The Hannas headed a children's home funded by the Children's Aid Society that had existed in the area earlier in the century.

a) Mr. Vic Blancard, 4630 Highlawn Drive, Burnaby appeared before Council to exercise his right as a citizen of Burnaby for freedom of speech.

Councillor Lawson returned to the Council Chamber at 7:26 p.m. and took her place at the Council table.

Mr. Blancard expressed his concern that a City employee had stated to the press that no citizen in Burnaby had paid their property taxes "under protest".

Councillor Corrigan returned to the Council Chamber at 7:27 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

- Mr. Blancard further expressed his annoyance with the proposed \$3.00 smog tax, the fact that delegations to Council are restricted to ten minutes, and finally, the G.V.R.D. imposing taxes on the citizens of Burnaby. In concluding, Mr. Blancard requested that City Council take a more positive role in opposing the \$3.00 smog tax.
- b) This delegation withdrew his request to appear before Council prior to the Council meeting.

His Worship, Mayor Copeland advised that Council was in receipt of correspondence from the delegation, Mr. Allan Davison advising that he had received and read Item 26 of the City Manager's Report which appears on this evening's agenda and that the interim solution recommended in the report alleviates the residents' concerns for the present time. While applauding the temporary solution proposed, Mr. Davison indicated the citizens disappointment that no long term solution to the problems were identified.

In concluding the correspondence, Mr. Davison requested that recommendation No.2 of the City Manager's Report to open Lochdale to Sperling Avenue not be adopted until benefits are identified which clearly outweigh the loss of security and quality of life in a presently quiet and secluded neighbourhood.

c) Mr. Dimitrios Nivolianitis, 5130 Georgia Street, Burnaby appeared before Council on behalf of the residents of the 4900-5200 block East Georgia Street regarding unsafe conditions imposed on the residents in the neighbourhood.

Mr. Nivolianitis advised that approximately a year ago, the Engineering Department changed the traffic patterns on East Georgia Street by installing stop signs and by removing others. These initiatives were taken under the premise of a calmed neighbourhood and things did not seem to have worked the way they were intended.

Mr. Nivolianitis submitted a petition from the residents of the 4900-5200 block East Georgia Street which objected to the changes to the traffic pattern and signs on East Georgia Street and demanded that it be changed back to its original pattern by reinstalling the stop sign on Georgia Street and Springer Avenue. The petitioners further requested that a study be conducted to determine the increase to vehicular traffic on East Georgia Street and that everything necessary be done to discourage commuter traffic from invading the neighbourhood.

Councillor Drummond retired from the Council Chamber at 7:41 p.m.

Councillor Drummond returned from the Council Chamber at 7:47 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

In concluding, Mr. Nivolianitis advised Council that he was scheduled to appear as a delegation before the Traffic and Transportation Committee (Traffic Safety Division) on September 05, 1995 to address the petitioners' concerns.

However, a barrier should be placed on Lochdale Street as a safety measure until construction of the remaining portion of Lochdale is completed in conjunction with a future subdivision of 1661 Sperling Avenue in the northwest corner of the Sperling/Lochdale intersection. After completion of the road, the barrier would be removed.
