PROCLAMATION

Whereas

The Canadian Charter of Rights and Freedoms guarantees freedom of thought, belief, opinion, and expression;

And Whereas

The Public Libraries of Canada have served as a "people's university" through facilitating access to all expressions of knowledge and intellectual activity including those which are sometimes viewed as unconventional, unpopular, or unacceptable;

And Whereas

The broad availability of such knowledge and information is essential for an active citizenry;

And Whereas

The Public Libraries of Canada provide this knowledge to all citizens regardless of age, educational attainment, ethnic heritage, or social or economic condition;

And Whereas

The 11th annual Freedom to Read Week is organized by The Canadian Book and Periodical Development Council with the support of the British Columbia Library Association Intellectual Freedom Committee in order to celebrate and defend these freedoms,

Now, Therefore,

I, William J. Copeland, Mayor of Burnaby, DO HEREBY PROCLAIM the period of February 27, 1995, to March 05, 1995, inclusive as

"Freedom to Read Week"

in the City of Burnaby and in so doing urge every citizen to recognize and defend the right of free expression.
