SUBJECT:

SANITARY SEWER UTILITY RATES FOR 2000

PURPOSE:

To obtain council approval for 2000 sanitary sewer rates.

RECOMMENDATION

- 1. **THAT** the following bylaws be amended to provide for the fees outlined in Schedule C, effective 2000 January 01:
 - a) Burnaby Sewerage System Parcel Tax Bylaw No. 10320
 - b) Burnaby Sewer Charge Bylaw No. 4231

SUMMARY

This is the annual sanitary sewer utility report which reviews revenues and expenditures of the utility and proposed sanitary sewer rates for 2000.

This report proposes a rate increase of 5% for the flat rate sewer parcel tax and sewer use charge, and for metered sewer charges. The general rate increase is required to pay Burnaby's share of the sewerage treatment upgrades being constructed by the Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District and the increase in City maintenance costs for 2000. The proposed rate adjustments will ensure that the sanitary sewer utility continues to be financially self sustaining.

Utility charges are collected separately from property taxes and will be due 2000 March 15. To promote payment by the due date, Burnaby charges a 5% discounted rate for payment on or before March 15.

The Director Engineering concurs with the recommendation in this report. Appearing elsewhere on the Council agenda is the subject bylaw.

REPORT

1. INTRODUCTION

All properties in Burnaby with access to sewer, pay a flat sewer parcel tax (\$246.49 for single family homes in 1999). In addition to a share of the parcel tax, residential units in multiple dwellings pay a flat annual user fee of \$133.49 in 1999. The sewer parcel tax and the sewer user fee are billed separately from property taxes. The due date for these utility charges in 2000 will be March 15. Large volume users are metered and pay for sewer services on a sliding scale related to the volume of water they use. Starting in 1998, the GVS&DD started to phase in new rates for treating industrial waste water on a select number of metered sewer users.

2. PROJECTED EXPENDITURES AND REVENUES FOR 2000

Schedule A attached summarizes the expected expenditures and revenues for 2000.

EXPENDITURES

A. GVS&DD Levy

The Greater Vancouver Sewerage and Drainage District (GVS&DD) levy, paid by Burnaby and other regional municipalities, funds each community's share of the regional sewer system. The levy finances operating and maintenance expenditures as well as capital improvements to the regional sewer system. A 2.2% increase is proposed in Burnaby's GVS&DD levy for 2000 which will increase the cost to Burnaby by \$0.3 million. The increase is mainly attributed to the Annacis Island Waste Water Treatment upgrade required to meet provincially mandated standards for sewerage treatment.

The proposed GVS&DD Levy is subject to review by the GVRD Board. The review may result in a change in the total sewerage cost to Burnaby from the current projection. Schedule B *attached* and Figure 1 below summarizes the projected costs of the GVS&DD levy to Burnaby as outlined in the Draft GVRD 2000-2008 Long Range Plan.

B. Operation and Maintenance of Existing Sewer System

At the Regular Council Meeting of 1999 September 20, Council approved a report from the Environment and Waste Management Committee on the region's Liquid Waste Management Plan policies and commitments. Burnaby's obligations under the proposed plan include implementation of combined sewer separation, management of sanitary sewer systems, and stormwater management. The full financial implication of the plan, approximately \$3.0 million per year, will not be realized until 2001. However, to provide for the appropriate planning and preparation for the expanded programs identified under the Liquid Management Plan, an increase

in sewer expenditure is recommended for 2000.

The cost of operating and maintaining the city's sewer system is expected to increase by \$366,580. The cost increase is mainly due to a projected cost increase of \$66,580 in sewer maintenance (related to sewer data capture and maintenance records' management) and \$300,000 in contribution to capital (related to sewer rehabilitation and combined sewer separation).

REVENUES

It is Council's objective that the sanitary sewer system be financially self sustaining. This is accomplished on a user pay basis. Sewer charges are reviewed annually and rate increases are, where necessary, recommended to Council. Sewer charges have increased at a slower rate since 1995 (as shown below) due to this annual review and the diminishing growth in the GVS&DD levy.

This report proposes a 5% rate increase in all sewer charges for 2000 to offset anticipated increases in expenditures detailed above. The proposed rates will increase the utility bill for a single family home by \$12.32 from \$246.49 to \$258.81 if payment is made by the due date. Current and proposed 2000 sewer rates are shown in Schedule C *attached*. Further, Schedule D *attached* contains a survey of single family sewer rates within the Greater Vancouver Region.

A. Contaminated Groundwater Charges

The GVS&DD and the City introduced charges to recover the costs of handling discharges of the contaminated water into municipal sewer systems in 1997. The GVS&DD agreed to collect and remit the charges to the city at the time that the GVS&DD issues the discharge permit. The GVS&DD has proposed modest changes to the contaminated ground water charges for 2000. It is recommended that Burnaby implement the proposed changes, as specified below.

Vancouver Sewerage Area (VSA): \$0.200 per cubic metre Fraser Sewerage Area (FSA): \$0.272 per cubic metre

B. Industrial Pricing - BOD/TSS Charges

The GVS&DD started phasing in new rates for industrial wastewater in 1998. Recognizing that biochemical oxygen demand (BOD) and total suspended solids (TSS) are the main cost drivers of the sewerage and drainage system, the GVS&DD introduced a pricing mechanism that directly quantifies the level of BOD/TSS that is being discharged into the sewerage system by individual industries.

After consulting with industry, it was agreed that the new BOD/TSS charges were to be phased in over four years on a 25% incremental basis. After four years (2001), the BOD/TSS charges will replace the GVS&DD portion of current metered sewerage charges. During the phase in period, permitted industries are not to pay less in BOD/TSS charges than they currently pay towards regional costs.

Given the need to ensure revenue neutrality, only five of the permitted industries are to be charged 75% of their BOD/TSS charges in 2000 (down from seven in 1999). These five companies will also be responsible for their portion of municipal sewerage costs. The remaining industries not charged BOD/TSS will continue to be levied regular metered sewer charges.

Schedule E *attached* provides details on the BOD/TSS charges for 2000 as well as each industry's anticipated share of regional and municipal costs. These charges are subject to review and may be modified prior to the new year.

3. INCENTIVE FOR ON TIME PAYMENT OF FLAT AND METERED RATES

In 1994 Burnaby began collecting utility charges separately from property taxes. Collection of utility charges in mid March provides investment income that serves to decrease the amount of taxes levied. Consequently, separate billing for utilities will continue in 2000.

Burnaby charges a 5% discounted rate for payment on or before the due date. On a single family home the proposed sewer parcel tax for people who pay on or before 2000 March 15 would be \$258.81. The rate for payment after 2000 March 15 would be \$272.43. The discounted rate also applies to sewer use fees.

Burnaby charges metered users a discounted rate on payments made within 30 days of the billing date on the metered sewer bill. The discounted rate for metered users is also 5% less than the non discounted rate.

4. PUBLIC NOTICE

Once approved by Council a general notice informing all users of the rate increase will be placed in a local newspaper and *InfoBurnaby*. Metered users and permitted industries part of the BOD/TSS program will be notified by letter.

The Director Engineering concurs with the recommendations contained in this report.
