Mr. Ross felt that the public has been excluded from the entire process of deciding the future of the Harry Jerome Sports Centre as the decision of the Civic Development Committee to seek proposals from potential user groups to upgrade and operate the Sports Centre was made in a 'Closed' Committee meeting. Concern was expressed that the Civic Development Committee report may now hold up the process and ultimately determine the fate of the facility. Mr. Ross advised that the desire of the Burnaby Velodrome Club is to re-open the facility and proceed to resolution of the issues.

Mr. David Schneider commented that the dreams of re-opening, repairing and maintaining the Harry Jerome Sports Centre come with a business plan and suggested that function has replaced disfunction. Mr. Schneider referred to the letters of support which had been received and distributed to Council members and reminded Council that the Sports Centre is the only one of its kind in Canada.

Included in the package distributed to Council are letters from the Canadian Cycling Association, a letter from Canadian Cycling Coach Kurt Innes, a letter from Mr. Ted Ritter, Burnaby Velodrome Club, a Province newspaper cover article discussing why playing sports makes kids brighter, letters of support from athletes and coaches, terms of reference for the creation of a Burnaby Velodrome Management Society, a letter of support from the Athletic Director at Burnaby North High School, statements of impacts from the closure of the Velodrome and finally, a statement of requirements for the Burnaby Velodrome Club. (Note: Copies available in City Clerk's Office)

In concluding his comments, Mr. Schneider requested Council's active support and patience to allow those parties involved to seek grants to assist in financing a new roof and come forward with a business plan that would satisfy the City's requirements.

Ian Jarvis, V.P. Finance and Administration

Ms. Pat Jacobsen, C.E.O., Greater Vancouver Transit Authority (TransLink) appeared before Council accompanied by Mr. Ian Jarvis, V.P. Finance and Administration to discuss important road and transit service decisions and seek Council's input with respect to Choice #1 - cutting existing road and transit programs to match revenues; or Choice #2 - maintain and begin to improve roads and transit services by raising revenues.

In her opening statements, Ms. Jacobsen advised that population and traffic are growing and maintaining regional road and transit services requires a bigger investment. A vehicle levy to fund that investment did not happen and TransLink faces a \$40 to \$50 million shortfall starting in 2002. Concerned business, commercial, social and environmental groups are joining TransLink to seek advice on the two choices being put forward.

The delegation then provided a visual presentation for the purpose of reviewing the choices in terms of framing the problem, the principles for moving ahead and the choices facing the region. The presentation touched on regional nature of travel, Burnaby commuters, TransLink funded regional roads, planned major road projects in Burnaby, Burnaby/New Westminster transit plans, main features of the Burnaby Area Transit Plan, and the four principles for moving ahead.

Specifically, this report recommends initiating a public process this Fall to identify and cost a route for the East Burnaby BikeWay for implementation in 2002 and to undertake signing and pavement marking on existing Cycle Roads and Urban Trails in Burnaby for the remainder of 2001 and into 2002.

Staff conclude the report by acknowledging that cuts are currently being made to all areas of Provincial spending. It therefore may be unrealistic to expect that child care would be spared from the cutting process particularly as it is less "entrenched" in Provincial funding priorities than more established programs such as health or education. While noting these points, and being realistic about the current economic environment in BC, the proposed response to the child care survey is considered to offer a relatively general, but responsible, City of Burnaby position for the Province's consideration.

The City Manager recommended:

3. Proposed Kingsway East 1914 School Building Upgrading Project X-Ref. Rezoning Reference #01-11

The City Manager submitted a report from the Major Civic Building Project Co-ordination Committee seeking Council approval for the upgrading of the 1914 School Building at 6650 Southoaks Crescent in Burnaby South Memorial Park that would be jointly financed through a contribution in kind from a developer, as part of a density bonus agreement, and from City sources.

Staff report that the City has been provided with a unique opportunity to restore and upgrade a landmark school building which is a significant part of Burnaby's history. The cost to the City is reduced very significantly through the use of a density bonus that has been negotiated as part of Rezoning Reference #01-11. This project is an example of private and public funding being used together to provide significant benefits to the City and in the longer term, to the developing residential community in the Southoaks and The Village neighbourhoods.

The City Manager recommended:

- 1. THAT staff be authorized to enter into an agreement with Ridgemont (Gemini II) Tower Corporation at #500 1901 Rosser Avenue, Burnaby B5C 6S3 to conduct the construction upgrading of the Kingsway East School building as outlined in this report.
