- (a) The delegation failed to appear at this evening's Council Meeting, when called.
- (b) Mr. John Revoczi, 7605 Imperial Street, then addressed the members of Council regarding a rezoning application on behalf of the residents of District Lot 91, from R5 to R3. The delegation reviewed details of the area proposed for rezoning and distributed copies of survey results pertaining to the subject area together with a petition containing the signatures of 298 persons in support of the proposed rezoning. A copy of the petition and survey material is on file in the office of the Municipal Clerk. The delegation advised that 343 of the 392 homes in the subject area had been reached and 94.5 percent of those households contacted (324) had indicated support for the proposed rezoning. Council was therefore requested to allow consideration of the proposed rezoning application as indicated on the map submitted and supported by the petition attached, together with addition or exclusion of certain sub-areas as indicated on the map submitted to Council.

Arising from Council's consideration of the delegation's submission, leave was given to introduce a motion providing direction to staff.

The delegation advised that staff had informed him that the rezoning and referendum process might take from six to eight months to complete. The delegation explained that the current owner of the subject property has asked for payment of one percent interest per month during the rezoning and referendum process. Council was therefore requested to take whatever actions are within its power to expedite the process within a maximum period of four months.

13. Letter from Mr. Brian Fairfax, 8559 Government Street, Burnaby, B.C., V3N 4S9  
Establishment of a Neighbourhood Public House,  
7472 - 6th Street, Burnaby

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building Inspection which was written in response to correspondence and the submission received in connection with the proposed establishment of a neighbourhood public house at 7472 6th Street. The report provides a chronology of the applicant's dealings with staff to date. The report concludes with advice that Mr. Fairfax has not yet provided with written confirmation of receiving pre-clearance for the site from the Provincial Liquor Control and Licensing Branch. Once such pre-clearance and submission of a rezoning application is received, the report advises that the department would process the application and report to Council in the normal fashion. It was estimated that the total approval process could be attained within approximately four to eight months.

- (d) Mr. Walter E. Apps, 4865 Triumph Street, then addressed the members of Council as the Publicity Director for the Council of Senior Citizen's Organizations regarding cutbacks of postal service. The delegation expressed concern at the deterioration in service following the recent cutbacks implemented by Canada Post, noting that many senior citizens are now forced to travel greater distances from home to mail letters. Council was urged to assist senior citizens by protesting the changes and requesting a rollback to the 1986 level of service.

NOTE: His Worship, Mayor Lewarne, then advised the delegation that following representations from his office to the head of Canada Post and to Mr. Svend Robinson, M.P., Burnaby, the municipality's concerns with respect to postal cutbacks in Burnaby had been raised in the House of Commons. Furthermore, the delegation was advised that a resolution is presently being drafted on the subject of postal service cutbacks for submission to the Union of British Columbia Municipalities' 1987 Annual Convention.

- (e) Ms. Rawnie L. Dunn, #4 - 265 Duthie Avenue, then addressed the members of Council regarding concerns with respect to postal service cutbacks as they affect the disabled. The delegation first reviewed her qualifications to represent the disabled of the municipality and read from a prepared text, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Municipal Clerk. The delegation then reviewed the position of Canada Post with respect to the changes implemented noting that the objective was to be more cost effective, being less expensive and more convenient. Also, the reductions in service applied nationwide and did not affect just the municipality of Burnaby. Canada Post contended that disabled and disadvantaged individuals could ask friends or neighbours for assistance in using mail service.

The delegation then reviewed details of the significance and importance of postal service for disabled individuals. Council was advised that frequently, disabled individuals must shop, communicate, study and work by mail. It was suggested that asking continuously for help from friends and neighbours destroys independent living for the handicapped and undermines the incentive to work. The delegation contended that people with disabilities have a right to equality of access according to Section 15 of the Charter of Rights and that reductions in postal service would erect barriers not only to the postal service but also to the many other services which the handicapped can only access by mail. It was suggested that the documented consequences of postal reductions for the disabled, who comprise 14 percent of Canada's population, provide evidence that the implemented changes have been less than successful.

The delegation concluded with the contention that if the municipality does not validate the right of its disabled residents to live in society without having to become "favour-beggars", then it will lose the right to be thought of as a responsible and well-planned municipality and it will also lose the potential contributions that disabled residents would make. Council was therefore requested to seriously consider the effects any reductions in the postal service would have on the municipality.

- (f) Ms. Brenda Stuart, then addressed the members of Council on behalf of P. Lavallee of the Coalition of Postal Justice, regarding concerns in connection with postal service in the municipality. The delegation read from a prepared text, a copy of which is on file in the office of the Municipal Clerk. The delegation advised that research had revealed that a minimum of 500 Burnaby citizens do not receive door to door mail delivery and new subdivisions presently under development will also be denied door to door delivery. It was anticipated that there would be a direct loss of 53 street letter boxes from the existing 144 in the municipality.

The delegation criticized installation of group mail boxes noting that they are prime targets for vandals and a source of litter in the neighbourhood. It was suggested that letter carriers, in addition to delivering mail, also provide an informal security presence through such programs as the Letter Carriers Alert Program where watch is kept on the elderly and disabled and unusual incidents are reported to the authorities.

Furthermore, the delegation noted that in Winnipeg, individuals had succeeded in obtaining reduced property assessments when they contended that group mail boxes devalued their property. Council was therefore requested to consider the following options in opposing Canada Post's present direction:

- "1. Send a letter to the Federal Government and Canada Post opposing cutbacks and demanding consultation on these matters;
2. Submit a resolution to the B.C. Municipalities Conference condemning these cutbacks and asking for a program of action to prevent this erosion of an economic base;
3. Submit a resolution to the Canadian Federation of Municipalities conference again asking for a program of action to oppose these cutbacks;
4. Find ways in which this Council can begin working with other municipalities in its opposition to cutbacks;
5. Endorse the concept of expanding revenue generating services as the means by which Canada Post can reduce its deficit and become self-sufficient;
6. Make public Burnaby's opposition to the present direction of Canada Post."

Treatment and Disposal of Hazardous Materials

The Municipal Manager submitted a report from the Chief Public Health Inspector which was written in response to correspondence received from the Minister of Environment and Parks regarding the treatment and disposal of hazardous materials. The report advises that wastes generated by industry that require special treatment are difficult to dispose of as there are no facilities in British Columbia. The report further notes that in 1985 June, Council requested that the Greater Vancouver Regional District examine the problem of disposal of toxic and hazardous materials and to make arrangements for a central acceptance area in the region for hazardous and toxic by-products of industry. The report further advises that, to date, no response has been received to this request. In conclusion, the report advises that staff will provide a report to Council for subsequent referral to the Minister's Special Waste Advisory Committee.

The report advises of a staff proposal to construct a 7.3 metre (24 foot) interim asphalt cap pavement along Manor Street to connect to Beta Avenue, thus diverting truck traffic from Westminster Avenue to Beta Avenue within an existing industrial area. Such traffic would then obtain access to and from Canada Way at the Beta Avenue traffic signal.

The Municipal Manager recommended:

- (1) THAT Manor Street between Westminster and Beta Avenues be constructed to an interim 7.3 metre asphalt cap pavements as a traffic management project.

Accordingly, the report recommends that the invitation for input be referred to the Burnaby Historical Society with a request that they prepare a response to the Task Force.

The report attaches a sketch of an area of the Plan designated for low rise apartment use which was approved by Council on 1986 July 21. The report suggests that the approved portion of the Development Plan includes the site covered by the subject rezoning application on Victory Street. With respect to discussions regarding the boundaries of McPherson Park, the report notes that the appropriate revisions will be resolved shortly and submitted to the Parks and Recreation Commission and Council for consideration.


