A) Mr. Jim Ervin, 1451 Sherlock Avenue, Burnaby, appeared before Council to request the names and addresses of the people who made favourable comments on the Parkcrest Bikeway. It is Mr. Ervin's contention the survey has been tampered with and the people in favour do not really exist.

The speaker contends the Parkcrest Bikeway does not have community support. Mr. Ervin spoke against increased density and the twinning of the Port Mann bridge.

In conclusion, Mr. Ervin requested Council place a question on the ballot about bike routes in Burnaby.

B) Mr. Ivan Hnatuik, 4253 Albert Street, Burnaby, appeared before Council to express frustration about traffic in North Burnaby.

Mr. Hnatuik advised that residents of North Burnaby are at the mercy of the illegal actions of rat runners through their neighbourhoods. The speaker outlined 4 specific areas of safety concerns: speeding; stop sign violations; truck traffic not permitted on residential streets; and excessive traffic volumes for residential streets.

The speaker reviewed the history of their presentations to the Traffic and Transportation Committees beginning in 2004, and the subsequent failed attempts to undertake surveys, studies and staff reports leading to the present day.

Mr. Hnatuik advised that their greatest fear is the dire consequences of traffic and rat running unchecked in the neighbourhood. In July 2008, a 6 year old boy was struck by an SUV in their neighbourhood. The young boy was hospitalized for 4 days as a result of his injuries. The delegation advised the problems are worse than ever before and the residents feel their proposals have not been heard by Council.

In conclusion, Mr. Hnatuik requested Councillors respond to three questions:

- 1) Do you believe it is your responsibility as a member of Council to ensure that the traffic laws and bylaws currently in place regarding stop signs and speeding are enforced?
- 2) Do you believe it is your responsibility to protect the safety of the residents of Burnaby by curbing the inconsiderate, illegal and dangerous actions of arrogant rat runners as currently experienced by Burnaby residents?
- 3) Having failed over the past four years to enforce the existing laws and having failed to implement effective solutions to these issues, are you now prepared to consider inhibiting the traffic on our residential side streets and abandon the previously held position that we must keep traffic moving at all times?

Councillor Rankin retired from the Council Chamber at 8:02 p.m.

Councillor Rankin returned to the Council Chamber at 8:04 p.m. and took his place at the Council table.

E) Environment Committee Re: Sustainable Purchasing Guidelines And Initiatives

The Environment Committee submitted a report to inform Council of initiatives undertaken by the Purchasing Department and to seek Council endorsement of the proposed Sustainable Purchasing Guidelines and Initiatives. Ms. Gisele Caron, the City of Burnaby's Purchasing Manager, appeared before Council to present information on sustainable purchasing practices undertaken by the Purchasing Department.

Current sustainable purchasing practices include electronic process management; materials, equipment and services; and establishment of sustainable purchasing guidelines promoting reduced impact on the environment of products and services utilized by the City. The presentation outlined short term goals for the furtherance of the City's sustainable purchasing program through the formation of *"The Green Team"*, with representatives from all City Departments; a sustainable vehicle acquisition process and a review of long term goals.

The Environment Committee recommended:

This City Archives initiative will continue to be guided and supported by the Community Heritage Commission.

5. Rezoning Reference #07-43 Four-Storey Mixed-Use Development Royal Oak Community Plan, Sub-Area 8

The purpose of the rezoning bylaw amendment is to permit the construction of a four-storey mixed use development with retail and residential at grade with residential uses above, including fully enclosed under-building and underground parking.

- 2. THAT the following be established as prerequisites to the completion of the rezoning:
 - a) The submission of a suitable plan of development.
 - b) The deposit of sufficient monies including, a 4% Engineering Inspection Fee, to cover the costs of all services necessary to serve the site and the completion of a servicing agreement covering all requisite services. All services are to be designed to City standards and constructed in accordance with the Engineering Design. One of the conditions for the release of occupancy permits will be the completion of all requisite services.
 - c) The installation of all electrical, telephone and cable servicing, and all other wiring underground throughout the development, and to the point of connection to the existing service where sufficient facilities are available to serve the development.

- d) The submission of an undertaking to remove all existing improvements from the site prior to Final Adoption of the Bylaw, but not prior to Third Reading of the Bylaw. Demolition of any improvements will be permitted after Second Reading of the Rezoning Bylaw has been granted, provided that the applicant acknowledges that such permission does not fetter Council's ability to grant or not to grant Third Reading and/or Final Adoption of the Rezoning Bylaw. In addition, the demolition of any improvements will be permitted at any time if they are vacant and considered by staff to be subject to misuse and vandalism.
- e) The undergrounding of existing overhead wiring abutting the site.
- f) The granting of any necessary statutory rights-of-way, easements and/or covenants.
- g) The granting of Section 219 Covenants including the restricting enclosure of balconies and providing that all disabled parking to remain as common property.
- h) Compliance with the Council-adopted sound criteria.
- i) Compliance with the guidelines for underground parking for residential visitors.
- j) The provision of a covered car wash stall and adequately sized and appropriately located garbage handling and recycling material holding space to the approval of the Director Engineering and a commitment to implement the recycling provisions.
- k) The pursuance of Storm Water Management Best Practices in line with established guidelines.
- I) The submission of a Site Profile and resolution of any arising requirements.
- m) The review of a detailed Sediment Control System by the Director Engineering.
- n) The provision of facilities for cyclists in accordance with Section 4.5 of the rezoning report.
- o) The deposit of the applicable Parkland Acquisition Charge.

- p) The deposit of the applicable GVS & DD Sewerage Charge.
- q) The deposit of the applicable School Site Acquisition Charge.
- r) The submission of a written undertaking to distribute area plan notification forms, prepared by the City, with disclosure statements; and, to post area plan notification signs, also prepared by the City, on the development site and in the sales office in prominent and visible locations prior to Third Reading, or at the time marketing for the subject development commences, whichever is first, and remain posted for a period of one year, or until such time that all units are sold, whichever is greater.

6. Rezoning Reference #03-46 Stacked Townhouses with Underground Parking Metrotown Development Plan, Sub-Area 11

The purpose of the proposed rezoning bylaw amendment is to permit a stacked townhouse development with underground parking.

- 2. THAT the following be established as prerequisites to the completion of the rezoning:
 - a) The submission of a suitable plan of development.

- b) The deposit of sufficient monies, including a 4% Engineering Inspection Fee, to cover the costs of all services necessary to serve the site and the completion of a servicing agreement covering all requisite services. All services are to be designed to City standards and constructed in accordance with the Engineering Design. One of the conditions for the release of occupancy permits will be the completion of all requisite services.
- c) The installation of all electrical, telephone and cable servicing, and all other wiring including switching and transformer kiosks underground throughout the development, and to the point of connection to the existing service where sufficient facilities are available to serve the development.
- d) The dedication of any rights-of-way deemed requisite.
- e) The granting of any necessary statutory rights-of-way, easements and/or covenants.
- f) The granting of 219 Covenants restricting enclosure of balconies and ensuring that disabled parking remains as common property.
- g) The consolidation of the site into one legal parcel.
- h) The retention of the identified on-site existing tree and identified tree root zones; the registration of a Section 219 Covenant for the identified protected area; submission of a written undertaking to ensure that the identified area is effectively protected by chain link fencing during the whole course of site and construction work; that patio, additional planting and/or hard landscaping in the identified protected area only be installed under the direction of the project arborist; and the deposit of sufficient monies to ensure the protection of the identified area, to be refunded a year after the release of occupancy permits, upon satisfactory inspection.
- The provision of a covered car wash stall and an adequately sized and appropriately located garbage handling and recycling material holding space and a commitment to implement the recycling provisions.
- j) Compliance with guidelines for underground parking for residential visitors.

- k) Compliance with the Council-adopted sound criteria.
- I) The deposit of the applicable Parkland Acquisition Charge.
- m) The deposit of the applicable GVS & DD Sewerage Charge.
- n) The deposit of the applicable School Site Acquisition Charge.
- o) The provision of facilities for cyclists in accordance with this report.
- p) The pursuance of Stormwater Management Best Practices in line with established guidelines.
- q) The submission of a written undertaking to distribute area plan notification forms, prepared by the City, with disclosure statements; and, to post area plan notification signs, also prepared by the City, on the development site and in the sales office in prominent and visible locations prior to Third Reading, or at the time marketing for the subject development commences, whichever is first, and remain posted for a period of one year, or until such time that all units are sold, whichever is greater.

7. Rezoning Reference #07-61 Low-Rise Apartment Building with Underground Parking – Royal Oak Community Plan

The City Manager submitted a report from the Director Planning and Building requesting Council authorization to forward this application to a Public Hearing on 2008 November 25. The purpose of the proposed rezoning bylaw amendment is to permit the construction of a two-storey plus penthouse loft multi-family development with underground parking.

The City Manager recommended:

1. THAT the sale be approved, in principle, of City-owned property for inclusion within the subject development site in accordance with the

terms outlined in Section 3.2 of this report, and subject to the applicant pursuing the rezoning proposal to completion.

- THAT the introduction of a Highway Closure Bylaw be authorized according to the terms outlined in Section 3.3 of this report, contingent upon the granting by Council of Second Reading of the subject Rezoning Bylaw.
- 3. THAT a Rezoning Bylaw be prepared and advanced to First Reading on 2008 November 3 and to a Public Hearing on 2008 November 25.
- 4. THAT the following be established as prerequisites to the completion of the rezoning:
 - a) The submission of a suitable plan of development.
 - b) The deposit of sufficient monies, including a 4% Engineering Inspection Fee, to cover the costs of all services necessary to serve the site and the completion of a servicing agreement covering all requisite services. All services are to be designed to City standards and constructed in accordance with the Engineering Design. One of the conditions for the release of occupancy permits will be the completion of all requisite services.
 - c) The installation of all electrical, telephone and cable servicing, and all other wiring underground throughout the development, and to the point of connection to the existing service where sufficient facilities are available to serve the development.
 - d) The removal of all existing improvements from the site prior to Final Adoption but not prior to Third Reading of the Bylaw. Demolition will be permitted after Second Reading of the Rezoning Bylaw has been granted provided that the applicant acknowledges that such permission does not fetter Council's ability to grant or not to grant Third Reading and/or Final Adoption of the Rezoning Bylaw. In addition, the demolition of any improvements will be permitted at any time if they are vacant and considered by staff to be subject to misuse or vandalism.
 - e) The consolidation of the net project site into one legal parcel.
 - f) The review of a detailed Sediment Control System by the Director Engineering.

- g) The completion of the Highway Closure Bylaw.
- h) The pursuance of Storm Water Management Best Practices in line with established guidelines.
- i) Compliance with the guidelines for surface and underground parking for residential visitors.
- j) The granting of any necessary statutory rights-of-way, easements and/or covenants.
- k) The undergrounding of existing overhead wiring abutting the site.
- I) Compliance with the Council-adopted sound criteria.
- m) The provision of a covered car wash stall and an adequately sized and appropriately located garbage handling and recycling material holding space and a commitment to implement the recycling provisions.
- n) The deposit of the applicable Parkland Acquisition Charge.
- o) The deposit of the applicable GVS & DD Sewerage Charge.
- p) The deposit of the applicable School Site Acquisition Charge.
- q) The provision of facilities for cyclists in accordance with Section 4.5 of the rezoning report.
- r) The granting of a 219 Covenant restricting enclosure of balconies.
- s) The granting of a 219 Covenant providing that all disabled parking to remain as common property.
- t) The submission of a written undertaking to distribute area plan notification forms, prepared by the City, with disclosure statements; and, to post area plan notification signs, also prepared by the City, on the development site and in the sales office in prominent and visible locations prior to Third Reading, or at the time marketing for the subject development commences, whichever is first, and remain posted for a period of one year, or until such time that all units are sold, whichever is greater.

- 2. THAT Council also authorize staff to introduce a Burnaby Highway Closure Bylaw for the closure, sale and consolidation of the entire lane allowance with either property at 4560 Harken Drive or 4579 Grassmere Street, should either owner fail to satisfy the requirements for closure and consolidation, subject to the conditions outlined in Section 2.0 of this report.
- 3. THAT the Director Engineering be authorized to prepare the requisite road closure, subdivision consolidation and statutory right-of-way plans.
