His Worship, Mayor Copeland announced, with regret, the passing of Mr. Stan Fisher, a long time and well respected Burnaby citizen. His Worship, Mayor Copeland called upon Councillor Jim Young to say a few words in memory of Mr. Fisher.

Councillor Jim Young prefaced his comments by stating that Burnaby has truly lost one of its great citizens. Mr. Stan Fisher has resided in Burnaby since 1946 and Councillor Young briefly touched on the many associations and organizations within the community for which Mr. Fisher had volunteered his services over the years. Stan and Edie Fisher were commended for being the founders of N.O.B.S. (Network of Burnaby Seniors). Councillor Young, on behalf of Council and staff extended sympathies to the Fisher family on the loss of their loved one.

PROCLAMATION

His Worship, Mayor Copeland proclaimed the week of 1996 August 17 to September 02 as PNE Days in the City of Burnaby.

PRESENTATION

a) Swangard Stadium Society to City of Burnaby for Redevelopment of Swangard Stadium

Mr. Ron Loland, 4195 Cherrywood Street, Burnaby appeared before Council and introduced Mr. Don Basham, Chair of the Fundraising Committee, Mr. Brian McCalder, Chair Technical Committee and Mr. Bob Rennie, Rennie & Associates. Mr. Loland commended Council for its position and foresight when it comes to the need for stadiums and compared the City of Burnaby with Vancouver where McAllister Park Stadium and Empire Stadium are now parking lots.

Mr. Brian McCalder, Chair of the Technical Committee for the Swangard Stadium Society addressed Council advising that Swangard Stadium now boasts an excellent playing field to accommodate such sports as soccer, rugby and football. The Society is very ambitious towards finishing the overall Swangard Stadium project and the speaker listed some of the tasks yet to be accomplished.

Mr. Don Basham, Chair of the Fundraising Committee addressed Council outlining the partnership held between the Swangard Stadium Society and the Burnaby Parks and Recreation Department. The overall objective of his society was to raise \$1.5 million and Mr. Basham proudly announced that \$1.8 million has been raised over the past two years. The Swangard Stadium Society is seeking a third partnership arrangement with the Parks and Recreation Commission in order to complete Phase II of the project. Mr. Basham suggested that with Burnaby hosting the 1997 B.C. Summer Games, it would provide a wonderful opportunity to showcase the stadium. Mr. Basham then introduced one of the major contributors to the project, Mr. Bob Rennie of Rennie & Associates.

Mr. Bob Rennie, Rennie & Associates addressed Council advising that Rennie & Associates sponsors a golf tournament to raise funds for major Burnaby projects such as the Arts Centre and Swangard Stadium. Mr. Rennie presented a cheque to Burnaby in the amount of \$18,736.00 in support of the Swangard Stadium Redevelopment Project.

a) Ms. Shirley Fisher, 2148 Franklin Street, Vancouver appeared before Council to share some of her ideas and observations with respect to the Deer Lake Park swimming area and the fish stock in Deer Lake. The speaker advised that the prevailing winds blow all particles and pollution to the shore at the east end of Deer Lake where it is trapped. The outlet for the water flowing into Burnaby Lake is on the north side and runs through Burnaby Village. Ms. Fisher suggested that to further enhance the water quality in the swim area, a waterline could be brought down from the Art Gallery into the lake to increase the rate of water turnover (similar to Trout Lake in Vancouver). Further the lily pads could be cleared and sand could be added.

With respect to saving the fish in Deer Lake, Ms. Fisher advised that during the hot months of summer, the water temperature in Deer Lake rises and increases the algae

which eats up all of the oxygen thus suffocating the fish in the lake. The baby trout go up the small creeks for coolness and for oxygen and then the sea gulls arrive and gobble them up within days. Therefore, the baby trout in Deer Lake never live long enough to grow and reproduce. Ms. Fisher suggested that one answer would be to dredge deep pockets at the mouth of the seven or eight creeks that enter Deer Lake (especially along the south side where the trees shade the water) giving the baby trout a place to find cool oxygenated water during short hot spells. These areas have currently been filled with shallow sandbars due to road and house construction over the past decade on the hills overlooking Deer Lake.

The speaker emphasized that, prior to the 1965 Zoning Bylaw, all lots in the subject block were consistent in dimension and, in Section 3.5 of the Director Planning and Building report, it clearly agrees with this view. In concluding his comments, Mr. Mustafa suggested that his proposal will generally enhance the neighbourhood while at the same time benefit the City in its tax base.

The theme for this year's fair is "PNE Party Zone" and the grounds will be alive with the sounds of excitement, music and laughter that are synonymous with the Annual PNE Fair. The opening day celebration will commence on Saturday, August 17th at 8:00 a.m. with opening ceremonies and a parade which will commence at 9:00 a.m. on the PNE grounds.

Councillor Drummond returned to the Council Chamber at 7:42 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

Ms. Vallance advised that, of the 1,000 parade participants, 150 are from Burnaby. In concluding her comments, the speaker, on behalf of the Pacific National Exhibition, extended an invitation to everyone to attend the annual fair. A souvenir guide was distributed to all Council members.

Re: Community Police Station Pilot Project

The Community Policing Committee submitted a report requesting Council's approval for the establishment of a pilot community police station in the Lougheed Town Centre area or other district as designated by the Community Policing Committee of Council. The Committee recommends that Council approve the expenditure of \$25,000.00 from Capital Contingency for start up costs and \$5,300 to be provided for in the 1996 Recast Budget for operations in 1996 to establish a pilot community police station in the Lougheed Town As a pilot project, the community police station would test a number of outstanding questions about community based police stations in general. The experiment would assist in determining the advisability of locating community police stations in shopping malls, and the optimum City employee/police officer/volunteer ratio for operating a community-based station. The pilot station would be evaluated before the end of 1997. At that time, decisions could be made regarding the desirability of continuing to operate the station, replicating the model in other districts in the future, or modifying either the model or the entire approach to the provision of community-based police services. Based on the evaluation, recommendations for future funding could come forward to Council by the end of 1997

The Community Policing Committee recommended:

1. THAT Council authorize the expenditure of \$25,000 from the Capital Contingency and \$5,300 to be provided for in the 1996 Recast Budget for the establishment of a pilot community police station in the Lougheed Town Centre area.

Councillor Drummond

Councillor Drummond advised that a report will be forwarded to Council in September providing a list of properties proposed for park dedication referendums and that if the Simon Fraser University Lands are available for dedication within the time limit, Burnaby could possibly be dedicating a total of 850 acres through referendum in November.

Councillor Drummond referred to an article appearing in the Burnaby News regarding an existing heron rookery on the Shell property located between tanks and the residential area. Councillor Drummond suggested staff contact Shell Canada to initiate a dialogue, ultimately creating a strategy to ensure that the heron rookery be saved for all time. The location of the rookery will not be used for any petroleum activity now or in the future and is designated as a buffer area. Councillor Drummond suggested that this would be a positive project for Shell Canada and Burnaby to work together on. In concluding his comments, Councillor Drummond also requested that consideration be given to naming the creek in the ravine area "Heron Creek".

"THAT staff contact Shell Canada to discuss a permanent method to ensure that the heron rookery on Shell property be preserved for all time."
