- a) Mr. Danny Filiposki, 7853 Wedgewood Street and Mr. Doug Coleman, 7759 Wedgewood Street appeared before Council on behalf of Wedgewood Street residents with regard to the testing of cars and other activities associated with the operation of a radiator repair business at 7797 Edmonds Street. Mr. Coleman outlined the residents' concerns as follows:
  - 1. That the reassurances issued by the business owners regarding vehicular access and the use of the gate are "good will" reassurances and are not accompanied by any type of guarantee if they do not adhere to their commitments.
  - 2. The residents are concerned about the use of the residential property that fronts onto Wedgewood Street for business purposes. In particular, the residents are concerned about the loss of the required front yard so that it may be used for purposes directly related to the operation of the business.
  - 3. The owners feel that the use of the area reserved for parking spaces for other than parking purposes violates the zoning bylaw.

Mr. Filiposki advised that in previous years he had received assurances from the City that businesses fronting on Edmonds would not be permitted vehicle access along Wedgewood Street. The speaker noted that this type of business will generate a lot of vehicle traffic in the form of delivery vehicles ranging in size from cars to 20 or 30 ton trucks. In addition, the speakers are concerned about the amount of space required for storage of supplies used by a radiator repair shop and the type and amount of garbage that is generated by this type of business.

In conclusion, the delegation requested that Council take the necessary action to ensure that the development of businesses along the Edmonds Street corridor will not negatively impact the properties on Wedgewood Street.

# 1. 7797 Edmonds Street Preliminary Plan Approval

The City Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building advising of the results of discussions between the builder of an auto repair facility at 7797 Edmonds Street and Planning Department staff regarding the concerns of area residents with respect to access and egress onto Wedgewood Street. Staff advise that the property owners have agreed to consider constructing six foot high gates across the Wedgewood crossing which would screen the site and allow them to exercise control of vehicle access to the site; that they would not be utilizing Wedgewood Street for vehicle testing; and that screening would be provided in the form of a six foot solid fence.

The City Manager recommended:

b) Ms. Kathy Costello, 103, 9153 Saturna Drive, Burnaby, B.C. appeared before Council to discuss an application to rezone daycare space within the "Mountainwood" complex to community/recreation use. The speaker advised that this building has never been used as a daycare and was empty until 1982 or 1983 when it was converted to office space. When the complex was sold to individual owners use of the building ceased and an application was put forward to rezone the site. The speaker notes that the building size and location are inappropriate for the operation of a daycare facility. Ms. Costello advised that the original intent of the building was to benefit the 700 residents and as a result is requesting Council's support to develop a multi-purpose facility on the site.

# 2. Rezoning Reference #82/89 9151 Saturna Drive\_\_\_\_

The City Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building requesting Council authority to work with the applicant toward a suitable plan of development for the use of common space for recreational/social purposes within the Mountainwood housing complex. Planning and Building Department and Environmental Health Services staff have reviewed the application and concluded that it appears unlikely that the subject building can be successfully operated as a daycare due to the impediment of the physical changes required and the funds required to undertake them. In light of the situation, staff are requesting Council's authority to work with the applicant towards the development of a building for social/recreational purposes to benefit all residents of Mountainwood and the surrounding community.

The City Manager recommended:

The applicant's advise that they wish to develop detached housing on the site in accordance with R5 guidelines. However, the Planning Department have recommended construction of attached housing in accordance with R6 guidelines.

Mr. Parente noted that the site has been vacant for 20 years and that area residents support residential development over any industrial or commercial development. In view of the original support of the Planning Department for R5 guidelines, the proponents proceeded to initiate purchase of the site. However, they are not in favour of developing the site under R6 guidelines as now proposed by the Planning Department.

In conclusion, Mr. Altoe requested Council take steps to direct the Planning Department to proceed under R5 guidelines instead of R6.

Councillor Drummond returned to the Council Chamber at 8:04 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

11. Environmentally Sensitive Areas (ESA) Strategy - An Initial Program for Burnaby

  - d) A Handbook of Environmentally Sensitive Development and Landscape Practices be developed for staff and public uses as a 1995 SOER initiative.
