THE BURNABY FIRE DEPARTMENT'S PRIMARY RESPONSIBILITIES INCLUDE:

Ensuring the protection of property and the safety and wellbeing of the citizens of Burnaby.

Providing comprehensive fire, safety, and rescue services both on land and water.

Providing the citizens of Burnaby with a high level of firstresponse emergency medical care.

Fulfilling all legislative responsibilities governing the operation of the Fire Department as required under the authority given by the British Columbia Fire Services Act, the Burnaby Fire Services Bylaw, British Columbia Fire Code Regulations and other related Acts.

Providing public education and safety information in Fire Prevention and related matters.



FIRE CHIEF'S MESSAGE

THE FIRE DEPARTMENT CONTINUES TO PROVIDE HIGHLY TRAINED FIREFIGHTERS to ensure the safety and well being of Burnaby's citizens and visitors. Our firefighters take great pride in serving the community, and they are dedicated to delivering the highest level of emergency and non-emergency services at all times.

On June 30, former Fire Chief Bob Cook retired. He was an active member of the Burnaby Fire Department for over 36 years. I would like to thank him for his years of dedicated service to the City.

In 2011 there were a number of major natural disasters throughout the world. They highlighted the major roles fire departments play in emergency response and remediation during these events. With that in mind, we increased and expanded our Training in the areas of disaster response, structural collapse and Urban Search and Rescue.

We began the implementation process to install new software, designed to deliver real time information wirelessly from the department's dispatch center to fire vehicle data terminals. The program features GPS technology that identifies the closest vehicle for incident response. This is intended to produce more timely emergency response times. Critical incident information will now be delivered live and on demand, enhancing life safety and property protection outcomes. The end result will create a more efficient and effective delivery of emergency services to the community.

We introduced a new public education program on the proper use of fire extinguishers. A fire simulator, in conjunction with modified fire extinguishers, allows our Fire Prevention staff to deliver training and education on the proper use of fire extinguishers in a home or office setting. The program has been well received and has been instrumental in increasing public awareness as it relates to fire prevention and education.

Our Firefighters continue their long standing commitment to support the various charities in the community. Through the Burnaby Firefighter's Charitable Society, we volunteer to deliver life safety education, and to supply aid, comfort and support to the less fortunate. At last count, the Charitable Society delivered support and aid to over 40 charities in the community, with donations totalling close to \$140,000 annually.

On behalf of the Fire Department, I would like to thank the Mayor and Council, the Burnaby Firefighters Local 323 Executive members and the firefighters they represent, City Staff, and the Burnaby R.C.M.P., for their continuing cooperation, support and assistance during the past year.







BURNABY FIREFIGHTERS' CHARITABLE SOCIETY

The Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society donated to 42 separate charities, societies and associations. To these charities, we wrote cheques ranging from \$100.00 to \$40,000.00. The yearly total was around \$140,000.00.

Over 280 members put in an average of 11.79 hours with 1200 hours coming in December alone. In 2011 we put in a total 3,312.99 volunteer hours.

We now deliver nutritional snacks to 12 schools and one community centre. This costs us an additional \$6,000 every 4 months and another 16 hours of volunteer time a month equaling an additional 160 hours a year.

The Charitable Society continues to play the largest role in our firefighters' off duty activities. Though few of our members live in Burnaby, they are all committed to helping make the City a better place for everyone.
