traffic deaths during the 1984 calendar year equalled ten (10), which is the same number as in 1983. Of these fatalities, four (4) were pedestrians struck by motorists; two (2) were lone occupants of vehicles which went out of control; two (2) deaths resulted from collisions with other vehicles, and two (2) were cyclists struck by vehicles. The number of persons injured and total motor vehicle accidents over the year compared to the same number the year previous.

Total volume of complaints for 1984 decreased by nearly 900 compared to 1983 (down to 60,955 from 61,829). The year previous the trend was reversed when complaints increased by nearly 3,700 in 1983 over 1982 (from 58,132 to 61,829).

Criminal Code offences for 1984 increased by 513 (22,883 to 23,396) over 1983; Federal Statute cases decreased by 413 (1,423 down to 1,010); Provincial Statutes increased by 1,062 (36,325 to 37,387). The overall increase in the workload of these three areas was 1,162 (from 60,631 to 61,793).

The accumulated overtime costs for detachment personnel during the year is well within the projected figures and is down from the 1983 costing.

Burnaby Detachment Audit - January 1985

The Commanding Officer's audit team audited the detachment during the middle of January to determine if we were providing a quality service to the community in a sensitive and impartial manner. They advise me that there is a clear sense of direction throughout the detachment that quality police service is expected of all members. The work environment was found to be positive and professional, and the quality of work met management's expectations.

I am pleased to report that the detachment benefits from two important management strategics, i.e. a good sense of direction toward providing quality police service, and a positive effort toward building a rewarding work environment.

Morale is good and I am pleased that the residents of Burnaby are the recipients of what I believe is an excellent service to their community.
