Mrs. Felker advised that since concerns were discussed in Council regarding improvements to the lane and fencing to the rear of Elgin Place, Planning and Engineering staff have visited the site and agreed that changes are required to the lane construction. The speaker noted that discussions are continuing with the developer and staff with respect to location of the fence.

The speaker also expressed concerns with respect to the height of the housing development bordering Elgin Place and noted that the two storey height limitation has not been adhered to by Polygon. Construction has caused a myriad of problems for the residents, including dust and noise bylaw violations.

Councillor Lawson entered the Council Chamber at 7:10 p.m. and took her place at the Council table.

In conclusion, the speaker recommended that, given the inevitable problems which arise during construction, developers should be required to have mitigating procedures in place before construction begins and a Code of Ethics established which is made available to all workers on the work site.

The Community Issues and Social Planning Committee submitted a report providing the results of a review of accessibility for persons with disabilities conducted in the core business district of Metrotown. The Committee advises that generally speaking, the Metrotown core business district is very accessible for persons with disabilities however, the review did identify some areas which present barriers to persons with disabilities including:

- . areas in which curb ramps are too steep or are not provided.
- areas in which sidewalks are not provided, have broken pavement or are blocked or interrupted by obstacles.
- traffic lights and pedestrian crossings are too short at some intersections and there are more audible pedestrian crossing signals required.
- . directional signs are difficult to locate.
- parking spaces are identified as too narrow, not properly signed or subject to abuse.
- . automatic entrance doors are required in the malls.

- . bank machines are difficult to use for persons in scooters or wheelchairs.
- . access to the Metrotown SkyTrain Station is not provided through the pedestrian overpass
- only one half of the telephones in the area are equipped with a volume control and there are no public telephones that can be used by deaf persons.

As a result of the Committee's findings, City staff will contact each of the agencies responsible for the various areas of Metrotown to convey the information collected and request assistance in determining the feasibility of addressing some of these barriers.
