THE SHADBOLTS

Doris and Jack Shadbolt married in 1945 and have resided in Burnaby since 1950. Individually, they have continued to make significant contributions to the arts community on regional, national and international levels.

Doris Shadbolt was born in Preston, Ontario. An honors graduate in Fine Arts from the University of Toronto, she held positions at the Art Gallery of Ontario, and the National Gallery of Canada before moving to B.C. At the Vancouver Art Gallery where she remained for twenty five years, she became known as the driving energy behind many of its more adventuresome programs and exhibitions. As an art historian and author, Doris has written numerous articles and several books. She has served on many national boards and councils and is the recipient of awards including the Order of Canada in 1976.

Jack Shadbolt was born in England in 1909, grew up in Victoria, B.C. and moved to Vancouver in 1931. After several years of travel and study he began teaching at Vancouver School of Art and was head of the Drawing and Painting department for twenty five years. He became well known as a lecturer and writer on the creative process in art and as a juror and advocate of contemporary art attitudes. He has become an internationally recognized Canadian painter who is represented in Canadian and American public, private and corporate collections. His work has been included in many important international exhibitions. He has a long record of solo exhibitions including a retrospective at the National Gallery in 1969 which toured the country. Jack is the recipient of many awards also including the Order of Canada in 1972. He is the author of two books on art and a collection of poems with drawings.

Doris and Jack Shadbolt, each through their own work, reach out to a public beyond the art community. Doris Shadbolt, as an author and through her curatorial and educational work at the VAG, has mediated between the art object and the non-specialist viewer. Also as an author and as artist and teacher, Jack Shadbolt has demonstrated his interest in sharing the artists' experience by providing an articulate way into the act of art. Wishing to stimulate a lively and more informed climate for art in the province, in 1986 together they founded the Vancouver Institute for Visual Art (V.I.V.A.) to honour and assist B.C. artists.
