
Michael H. Weeks, representing the Burnaby Shelter of the Society for the (a) Prevention of Cruelty to Animals, 3202 Norland Avenue, addressed the members of Council regarding the matter of off leash dog areas. delegation expressed disappointment with the staff report on off leash dog areas which was tabled at the regular Council Meeting held on 1987 April 27 and which recommended that the municipality proceed no further with off leash areas for dogs in Burnaby. The delegation advised that he had met once with staff to discuss the three potential off leash dog areas in the municipality and had concluded that there were other, more acceptable sites which could be developed without incurring any capital cost; however, no serious consideration was given to this latter proposal. Council was therefore asked to refer the matter of off leash dog areas back to staff for more detailed study. The delegation also suggested that the study address the issue of vicious dogs and also obtain input from interested parties such as the S.P.C.A. and the Western Federation of Individuals and Dog Organizations (F.I.D.O.) together with any other interested parties appearing before Council on the same issue at this evening's Council Meeting.

Alderman Drummond entered the Council Chamber at 7:04~p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

- (b) Ms. Tracy Kuzyk, 7927 Elwell Street, then addressed the members of Council on the matter of off leash dog areas. The delegation advised that while she was not totally satisfied with the proposed off leash dog areas, the move might have been a first step towards the availability of all parks to dog owners in the municipality provided an effective animal control bylaw is first put in place. The delegation contended that enforcement of the existing bylaw for violators who allow their dogs to run off leash is presently arbitrary and discriminatory. It was suggested that an effective control bylaw would be the fairest way to proceed and Council was therefore requested to strike a panel of individuals to examine the questions of vicious animals, control mechanisms and park "etiquette" for owners of supervised animals in municipal parks.
- (c) Mr. Cyril J. Foster, 8269 18th Avenue, then addressed the members of Council on behalf of Ms. Sheila Foster regarding the matter of off leash dog areas. The delegation summarized the contents of a letter which he and his wife wrote in 1986 July to a local newspaper outlining their joint position with respect to dogs of leash. It was suggested that the existing leash bylaw creates more problems than it solves. The example of Robert Burnaby Park was used to illustrate the point that, for many years, dog owners have exercised their animals, primarily on the trails at the lower end of the park, without incident or harm. The delegation contended that dogs could be allowed off leash in the lower portion of Robert Burnaby Park without harm to other park users.

- (d) Mrs. Pat Walker, 851 Blaine Place, then addressed the members of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation reviewed statistics relating to petitions and correspondence previously received by Council with respect to off leash dog areas and urged that Council's previous commitments to resolve the problem for dog owners be honoured. The delegation reminded members of Council that only 322 citizens had indicated their opposition to proposed establishment of off leash areas for dogs in the municipality.
- (e) Mrs. Josie Romell, 8944 Centaurus Circle then addressed the member of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation expressed support for establishment of areas where dogs would be allowed to run under control of their owners. The delegation suggested that dog owners are presently being forced to break the law by allowing their dogs off leash and urged the enactment of a bylaw that would allow owners to exercise their animals, under control.
- (f) Ms. Jorja Lee Golinsky, 8224 Wedgewood Street, then addressed the members of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation suggested that during the experimental period of allowing dogs to run off leash at the lower end of Robert Burnaby Park, fewer problems were experienced with the playground areas of the Park. The delegation urged an early review of the problem and maintained that the existing bylaw is inadequate for control of dogs off leash.
- (g) Mr. C. Davy, representing the Western Federation of Individuals and Dogs Organizations (F.I.D.O.), 10060 No. 5 Road, Richmond, then addressed the members of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation commended staff work carried out to date regarding off leash dog areas and suggested that it would be wasteful to dismiss the concept. The services and expertise of F.I.D.O. were then offered to the municipality in its attempt to resolve the problems associated with off leash dogs. The delegation contended that there has been insufficient public input on the matter and suggested that his organization could assist with public education and school programs. In conclusion, the delegation suggested that further review of the problems associated with vicious dogs and off leash areas is necessary, with input being provided by the various interested parties and organizations.
- (h) Ms. Sharon Moraes, 7991 Elwell Street, then addressed the members of Council on behalf of Lakeview Ratepayers' Association which had opposed the experimental off leash dog area in Robert Burnaby Park. The delegation read from a prepared text, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Municipal Clerk. The delegation advised that her Association had decided to not participate in the public input phase of the off leash area study since the group's views on the issue were well known. The delegation observed that the report submitted to Council on 1987 April 27 indicated that most Burnaby residents do not want off leash areas and there was little or no support for the three proposed off leash areas studied by staff. Furthermore, the delegation reiterated the Lakeview Ratepayers' Association's opposition to an off leash area in Robert Burnaby Park. Council was therefore requested to support the staff recommendation to proceed no further toward the creation of off leash areas for dogs in Burnaby.
- (i) Mrs. Elizabeth Elwood, 8134 14th Avenue, then addressed the members of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation criticized the present methods of enforcing control of dogs off leash, noting that enforcement appeared to be no longer discretionary. The delegation then acknowledged the amount of staff work carried out to date with respect to off leash dog areas but advised that the most comprehensive report on the topic has been prepared by the City of Toronto where six areas were created for dogs to be exercised off leash, under control of their owners.





(j) Ms. Karen Kalyk, 4573 Midlawn Drive, then addressed the members of Council regarding off leash dog areas. The delegation reminded Council that studies on the subject of off leash dog areas have been ongoing for almost four years, at considerable cost. The delegation supported this contention by reviewing the chronology of Council's decisions and actions since 1983 July which culminated in 1987 March with the public input phase of the process to study three proposed off leash dog areas in the municipality. The delegation observed that 69.9 percent of individuals surveyed expressed opposition to the general concept of off leash sites in Burnaby and 89.8 percent had stated that they would not use the facilities.

It was suggested that the process had now been completed and Council should make its decision with expediency so that no further costs are incurred. It was suggested that the majority of citizens were opposed to any development of off leash dog areas in the municipality and the same conclusion was reached by staff. In conclusion, the delegation suggested that municipal lands are valuable and should be managed both wisely and economically.

The following matter was tabled at the regular Council Meeting held on 1987 April 27:

(a) Off Leash Dog Areas

8. Off Leash Dog Areas

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Finance regarding off leash dog areas. The report advises of the completion of the public input phase of study reviewing potential off leash areas for dogs and notes a general lack of support for such areas and little or no support for the three proposed off leash areas in the municipality. Staff concluded that in combination with its concern that it would be costly to develop such areas to a reasonable standard of public health and safety, it would not be possible to satisfactorily reconcile all of the concerns raised by Council, dog owners and the general public.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- (1) THAT the municipality proceed no further toward the creation of off leash areas for dogs in Burnaby; and
- (2) THAT a copy of the report be sent to all persons who corresponded with Council or staff on this matter.

MOVED BY ALDERMAN STUSIAK: SECONDED BY ALDERMAN MCLEAN:

"THAT the recommendations of the Municipal Manager be adopted."

- 3. Recreational needs of responsible pet owners."



1. Use of Pesticides

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Recreation and Cultural Services which was written in response to correspondence received from the Health Action Network Society regarding the use of pesticides in municipal parks and recreation areas. The report advises that the Parks and Recreation Commission, at its meeting of 1987 May 20, received a report which summarized the policies regarding pesticide use in both the City of Vancouver and Burnaby. The report notes that both jurisdictions have always had a commitment to minimize the use of pesticides; however, a consultant's report now forms a basis of that policy in the City of Vancouver. The report advises that staff will maintain contact with Vancouver to obtain results of their pesticide policy adopted on 1987 March 30. The report concludes with advice the staff in Burnaby will continue with its present policy unless otherwise directed.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

Mayor Lewarne

His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, reported that the sum of \$54,534 had been raised in the municipality for Rick Hansen's "Man in Motion World Tour" and that corporate donations would bring the total Burnaby contributions to over \$100,000. His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, expressed thanks to all individuals and corporations for their efforts in raising funds for spinal cord research and handicapped awareness programs.

His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, then advised Council of difficulties in arranging a Committee of the Whole Meeting of Council to discuss details of the Development Plan core-related review of Burnaby Metrotown, as agreed following tabling of Item 12 of Municipal Manager's Report No. 34 at the regular Council Meeting held on 1986 May 19. His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, then undertook to arrange a future meeting to deal specifically with this matter.

His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, then announced that the publication entitled "Pioneer Tales" would be released for sale to the general public at a special ceremony to be held at 12:30 p.m. on 1987 June 02 at Edmonds House.

ENQUIRIES

Alderman Nikolai

Alderman Nikolai requested comment from His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, on recently reported discussions between the Mayor and the Minister of Highways regarding a possible reactivation of the Benson Waterfront Highway running along Burrard Inlet in North Burnaby to connect the City of Vancouver with the northeast sector municipalities.

In response, His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, reported orally on discussions he had held with the Minister of Highways following a Provincial announcement that the next scheduled major road construction to be undertaken would be the Cassiar Connector in Vancouver, linking the Trans Canada Freeway with the Second Narrows Bridge. His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, suggested that if the connector were to be constructed, early consideration should be given to inclusion of additional on and off ramps in the event it is determined that construction of the waterfront highway is feasible. His Worship further reported that he had consulted the Mayors of the other jurisdictions involved in an effort to assess the viability and techical feasibility of the possible route.
