- a) Ms. Eilleen Busch, 5320 Neville Street, Burnaby, B.C. appeared before Council acknowledging that she was aware that a staff report would be available for Council at its meeting scheduled for 1996 October 21. Ms. Busch advised that she will be appearing as a delegation at that Council meeting and will bring forward her questions and comments at that time.
- b) Mr. Darrell Desjardin, Environmental Coordinator, Vancouver Port Corporation, 1900-200 Granville Street, Vancouver, B.C. appeared before Council to provide background information, an update and clear up any misinformation regarding the drums located just east of Vancouver Port Corporation's Berry Point terminal site. Mr. Desjardin advised that the proposed drum removal program resulted from a citizen contacting the Vancouver Port Corporation and making inquiries. Vancouver Port Corporation found the drums buried and determined that the content was characterized as an asphalt substance and did not cause any evident environmental impact at that time.

Mr. Desjardin advised that there are currently fifteen exposed drums at the surface and fifteen to thirty drums that are under water, some of which are fragmented.

The Vancouver Port Corporation is also very aware that the subject site is highly used by nesting herron, harbour seal pups and juvenile fish particularly during the Spring. Therefore, the drum removal program would be best conducted in the Fall in order not to disturb the environment. The Vancouver Port Corporation is looking at a phased program, which will also include habitat enhancement. to limit the impact on the environment Vancouver Port Corporation has also established sediment control as its number one priority.

In concluding his comments, Mr. Desjardin extended an invitation to provide a tour of the site to any interested parties, now or during the site remediation program.

c) Mr. Michael Holmes, 9168 Avalon Avenue, Burnaby, B.C. appeared before Council on behalf of the residents of the Lougheed Mall area to discuss the construction of the pedestrian overpass at Lougheed Highway and Bell Avenue. Mr. Holmes provided Council with a chronology of news events from January, 1993 to present regarding the anticipated construction of the Lougheed Highway/Bell Avenue overpass. Mr. Holmes expressed his disappointment with the way in which the Provincial Government and Burnaby City Council are not acting upon a previously announced promise for this pedestrian overpass. Mr. Holmes was of the opinion that it was a firm commitment made by the two levels of government and suggested that all the future plans for the area, i.e., rapid transit and a new high school are unverified at this time but that the overpass had already been approved by both levels of government.

In concluding his presentation, Mr. Holmes offered his time and effort to work with the community to ensure that the Lougheed Highway/Bell Avenue pedestrian overpass becomes a reality.

b) Paul Lawson & Family, 1996 September 26, Re: Dumping of yard waste on private property

A letter was received from Paul Lawson and family requesting Council reconsider its decision of last July to close the yard waste disposal drop-off site in Burnaby.

A staff note advises that the new City yard waste drop-off centre is a part of the waste reduction program available to Burnaby residents. The drop-off centre collects residential yard waste and delivers it to a composting facility hence reducing the waste stream volume. The fee imposed at the centre is to offset the associated operating and processing costs.

The City is considering expansion of the curbside yard waste collection in 1997. Subject to final program approval, the expanded curbside program would provide a more comprehensive solution to the yard waste issue. Staff have contacted Mr. Lawson and provided him with this information.

c) City Clerk, The Corporation of the City of North Vancouver to Vancouver Regional Transit Commission, 1996 September 25, Re: Proposed B.C. Transit cuts

A letter was received from the Clerk of the City of North Vancouver advising of a resolution adopted by North Vancouver City Council regarding the proposed B.C. Transit service cuts.

 - d) the possibility of establishing a service aimed at improving coordination of child care services, such as Vancouver's 'One Stop Access' Program, in Burnaby's Edmonds area and other parts of the province, as appropriate.

THAT Council be requested to authorize staff to pursue execution of a client/architect agreement between the City and Toby Russell Buckwell and Partners for the design and contract administration of the flare/blower building for the Taylor Park landfill gas management system and conceptual design for the washroom/change facility/storage building.

 - 1. Burnaby Lake Sports Complex, West of Kensington Avenue

The City Manager submitted a report from the Director Recreation and Cultural Services advising that the Parks and Recreation Commission at its meeting held on 1996 October 02 received a staff report on the Burnaby Lake Sports Complex, west of Kensington Avenue and adopted a recommendation to request that a bylaw be brought forward to fund the detail design work for the proposed expansion to the Burnaby Lake Sports Complex.

The sports complex proposed was developed with the cooperation of the Planning, Engineering and Environmental Health Departments and proposes an exclusive land use strategy that incorporates adjacent sites for potential private development on public land complimentary to the public sports component. Staff submitted a report to Council at the 1996 September 09 Council meeting which reiterates the scope of project in the context of the Central Valley Plan. Council is now, therefore, requested to endorse the Plan as an essential land use strategy to meet current sports field needs. The project was planned for intensive use made possible with the advent of artificial sports fields. The concentration of field sport games into a smaller area than that possible with traditional sand based natural sports fields has resulted in the protection of large areas of environmentally sensitive land adjacent to and within the site. A funding strategy will be proposed that incorporates the cost of the development within the Provisional 1997/2001 Capital Budget. The funding strategy parallels the construction timetable for completion within a five year period.

As stated in the report, staff indicate that a fair amount of work will need to be undertaken and approved before the City is in a position to actually post its lands for sale. In order to provide the Bastion Development Corporation and City Council with sufficient assurances to advance the implementation items, a recommendation is being made to Council that it endorse the proposal outlined herein as the basis for placing the City lands in a sale position. Provision is also made to formally advance a road exchange bylaw once final agreement has been secured on the implementation measures.

The City Manager recommended:

- 1. THAT Council authorize staff to advance the measures outlined in this report in order for the City to be in a position to post the lands referenced on Figure 1 attached for sale.
- 2. THAT Council authorize the preparation and introduction of a Road Exchange Bylaw as shown on Figure 4 attached and the execution of any Statutory Right-of-Way Agreements required to protect public utilities.

The four subject areas involve side yard reductions on corner lots, acceptance of adult grandchildren in in-law suites, wording related to comprehensive development uses, and full-service facilities at self-serve gasoline stations.

The City Manager recommended:

- 1. THAT Council authorize the City Solicitor to amend the following Zoning Bylaw Sections as summarized in Section 3.0 of this report:
 - i) 6.12(3)(b)(i) and 109.9(2) to make regulations for side yard reductions on corner lots consistent with other provisions of the Zoning Bylaw;
 - ii) 3(e)(i) to allow grandchildren as occupants of an in-law suite;
 - iii) 303.1(1.1) and (22)(b) to make the regulations where a use is permitted subject to CD (Comprehensive Development) District consistent in all sections of the Zoning Bylaw.
 - iv) Section 2 (definitions) to permit motor fuels to be dispensed by the customer or an attendant at Self-Serve Gasoline Service Stations.

This bylaw, which fixed hours of operation for barber shops under the old Shops Regulation and Weekly Holiday Act, is no longer applicable and may be removed from the active records.

The City Manager recommended:

- 1. THAT there be no change in business licence fees for 1997; and
- 2. THAT the City Solicitor be authorized to forward a repeal bylaw for the Barber Shops Regulation Bylaw 1954, Bylaw No. 3426.
