A regular meeting of the City Council was held in the Council Chamber, City Hall, 4949 Canada Way, Burnaby, B.C. on Monday, 1995 January 16 at 7:00 p.m.

His Worship, Mayor W.J. Copeland opened the meeting by calling for a minute of silence in honour of the Emergency Health Services employees lost during a medical flight in the Queen Charlotte Islands.

Mayor Copeland introduced the Sixth Burnaby Centre Lake Scout Troop in attendance at the meeting as part of their Citizenship Badge requirements.

1. MINUTES

CARRIED UNANIMOUSLY

a) Mr. John Coburn, 3030 Carina Place, Burnaby, B.C. appeared before Council to discuss the portion of the urban trail from Eastlake to the Cameron Recreation Centre.

Councillor Drummond entered the Council Chamber at 7:10 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

The speaker noted that the proposed route meets the concerns of residents, the needs of the community and addresses safety concerns. However, the proposed construction of a school in this area may create a new problem related to noise from Gaglardi Way affecting the townhomes above Eastlake.

The amount of clearing required for the school, parking lot and playground will eliminate the natural buffer currently protecting these homes from the traffic noise.

Therefore, Mr. Coburn requests a delay in construction of that portion of the trail until it is determined whether or not the school construction will proceed. He suggests that in the interim the trail be brought down only as far as the Gaglardi overpass.

The speaker also noted that the corner of Beaverbrook and Eastlake is extremely dangerous intersection and that the extension of Eastlake to Winston provides an opportunity to reconfigure this intersection to a "T" to improve its safety.

MOVED BY COUNCILLOR DRUMMOND: SECONDED BY COUNCILLOR LAWSON:

b) Ms. Shairry Tanquary, 7607 Elwell Street, Burnaby, B.C. appeared before Council to express concerns with regard to traffic speed and volume along Elwell Street.

Ms. Tanquary advised that she and other residents of Elwell Street appeared before the Traffic Safety Committee on 1994 November 01 and 1995 January 03 to oppose the stop sign control plan and request action be taken to control speed and traffic volume along Elwell Street through the construction of speed bumps between Humphries and Canada Way.

The speaker noted that there is conflicting information with respect to the current designation for Elwell Street. The residents would like to see the road designated as a minor local residential and are requesting Council not approve the transportation plan which designates Elwell as a local collector.

Councillor Redman entered the Council Chamber at 7:15 p.m. and took her place at the Council table.

Councillor Corrigan entered the Council Chamber at 7:20 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

In conclusion, the speaker noted that the most dangerous portion of Elwell Street is between Humphries and Canada Way and that area residents are opposed to the stop sign plan and are advocating the use of speed bumps as a traffic control measure.

F. Stop Sign Control along Elwell Street from Canada Way to Walker Avenue

The Traffic and Transportation Committee (Traffic Safety Division) have received a request from Ms. Shairry Tanquary for various traffic calming measures along Elwell Street from Canada Way to Walker Avenue. As part of the review process to determine the appropriate action in response to resident concerns, the Committee is recommending at this time that Council approve a four-way stop sign control at Humphries and Elwell Street and restriction of left-turns to Canada Way from Elwell Street at peak periods.

The Traffic and Transportation Committee (Traffic Safety Division) recommended:

2. <u>Capitol Hill Sanitary Sewer System</u>

Staff advise that the subject properties are part of Phase II of the sanitary sewer construction program in Capitol Hill. Phase II will commence construction in 1995. However, construction depends upon the ability of the City to negotiate the acquisition of easements through private property. In the event that the City is unsuccessful in securing easements, staff will investigate alternative design concepts to provide a sanitary sewer collection system for all unserviced properties on Capitol Hill.

b) Housing Committee Re: Garden Village Area Rezoning Process

The Housing Committee submitted a report providing Council with the results of a questionnaire concerning an area rezoning of the Garden Village neighbourhood and recommending that an area rezoning process be initiated based on the R10 and R11 zoning regulations. The Committee is recommending that staff meet with a Committee comprised of a cross-section of property owners to discuss the differences between R10 and R11 zoning regulations and to obtain feedback on the preparation of a zoning proposal for the neighbourhood.

The Housing Committee recommended:

1. THAT Council authorize staff to undertake a review of the R10 and R11 zoning regulations with a Committee of property owners from the Garden Village area as the first step in an area rezoning process.

b) Housing Committee Re: Undivided Fee Simple or Fractional Interest Rental Conversions

The Housing Committee submitted a report prepared in response to concerns raised regarding the conversion of rental housing units to various condominium-like schemes. The Committee is concerned that this trend will have a negative impact on the supply of rental housing in the City. As a result, the Committee is requesting Council request the Provincial Government to amend the Real Estate Act to require approval of local governments for any condominium-like conversions and to ensure full consumer disclosure of the state of the building and the legal attributes surrounding this type of tenure.

The Housing Committee recommended:

- 1. THAT Council request the Provincial Government to amend the Real Estate Act as soon as possible to require approval of local governments for 'condominium-like' tenure conversions of multiple family rental housing.
- 2. THAT Council request the Provincial Government to amend the Real Estate Act to require developers to file a disclosure statement so that potential purchasers receive disclosure regarding the condition of the building and details about this type of development.
- 3. THAT Council request the Provincial Government to ensure that adequate consumer protection legislation exists to protect buyers of 'condominium-like' tenure such as undivided or fractional interest. The Residential Tenancy Act should be clarified to determine the respective rights of tenants and purchasers in buildings where a fractional or undivided interest scheme is proposed.
- 4. THAT should the legislative amendments referred to in the above three recommendations be passed, that Council resolve that any request for condominium-like conversion be treated in the same manner, in terms of City policy, as strata title conversion under the Condominium Act.

The City Manager submitted a report from the Director Finance providing Council with information on the 1995 completed Assessment Roll. The 1995 Assessment Roll provides for an increase in market value in 1995 for the residential class of 5.9%; major industry has decreased by 3%; light industry has increased by 3.2%; and the business/other category has increased by 1.8%. However, changes in assessed value will not necessarily result in increased or declared City property taxes for most property owners as 1995 tax rates will be adjusted to offset the affect of the average market value assessment changes in each property class.
