



The Fire Department is trying to keep pace with the growth throughout the City, providing its citizens and visitors with highly trained firefighters dedicated to ensuring the well-being of our citizens and the protection of their property

As a second generation firefighter in the City of Burnaby, I am proud to represent such a great organization, and be part of a very proactive and progressive management team.

Since becoming Fire Chief in 2013, I am continually impressed on a daily basis with the compassion and resourcefulness of the men and women of our Department and their commitment to the residents, businesses and visitors of our City.

The Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society continues to make an impact in our City by providing funding to over 50 charities and groups to help those less fortunate. As well, Burnaby Firefighters contributed over 10000 volunteer hours in the Community to assist these worthy causes.

In 2014, the Department continued with our dispatch system update in preparation for our planned 2015 upgrade, which will provide a more seamless transition of critical information from our dispatchers to our responding resources. This upgrade will greatly assist the Department from an information and safety perspective by creating a more efficient and effective delivery of emergency services to the community.

The Fire Prevention Division continues to deliver services related to fire prevention and fire safety education by inspecting and educating businesses regarding code requirements and compliance.

We assist businesses in reviewing their emergency preparedness plans, and participate and critique their "live fire drills" when requested. Additionally, our members offer portable fire extinguisher training to citizens as well as local businesses and civic groups.

Our Pre-Incident Plan program, developed in-house by our Fire Prevention and IT staff has proven to be to an industry leader and has set a standard that is being considered by many Lower Mainland Fire Departments. This program provides up to date and pertinent information to our crews while responding to an incident to enhance and assist the decision making process for our incident commanders.

Training has always been one of our top priorities and we believe we have one of the most progressive and comprehensive training programs not only in the Lower Mainland, but in all of B.C. and Canada.


The Training Division oversees all training within the Department and our members can be found participating daily in Fire Suppression strategy and tactics, Hazardous Materials, Technical Rescue, Structural Collapse, Urban Search and Rescue, Auto Extrication, First Responder and many other specialized training topics.

As the Burnaby Fire Department evolves to meet the changing needs of our community, I look forward to the great things we will accomplish together as we explore ways to provide a service which is more efficient, more adaptable and more responsive to these needs.




# BURNABY FIREFIGHTERS' CHARITABLE SOCIETY

The Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society donated to 50 separate charities, societies and associations. Cheques were written to these charities ranging from \$100 to \$42,200 and the yearly total was close to \$225,000.

Firefighters delivered nutritional snacks totalling \$65,000 to 25 elementary schools and 4 community centres in Burnaby. The 3rd Annual Christmas Angel Breakfast and Toy Drive was supported by close to 200 firefighters who raised more than \$30,000 in cash and toys for the Christmas Bureau. In 2014, the Burnaby Firefighters Charitable Society comprised of 281 members volunteered over 10,000 hours at 96 events in and around our City.

The Charitable Society continues to play the largest role in our firefighters' off duty activities. The firefighters know that protecting a community is about more than handling emergencies, it is about helping people in our community every day, people who have to deal with health problems, disabilities, poverty, abuse, hunger and so many other issues. Our firefighters know they can make a difference!
